GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS

Entries

Rule 1. No unworthy entry shall be accepted.

Rule 2. Articles or animals will not be placed on exhibition unless properly entered with the superintendent and with entry cards attached.

Rule 3. Exhibitors should note carefully special rules published for application to the various departments in which their entries may be made.

Rule 4. Unless otherwise designated, all animals and articles must be in place no later than the time listed in the schedule, with record of entry made in entry blank under the name of the owner. Any exceptions to or deviations from this rule are published in the special rules hereinafter stated as applying to departments.

Rule 5. All division rules apply in addition to these general rules.

PREMIUM AWARD PAYMENTS: The Seward County 5-State Fair does not guarantee premium money, merchandise prizes or special awards, except for those offered by the Fair. Because the Seward County 5-State Fair Board is without constitutional or legal authority to borrow money for its operation, it reserves the right to prorate premium money because of lack of funds. **Social Security Number or Federal Identification Number** of each exhibitor is required before a check will be issued if the total amount of premium will exceed \$600. The social security number or federal identification number should be for the person to whom the check is made payable. Payments cannot be made without correct numbers. The Seward County 5-State Fair is required to report payments over \$600 to the Internal Revenue Service. The Seward County and 5-State Fair Judging Sheets are the final results, from which all relative decisions and reports are based. This record will stand as official. Premium checks in all departments will be paid as soon after the close of the fair as possible. **Any discrepancies in the amounts of premium checks must be called to the attention of The Seward County 5-State Fair Competitive Exhibit Department before September 3. No claims for error after that date can be honored.** Premium checks must be cashed within 6 months to insure payment.

PRIZES & AWARDS: Ribbons and trophies will be presented to the exhibitors at the time of judging. The Seward County 5-State Fair will not be responsible for loss. Duplicates may not be issued. The superintendent is required to see that the exhibitors have no communication with the judge that is engaged in making the awards, except when called upon for information relating to their exhibits. When entry is not worthy of first place, judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes as they see fit for the entry. There must be more than one exhibitor showing in a class to pay more than one placing in premiums.

RELEASE: All exhibits shall remain in place until the release time listed in each Department. A request for early release, based on a valid emergency, shall be presented to the superintendent of the department. The Superintendent is empowered to authorize and schedule release of exhibitors. Exhibitor must have entry form to pick up entry.

Exhibitors must claim their properties by 4:00 P.M. on Sunday. Seward County 5-State Fair Board is not responsible for exhibits left in the building or on the grounds.

Open only to enrolled 4-H/FFA members of Seward County. Must be enrolled in the project area to exhibit.

1. Some exhibits require additional labels (See department rules), available at the extension office.
2. Most Seward County 4-H exhibits are judged by consultation that allows judges to visit with exhibitors about projects. Parents are encouraged to attend as an **observer only. 4-H'ers and FFA'ers are responsible for their project and answering the judge's questions.** Parents are not to talk with judges or superintendents during consultation judging unless they are asked a direct question. **Failure to comply will result in a lower ribbon.**
3. **Parents and 4-H'ers are not to be present while judges and superintendents are trying to place ribbons on exhibits and finish paper work**
4. Check schedule in front of fair book for judging dates and times.
5. Each Seward County 4-H club member is encouraged to have at least one exhibit of their "**current year**" project work. They also have to have been enrolled in the project since May 1st unless they enrolled in 4-H for the first time after May 1st.
6. 4-H'ers exhibit and are judged in their age division: 4-H age is their age as of January 1, of the current year.
 - a. **Junior—ages 7-9**
 - b. **Intermediate—ages 10-13**
 - c. **Senior—ages 14-18**
7. Disputes are settled by county agents, superintendents and the superintendent's committee in charge according to Kansas 4-H and fair rules. Decision is final.
8. Exhibits entered in this section are not eligible for open class.
9. Blue, Red and White ribbons are awarded as the judge deems worthy. Prize money, unless otherwise noted, corresponds to the premium list.
10. State Fair stickers are placed on the blue ribbons of any exhibit the judge deems State Fair worthy. Entries with State Fair stickers are eligible to exhibit in the Kansas State Fair if the exhibitor meets the current age and exhibit requirements of the State Fair. Exhibitor must be 9 years old 4-H age (as of January 1 of the current year), and the exhibit must be in the state fair book. Corresponding Classes are Marked with an astrisk (*).

