INDIANA STATE FAIR GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

All emergencies, safety concerns and suspicious activity should be reported immediately to the Indiana State Fair Operations Center at (317) 927-7520.

Prohibited Items

- No alcoholic beverages may be brought on to the Fairgrounds during the annual Indiana State Fair.
- No person in possession of a deadly weapon shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fair-grounds, unless that person can demonstrate that the deadly weapon is intended for sale or trade at an event that is taking place on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(b)).
 - The definition of a deadly weapon includes firearms, knives or sharp bladed items (regardless of blade length), or any object carried or possessed with the intent to be used as a deadly weapon.
 - Exhibitors will be permitted to carry and use knives and other tools necessary for the proper care of their animals, tack, and equipment. However, these items may only be carried within the confines of the barn in which the animal(s) is housed. Knives and other tools carried outside of the barn are subject to confiscation under the deadly weapon rules found in the Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2.
- Any deadly weapon found in the possession of a person while on the Fairgrounds is subject to immediate confiscation by persons authorized to provide security protection services as well as city, county, and state police agencies. Federal, state, or local law enforcement officers or those employed or authorized by the Indiana State Fair Commission are excepted from this rule (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2 (a), (c), and Section 11-2-3 (1) and (2)).
- Any person properly licensed to carry a firearm must secure the firearm in a locked compartment of his/her vehicle and it shall not be visible to passersby (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-2(d)).
- No generators (not attached to a working/in transit RV/trailer/living quarters) or animal scales are permitted on the Fairgrounds except those furnished by the State Fair.

Animal Policies & Procedures

- The only animals permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair are: animals registered, boarded or entered for exhibition, show or other competition; animals that will be used in a scheduled performance or to perform work at the Fair; law enforcement animals and service animals. Household and family pets, whether domestic or wild, and service animals not recognized by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Section 36.104 are not permitted on the Fairgrounds during the Indiana State Fair. No person in possession of or having control over an unauthorized animal shall be permitted onto or be permitted to remain on the Fairgrounds (Indiana Administrative Code, Title 80, Section 11-2-4).
- Animals entered for exhibition, show or competition and animals scheduled to perform must remain in approved areas at all times. Violation may be disqualifiable offenses. See individual department terms and conditions for more specific information.

General Safety Policies & Procedures

- Smoking is not permitted inside barns and buildings. Smoking is only permitted in designated areas on the Fair-grounds.
- Cameras are located throughout the Fairgrounds for security and promotional purposes.
- Motorized vehicles, including golf carts, are not permitted in any barns or buildings (IFC 313.1). This does not apply to personal mobility devices. A valid State issued driver's license is required to operate a motorized vehicle including a golf cart on the Fairgrounds.
- Fans are permitted, so long as they have safety-approved shrouds. See individual department requirements pertaining to size, allowable number, and placement of fans.

Tents, Canopies, & Stall Coverings

- Any tent, canopy, or stall covering in a building must be made of a material to allow for or not block water distribution as well as meet or exceed NFPA Standard 701.
- A portable fire extinguisher must be located under each tent, canopy, or covering.

Fire Safety

- The Indiana State Fire Marshal's Office conducts regular inspections of all barns and buildings during the Indiana State Fair to identify any potential fire hazards or threats to life safety. The decisions of the fire marshal are final and will be enforced.
- Fire extinguishers are located throughout every barn and building. They may be used for approved purposes only. Do not use a fire extinguisher if you are not trained on its proper use.
- Most buildings and barns are equipped with fire alarm and/or fire suppression systems. In the event of a fire, these systems should be activated.
- Emergency exits are clearly marked in all barns and buildings. In the event of an emergency, calmly evacuate through the nearest accessible emergency exit.
- Do not store tack/supplies in primary aisle or in front of exit doors.

Severe Weather

- In the event of severe weather impacting the Fairgrounds, be it a severe thunderstorm or tornado, you may receive instructions over the barn or building public address system. If the barn or building is not equipped with a public-address system, State Fair staff will notify people in person.
- During a severe weather situation, you will be asked to remain inside, away from windows and doors whenever possible. Staff may be instructed to close all doors and windows, including overhead doors.
- Larger barns and buildings will be used for shelter-in-place (points of refuge) to allow Fairgoers to seek shelter. This may cause an influx of people into livestock areas and result in the postponement of a show or exhibition. Exhibitors should be mindful of this, keep aisles and walkways clear, and tend to their animals accordingly.

Food Preparation/Cooking Policies & Procedures

- Cooking inside and adjacent to barns and buildings is not advised. The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity plan recommends that food be excluded from animal areas. If cooking and/or food preparation is necessary, the following policies and procedures must be followed:
 - o Cooking devices that use open flames, including charcoal and gas grills, exposed heating elements and non-electric power/ fuel sources are not permitted inside or outside barns or buildings.
 - Approved cooking devices are limited to crockpots, or similar slow cookers, and microwave ovens.
 Cooking devices must have a cover approved for use with the device and comply with all applicable electrical and fire codes. Cooking devices are also required to be powered by approved cords that are not frayed or malfunctioning in any way.
 - Exhibitors cooking in the barns and buildings do so at their own risk and assume all liability for their actions concerning food contamination from pathogens that may be present in or near a livestock area.

Extension Cords

- Extension Cords shall not be a substitute for permanent wiring. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Extension Cords shall not be affixed to structures. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.5)
- Extension Cords shall not be buried under carpet or animal bedding.

