Although I learned about making segmented projects in the mid 1980's, I did not begin to focus on segmented woodturning until 2010. Since then, this work has become my passion. Segmented woodturning, in which the workpiece is built from many separate pieces of wood before turning, offers many advantages over a single block of wood. There are almost unlimited choices regarding design, size, shape, and color combinations. I have none of those options with that single block of wood. I enjoy the technical challenges of creating an object from an idea. My goal is to tell a story through the colors, grain, and shape of the wood.



Artist Mentorship/ Teen Development with Micah Goguen Oct. 10-11

Having ambition for

the arts and pursuing them with action takes a lot of courage, commitment and passion. For those who have pursued the arts, they understand the full emotional range that comes along with investing a piece of yourself along with putting your work out there to be viewed by others. Artist Micah Goguen offers a variety of student mentorship and teen development resources in the Middle Georgia area. Working with students of all ages, he is primarily stationed at The Perry Art Center and St. Francis Art Center and works directly with developing artists to help them pursue their talents and abilities. Teen development classes help children ages 11 and up prepare a consistent and cohesive body of work along with a portfolio so they can be competitive when applying with peers for colleges and aligning their career goals. Student mentorship applies to students above schooling age that are interested in seriously pursuing the arts. We have a more intense study of composition, technique and application as well as covering professional criteria for showing and selling works.

Park Senior High, she began a career with Delta Air Lines in Atlanta, Ga. and retired in 2006 after almost 32 years on the job. In October 2017 she won Best in Show at the Georgia National Fair in Perry, GA.



Pat DeVane Burns, Forsyth Oct. 13-14

Successfully drawing and painting for years, as evidenced by many solo and group shows, a wall

of ribbons, and repeat clients, Pat DeVane Burns wanted to dig still deeper into the creative process. In the fall of 2013, she enrolled in a college sculpture class with Master Artist, Marlin Adams, to fulfill her desire to create a bust of her mother, who died many years earlier in a car accident. Several times Burns had tried to paint her mother's portrait but was emotionally unable to do so. Clay was different. She found it to be a sensual medium, allowing thoughts, feelings and emotions to pass directly from her hands into the clay. A beautiful bust of her mother resulted and a new passion was born.

At 66, Burns continues college classes as a perpetual student, finding professors and other students provide fresh and exciting incoming ideas and methods. Contemporary classes add to the knowledge gained from past education at Georgia Governor's Honors Program through Wesleyan College, a full tuition scholarship at Berry College, independent workshops and a huge personal art library. Constant contact and 'paint days' with a close group of fellow artists is also a source of daily inspiration and action.

Pat DeVane Burns still draws and paints in oils and acrylics, has even delved recently into printmaking, but sculpture is her welcomed priority. Her deep love of animals provides a constant source of subject matter. Bronzes are her next goal.