Exhibits from the Arts & Crafts Department can go on to state fair for display purposes only. (Number to go on is determined by the State 4-H Office.)

11. Champion and Reserve Champion Ribbons may be awarded in each age division. One Grand and Reserve Overall per department may be awarded.
12. Any Seward County 4-H'er may exhibit in the 5-State Division by bringing a new exhibit, or using their current exhibit.
13. Guidelines follow those of the Kansas State Fair unless otherwise noted.
14. Copyright Laws: Exhibitors should avoid using copyrighted materials whenever possible by originating his/her own work. (For more details see the Kansas State Fair Book, 4-H and FFA Rules.)

5-State 4-H Foods & Nutrition

1. Read all general rules and regulations
2. The purpose of this project is to teach 4-H'ers how ingredients react in baked products. Other lessons include technique, safety, nutrition, ethnic differences, etiquette, menu planning, table setting and recipe modification.
3. May enter a maximum of 8 items. Each item per class will be a different recipe. **With recipe included.**
4. For food safety purposes, any food with custard and dairy-based fillings and frostings (ex. Cream cheese) raw eggs, flavored oils, "canned" bread, bread or cakes in a jar, or any food requiring refrigeration (ex. Bacon) will be disqualified and not be judged. Refer to K-State Research and Extension publication, 4-H488, Judge's Guide for Foods and Nutrition Exhibits, for information to help you make informed safe food exhibit decisions.
5. Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
6. All baked goods must be left whole and uncut. Small items such as cookies and rolls, should be the same shape and from the same recipe. Exhibit 3 cookies, 3 muffins, 3 bread sticks, 1 loaf bread, etc.
7. Under baked entries will be lowered one or more ribbon placing.
8. All un-frosted cakes should be exhibited in an upright position with crust showing. The exception is for cakes made with special designs such as Bundt cakes. They should have top crust side down.
9. Quick breads are made without yeast.
10. Place all food in a clear plastic bag on covered cardboard or sturdy paper plate. Cakes may be in a cake box.
11. 4-H'ers are encouraged to make all entries as nutritious as possible, using whole wheat flour, oatmeal, powdered milk, etc.
12. There are two labels per exhibit. Attach one to the bottom of display plate. Place the other loose on display plate next to entry.
13. Modified non-perishable food product. Product must be modified from original recipe to nutritionally enhance the

food product. Attach one – 8 ½ x 11 inch page (front and back) that includes Original Recipe, Modified Recipe, and Narrative to describe modifications made, why modifications were made and lessons learned such as nutritive value, or changes in appearance, doneness, aroma, flavor, tenderness and/or texture. Example: a standard blueberry muffin recipe that is modified to make it gluten free. Suggested resources:

5-State 4-H Food Preservation**

1. Read general rules and regulations.
2. Exhibits must have been preserved since the member's previous year's county fair, and not been exhibited at the previous State Fair.
3. Recommended method of processing must be used. Follow guidelines in K-State Research and Extension Food Preservation publications or "USDA's Complete Guide to Home Canning", or "So Easy to Preserve, 6th Edition, Cooperative Extension Service The University of Georgia", or "Ball Blue Book of Preserving" (2012 or later). Open kettle canning and oven canning will be disqualified. Low acid products must be pressure processed properly for the altitude of residence. Refer to following K-State Research and Extension publications for more information: 4H712, Food Safety Recommendations

4. **Homemade recipes or other untested recipes will be disqualified for safety reasons.**
5. Alcohol is not allowed as an ingredient in food preservation entries. Entries with alcohol in the recipe will be disqualified and not be judged.
5. Each member may enter up to 8 exhibits.
6. Each exhibit must have the complete recipe and instructions attached with the entry card, or it will be lowered one ribbon placing. Recipe must include exhibitor name, recipe source, date of publication, and altitude of residence.
7. Exhibits must be sealed in clean, clear standard canning jars, with matching brand (ex: use Ball lids on Ball jars, or Kerr lids on Kerr jars, etc.) two piece lids. Do not use colored jars. Do not add fancy padded lids, fabric over wraps or cozies as they interfere with the judging process. NO fancy packs unless recipe states to do so (ex: Pickled asparagus). Jars must be sealed when entered. Jelly must be in half pint or pint jar. All other products must be in pint or quart jars. Note: There are 12-ounce and 24-ounce canning jars available and may be used. Use pint jar canning process recommendations for 12 ounce jars. Use quart jar process recommendations for 24 ounce jars.
8. Each jar exhibited must be labeled. The label must not cover brand name of jar. The label must give: Class no. Altitude, of Residence, Canning Method (water bath, weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure method), Process Time, Pressure (psi), date processed including month and year. Name and County/District. 9. Dried Foods: One kind of dried food product exhibited in a small canning jar. If dried food product is not in a canning jar, it will be lowered one ribbon rating. Suggested amount: 1/3 - 1/2 cup, or three or four pieces per exhibit. All meat jerky must be cooked to internal temperature of 160 degrees F before or after drying. Dried products must include the recipe and preparation steps. Jerky not heated to an internal temperature of 160 degrees F will be disqualified and not be judged. Seward County 4-H—Cookie Jar & Gift Basket

1. Exhibitor must be enrolled in Foods & Nutrition
2. Different kinds of homemade cookies, all visible in a 1 gallon wide mouth, clear jar, decorated as desired. One per exhibitor. **Must include recipe for each different cookie.**
3. Cookies are to be individually wrapped and jar is to be filled completely. Bring one of each cookie in a small container, wrapped individually, so the judge will not need to open the jar.
4. Jars are judged 50% for the jar and 50% for the cookies.
5. Only one entry per exhibitor.
6. Intermediates and Seniors are encouraged, but not required, to try fancier types of cookies.
7. Overall Grand Champion & Reserve Champion Cookie Jars may be sold at the fair, if the judge deems worthy. **Inform the superintendent if you are NOT willing to sell your cookie jar.**
8. Food Gift Package-No alcoholic beverages will be accepted. A food gift package must contain at least 3 different food items (prepared for *human consumption*), made by the 4-H member, in a suitable container no larger than 18"x18"x18". Prepared food items must have **Recipes** attached with the entry. Additional homemade food items beyond the 3 minimum or purchased items may also be included in the gift package. Also include the answers to these questions: a) What is the intended use? b) What food safety precautions were taken during and after preparation? Home canned foods must follow Food Preservation rules. Canning jars should not be used for baking per manufacturer's instructions. They could break during baking. Grand Champion & Reserve Champion Seward County Gift Package (maximum of 6) may be sold at the fair. **Inform the superintendent if you are NOT willing to sell your Gift Package.**

3. Garments and outfits do not have to be new, but must be in good condition and well cared for.
4. Fashion Revue Construction outfits are judged on presentation, fit, external finishing and cost per wear.
5. Fashion Revue Buymanship outfits are judged on presentation, cost per wear, and care of outfit.
6. Two Seward County 4-H'ers 14 and over are eligible for State Fair competition in Fashion Revue.
7. To receive premiums, all participants must model in the public fashion revue. (Check date & time in front of book).
8. Garments cannot be modeled more than 1 year.
9. Purchased Garments Revue: Majority of outfit is purchased and modeled by the 4-H'er; or it may be made by someone else if the fabric and pattern were chosen by the 4-H'er. Sweaters, blouses, or shirts may be purchased or made.
10. The budget class teaches 4-H'ers how to purchase clothing and accessories on a limited budget.
11. All buymanship classes are judged on the entire outfit; including outer garments, shoes, and accessories.
12. Exhibitors must be enrolled in clothing and textiles.

5. Special consideration will be given to articles which are original design. Such articles should have a note attached explaining the original design.
6. The exhibitor may attach an index card, no larger than 3" x 5", with the entry form to give the judge any information which the exhibitor thinks would be helpful for the judge to know. Explain whether you created the fabric for a knitted article by hand or by a knitting machine. Explain if the exhibit contains any recycled materials, or is made of at least 90% wool.
7. Exhibitors are expected to be enrolled in the Fiber Arts project in which they are entered. When the exhibit is a sewn garment that also includes one or more Fiber Art techniques (i.e. knitting, crochet, needle arts, or patchwork and quilting), the determination of what division (Clothing or Fiber Arts) and class in which to enter will be left with the 4-H participant, however the judge has the ability to make the final determination.
8. All exhibits which need to be hung, MUST have the appropriate hanger, rod, wire or other mechanism attached in order to be properly displayed.

LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Seward County 5-State Fair Board reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle all questions arising in connection with the fair that shall be held under the management of the board.
2. All exhibitors must be a 4-H or FFA member in good standing.
3. General and specific rules for each section are given under each species.
4. The market show and weight requirements are found in each individual specie division. There will be only one weigh in per specie. Seward County youth have the right

to re-weigh for the 5-State Shows.

5. Traffic aisles and stalls must be kept clear and clean, for the safety of exhibitors and the people attending the fair. It is a goal of the Seward County 5-State Fair to make sure participants do this on a timely basis. Exhibitors are asked to keep their area clean and help others if needed.
6. Any animal may be shown in one class plus showmanship only.
7. Any exhibitor that does not keep their area clean may lose the right to any premium money due them.
8. Owner of an animal may secure another 4-H or FFA exhibitor to show his or her animal only in the case of illness or if exhibitor has more than one entry in the same class.
9. In the case of a dispute, the Kansas 4-H Rules will be followed and settled by superintendent's committee. Their decision will be final.
10. No premium will be paid to exhibitors if his or her animal does not make the required weight.
11. No co-ownership of animals allowed, with the exception of animals shown in the breeding classes (heifers/ewes/gilts). In this case, they may be co-owned by two or more 4-H or FFA members from the same family. No breeding animal that is registered in a farm name or whose papers include the name of adults are eligible to show. If it can be determined that an animal has been shown by someone else after May 1st - beef & June 15th – hogs and sheep, that animal will not be eligible to show.
 12. No person shall enter the show ring or assist 4-Hers showing animals except ring stewards, superintendents or fair board members.
 13. Exhibitors are expected to be appropriately dressed.
14. The Fair Board, Judges, Superintendents, or County Agents are not responsible for loss, death, illness, or injury to any animals or exhibits.
15. Livestock barns will be unlocked at 6:00am and locked at 10:00pm each day.
16. **5-State Shows will be conducted as a Jackpot Show. Entry fees are as follows: Beef-\$20 per head, All small animal including bucket calf and mini Hereford-\$10 per head.**
17. All Seward County livestock classes will be broke by weight. 5-State livestock must have five or more animals to be shown by a breed, otherwise they will be shown by weight
18. Exhibitors will weigh their own animals and will be subject to a weigh back. Hogs will be weighed by a superintendent.
 - a. 5% shrink allowed for beef
 - b. 5 pound variation for goats and sheep
19. All animals must have health papers that comply with current health regulations

SEWARD COUNTY 5-STATE LIVESTOCK FAIR RULES

Liability: Under Kansas Law, there is no liability for an injury to or the death of a participant in domestic animal activities resulting from the inherent risks of domestic animal activities, pursuant to K.S.A. 60-4001 through 60-4004. Exhibitors and

their associates assume all risk of participating in this animal activity. Exhibitors are responsible to maintain insurance to cover any loss to persons or property which may occur as a result of competition.

Interpretation: The Seward County 5-State Fair Board, through its management, makes all rules and regulations. A committee of livestock department superintendents will arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard there to, or otherwise arising out of any connection with, or incident pertaining to the Fair. (All 4-H and FFA participants are also governed by the rules and policies of the Director of K-State Research and Extension.) Constructive concerns and appeals regarding the 4-H division should be directed to the superintendents committee. The rules of all Breed associations. Department rules, IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics and all applicable Kansas State Statutes are in force and the Seward County 5-State Fair Rules. Violation of these rules will result in penalties. When no rule appears to cover the situation, the department superintendent will ask the superintendents committee to make a rule and define its application to the situation.

Livestock Health Requirements: By The State Animal Health Commissioner

All required tests must be conducted by a state-approved laboratory. All animals are subject to examination by officials of the Kansas Animal Health Department or those designated by the exhibition staff, and shall be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease. Animals with lesions of ringworm, warts or infested with mange as determined by officials of the Kansas Animal Health Department or exhibition staff will not be permitted to exhibit. All animals, except steers and spayed heifers, must be individually identified by official breed registration tattoo or tag, USDA metal ear tag, or ear notch. All out of state animals must be accompanied by a health certificate issued within (30) days of exhibit and must be available to the officials of the Kansas Animal Health Department or fair management. Health papers will be checked at weigh-in. Exhibitors are required to fit their own animals, but members of the immediate family, Ag Instructors, County Agents, Community Club and Project Leaders that are registered with the Extension Office may observe and assist in the preparation of animals for the show with the exhibitor present and helping. Grooming and fitting by any others will not be allowed. Open to 4-H and FFA members only. Enforcement will be overseen by department superintendents and members of the superintendents committee. Seward County 4-H youth have the option to re-weigh for 5-State Fair Show.

Withdrawal times for drugs, growth promotants and other approved materials: Exhibitors, their parents, leaders and instructors have a serious responsibility to use animal health aids (drugs), growth promotants and any other approved materials with great care, and only when needed and in correct amounts. Approved withdrawal times are set and must be followed to assure meat customers receive wholesome food. **Market Livestock will not** be allowed to show without a completed certificate signed by an exhibitor and parent or guardian. **All exhibitors must have completed Livestock Quality Assurance. The class will be available on Wednesday, if an exhibitor requires.**

Horses: All horses must be accompanied by a health

certificate issued within (30) days of exhibit and a VS 10-11 form indicating a negative EIA (coggins) test within the previous twelve months. Foals, six months of age and younger, accompanying their negative testing dams, are exempt from EIA test requirements. These two papers must be made available to officials of the Kansas Animal Health Department at inspection prior to entering Fairgrounds or upon request. A valid "Horse Passport" may be used in lieu of a health certificate. If a passport is used, a negative EIA test within 6 months is required.

Sheep: Sheep must be free of any signs of sore mouth and ringworm including club lamb fungus. Sexually intact (ewes & rams) must be identified with an official USDA premise ID tag. A health certificate is not required for sheep originating in Kansas. Must have a scrapie tag.

Goats: Goats must be free of signs of sore mouth and ringworm. Sexually intact (does & bucks) must be identified with a registration tattoo or an official USDA premise ID tag. Must have a scrapie tag.

Swine: Kansas is at stage V in the National Pseudorabies Program and swine brucellosis free. No testing for these diseases is required for Kansas swine. Out of state swine must originate from a pseudorabies stage IV or V state or show evidence on the health certificate that swine have tested negative for pseudorabies (by serum neutralization) and brucellosis within 30 days and that the herd of origin has had no positive cases of pseudorabies within 12 months. **Call (785)296-2329 for prior shipping papers for out of state swine.**

Cattle (Kansas): Kansas is brucellosis and tuberculosis free; no tests are required.

Cattle (Out of State): Female cattle eighteen months of age and older must meet one of the following requirements:

1. Originate from a brucellosis-free state.
2. Originate in and constitute a part of a certified brucellosis-free herd. Herd certification number must be entered on the health certificate.
3. **Present evidence on the health certificate that the animal has been tested negative for brucellosis by an approved state/federal laboratory within 30 days of exhibit.**
4. **All heifers, including official cal hood vaccinates that are springers (expected to calve within two weeks) or have calved, are test eligible, regardless of age.**
5. **Cattle, except steers and spayed heifers, six months or older, not originating from a tuberculosis-free state, tested negative for tuberculosis.**

Cattle originating from Texas, New Mexico, California and Michigan, six months and older, used for breeding, must have a negative Tuberculosis test within 90 days prior to arrival.

All livestock must be inspected at check-in and health papers will be checked at that time.

PROTEST for Livestock Exhibitions: Any person may protest the qualification or eligibility of any competing person, animal or object submitted for competition and showing in any pertinent class or event to the Seward County Fair Board by following the procedure below.

1. **All protests must be made in writing. Such protests must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal, and**

must be submitted to the Department Superintendent within 24 hours following the occasion for the protest, accompanied by a \$50 cash deposit. The deposit will be forfeited if the protest is overruled.

2. Upon receipt of a qualified protest, the Superintendent of the department will promptly notify the person against whom the protest was made, the superintendent of the department for the class or event, appropriate Fair Board Representatives, and other parties who have relevant information to the protest. The notice will give a time and place for a hearing to address the protest.

3. The superintendents committee is authorized to act upon any protest. If the protest involves 4-H or FFA competition, the superintendents committee will also include representation from the respective department.

4. When a protest is either allowed or denied, the course of action shall be entered in writing, and a copy delivered to the protestant and the person against whom the protest was made. In the event that a timely protest is properly filed before judging, and a decision is delayed until after judging, the judges will be informed by the superintendent to place a conditional reserve award upon the winning entry.

5. Premiums and awards will be properly distributed when final decision on the protest is made. The superintendent committee reserves the right to institute further restrictions upon the person/persons upon whom the protest was made. These restrictions could include, but not limited to disqualification from future participation at the Seward County 5-State Fair.

STATEMENT OF ANIMAL CARE: The Seward County 5-State Fair is the show place for animal agriculture for the area. All animals and livestock shown, housed, or displayed shall receive care that is consistent with accepted animal husbandry practices, and the rules and regulations set by the Seward County 5-State Fair Board. Professional veterinary service will be available as needed. Animals experiencing illness, injury, or discomfort should be properly treated. Exhibits shall reflect the care and concern that we have for livestock, poultry, companion animals, and wildlife. All owners or persons in charge of property or livestock will care for, guard, protect, and preserve, as Seward County 5-State Fair does not undertake to do so and will not be held responsible for any loss, shrinkage, or damage to said property or livestock of the winners or exhibitors. At the discretion of superintendents and/or the Seward County Five State Fair Board, unethically treated livestock and/or animals will be removed from the fair grounds. At that time, a decision will be made regarding future participation of the Seward County Fair or the Seward County Five State Fair.

VIOLATION OF RULES/REGULATIONS: Any exhibitor not complying with the Seward County 5-State Fair rules, regulations, and requirements, may be denied entry, participation and facility usage. The Department Superintendent is responsible for the enforcement of any rule, regulation or requirement that is designed to present a quality, legal, publicly safe and acceptable, traditional show that is in keeping with acceptable fair exhibiting practices. Industry (IAFE), association, and breed practices will also be part of the Seward County 5-State Fair's requirements. In the event of an apparent violation, the Superintendent will immediately notify the Superintendents Committee of the situation and an assessment will be conducted to insure a decision will ultimately be made in the best interest of the

Seward County 5-State Fair. It will be the Superintendent's responsibility to advise and approve the decision made by the Competitive Exhibit's Director and the Department Superintendent. Should the exhibitor choose to contest the decision of the superintendent, a protest may be submitted to the Seward County 5-State Fair Board through the procedure outlined earlier.

UNETHICALLY FITTED LIVESTOCK: The showing of unethically fitted livestock, the showing of livestock of any ineligible age for exhibition in the class entered, or the misrepresentation of breeding or milking status is prohibited. Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of changing the normal conformation of any part of the animals' body or using drugs, including over the counter and/or extra-label, or mechanical devices to alter the physical makeup and/or performance of the animal. This includes but is not limited to the following:

- a. **Treating or massaging any part of the animal's body, internally or externally, with an irritant, counterirritant, or other substance to alter conformation.**
- b. **Minimizing the effects of cramping by feeding or injecting drugs and depressants or applying packs or using any artificial contrivance or therapeutic treatment except normal exercise.**
- c. **Blocking the nerves to prevent limping or switching of the tail.**
- d. **Striking the animal to cause swelling in a depressed area.**
- e. **Surgery or other practices performed to change the natural contour or appearance of the animal's body, hide, or hair, except the removal of warts or horns and the permitted clipping and dressing of hair and trimming of hooves.**
- f. **Insertion of foreign material under the skin.**
- g. **Changing the color of hair at any point, spot or area on the animals' body. Any grooming material that allows color to come off from any animal will not be allowed at the show.**
- h. **The act of artificially filling animals internally.**
- i. **The use of alcoholic or carbonated beverages in the feed or administered as a drench.**
- j. **The use of diuretics.**
- k. **Ethical use of wholesome and reasonable animal husbandry practices such as electrolyte drench in hot weather may be exercised.**

If drugs are used by an Official Show Veterinarian to treat a recognized disease in market animals, the withdrawal times listed by the drug manufacturer will be strictly followed.

All exhibitors are responsible for security of their own animal(s) until they depart for their final destination (processing/ranch). All exhibitors agree to submit any animal, breeding and/or market, entered by him/her to inspection by any veterinarian appointed by the Seward County 5-State Fair and agree to have such animal submitted to such tests as may be requested at any time. Seward County 5-State Fair also reserves the right to have ultrasound, DNA, blood and/or urine laboratory analysis made on any animal entered for competition. The exhibitor, including his or her parent or guardian or FFA Advisor or CEA for Junior exhibitors, must be present during the collection for testing and must witness, seal and sign the sample; thus verifying the sample to be properly collected and prepared for analysis. The analysis of the veterinarian shall be final

and conclusive without recourse against Seward County Fair or any officer, or employee thereof or any veterinarian as appointed by the Fair Board. The exhibitor waives any right of action which he might have for any action taken under this rule, and releases Seward County 5-State Fair and the veterinarian from any and all claims or demands whatsoever in connection with the inspection or testing of any such animal or any ruling or action taken by reason of the conclusion of such veterinarian.

As breeding animals are not entering the food chain, the USDA Wholesome Meat Act does not apply.

Wholesome Assurance Statement

Attention:

The use by non-veterinarians* of animal drugs or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by the FDA is a violation of federal law. *Note: Abuse of the extra-label privilege by veterinarians is unethical and is subject to serious consequences such as license revocation.

Any food animal must not exceed FDA/EPA/USDA - established tolerances for any foreign substance including drugs, pesticides, feed additives or other chemical. Violated results of residue testing are subject to investigation by the USDA and FDA for prosecution.

Any misrepresentation of a food animal that can potentially affect the acceptability of the carcass or milk will be considered fraud.

Herdsmanship Contest

Eligible participants of the Herdsmanship Contest are Seward County Livestock participants. Exhibitors are encouraged to house animals at the fairgrounds. Judging will take place throughout the day of the show, and the winner will be notified after. Judging will be on an individual basis, unless siblings are stalled together, then they will be judged together. Winner(s) will be awarded \$50. The following is judging criteria for the Herdsmanship Contest.

1. Safety

animals are properly tied, penned or caged (quick release knots on all tied animals); animal had a secure neck rope; cages and stall doors properly secured; animals not tangled in ropes or leads; walk ways clear of any obstructions; pitchforks, rakes, shovels and brooms stored with point safely away; ropes, halters and leads stored away to prevent tripping

2. Management

cleanliness - clean bedding for animals; area free of trash; manure is removed frequently
neatness - overall visual appearance; storage of supplies and equipment is attractive
bedding - free of manure and urine; bedding is confined to the area of the animals and not the walkway
animal care and handling - feed and water clean if present; no empty buckets or feed pans with animals; animals are clean; the handler works quietly and calmly; animals are moved with care for public safety
courtesy to public and fellow 4-H members - polite to members and public; no inappropriate language

or actions; members willing to educate the public

Then roll the sleeve up and tack the lower edge about 1/2-inch from the fold. This will leave enough room to insert a rod without distorting the front of the quilt. The sleeve may be made from fabric matching the back, with any long strip of fabric, or the top hem of a discarded bed sheet.