Multi-plug Adapter/Power Strip

- Multi-plug adapter(s) are prohibited. IFC 2012 (605.4)
- Power strip(s) shall be grounded and be equipped with overcurrent protection. IFC 2012 (605.4.1)
- Power strip shall be directly connected to an electrical outlet (no piggy-backing). IFC 2012 (605.4.2)
- Power strip cords shall not extend through walls, ceilings, doorways, or floors. IFC 2012 (605.4.3)

Animal Wellness & Care

The Animal Wellness & Care Plan (AWAC) was established to reinforce the Indiana State Fair's commitment and belief in the proper treatment of all animals in exhibition. The Indiana State Fair holds exhibitors of the various species of animals being exhibited to the highest standards in wellness, care and ethics of exhibition. The AWAC is responsible for ensuring the most up to date standards as well as to be a source for the public to seek answers to their questions relating to the health and safety of the animals involved in the Indiana State Fair. Failure or refusal by an exhibitor or fairgoer to comply with the Animal Wellness & Care Plan can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

Biosecurity

The Indiana State Fair Biosecurity Plan was developed to prevent the outbreak of diseases carried by both animals and humans that spread pathogens that can be transmitted to and from farm animals, as well as through the food supply. Many diseases and pathogens can be prevented through maintaining the cleanliness of facilities and encouraging good hygiene. The Biosecurity Plan will be enforced during the Indiana State Fair and all exhibitors are expected to carryout and preform basic biosecurity and hygienic task including:

- Hand Washing/sanitizing following exposure to animals and always before consuming food or drinks
- Excluding human food and food preparation from animal areas
- Maintaining general cleanliness of animals and animal areas
- Properly disposing of animal waste/soiled bedding in properly identified/designated areas
- Cleaning-up after your animal if it soils/has a biological event in a building/Fair common space
- Reporting the appearance or evidence of animal/human sickness or distress to Fair officials

Failure or refusal to comply with the above can result in penalties up to and including but not limited to removal and a ban from the Fairgrounds for the duration of the event.

The Indiana State Fair is committed to providing opportunities for all 4-H participants to show their animals as part of the State Fair. The State Fair also wants to ensure the integrity of its 4-H competitions as is evidenced by the various terms and conditions set forth in this Entry Book, including its policy with respect to testing for unauthorized substances in certain animals that are entered into these competitions and the penalties associated with positive results. By entering into these competitions, you agree to these terms and conditions and as such, we strongly recommend that you read this information carefully prior to submitting your entry.

All exhibitors should be familiar with and must abide by the terms and conditions of the Indiana State Fair. Failure to do so may result in loss of the privilege to exhibit at the State Fair and/or ejection from the Fairgrounds.

4-H COMPETITIONS GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

General Principles

- 1. By submitting an Indiana State Fair Entry Form or online entry, 4-H Exhibitors agree to all Terms & Conditions.
 - a. Exhibitors entered under one account are also responsible and held accountable to all Terms and Conditions.
- 2. The Indiana State Fair is fully committed to ensuring integrity in all 4-H Competitions. As such, there is No Tolerance for any violation of Terms & Conditions; intent is not relevant (i.e., strict liability) and any determined violations including testing results are final and binding. 4-H Exhibitors should expect that any animal exhibit may be tested at any time while on the Fairgrounds or at harvest.
- 3. The Indiana State Fair is fully committed to carrying out the Animal Wellness & Care Plan and ensuring the proper treatment of all animal exhibits. Therefore, sick animals shall not be exhibited because of the risk to the animal exhibit, other animal exhibits, the 4-H Exhibitor, other 4-H Exhibitors, other persons, and the integrity of 4-H Competitions. Based on Animal Wellness & Care Plan, the Indiana State Fair Board, the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension and his/her designee, Livestock Director and his/her superior, Department Superintendent and State Fair Veterinarians, may prohibit an animal exhibit from showing at their sole discretion.

Care Of Animal Exhibits

- 4. 4-H Exhibitors are completely responsible for the care and custody of animal exhibits at the Indiana State Fair.
- 5. 4-H Exhibitors may receive clipping and grooming assistance from members of their immediate family (father, mother and siblings), from a current Indiana 4-H member, and from individuals enrolled in the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program. Temporary guardianships established for the intent of animal exhibition or grooming purposes are not permitted and shall result in immediate disqualification.
 - a. State Fair and 4-H officials reserve the right to request identification from any individual grooming any animal(s), ID refusal and violations to the policy may result in the disqualification of an animal entry.
 - b. To access the Indiana 4-H Approved Animal Grooming Assistance Program go online to: http://bit.ly/animalgroominglist.
- 6. Ownership of the animal exhibits passes from the 4-H Exhibitors or their families to the Indiana State Fair Commission when the Indiana State Fair Commission takes possession of the animal exhibits for harvesting.

Drug & Alterations Testing/Examination Principles

- 8. The Indiana State Fair 4-H Animal Testing Program protects the integrity of the Indiana State Fair, 4-H Competitions and the food supply. At no time shall animal exhibits have any substance present, alteration or tissue anomalies that:
 - a. Violates standards established by the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA).
 - b. Violates standards established by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Should testing results reveal non label compound use, consideration may be given if credible veterinary disclosure or testimony accompanied by credible documentation citing appropriate exercise of the Animal Medicinal Drug Use Clarification Act of 1994 (AMDUCA) within an existing Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship (VCPR) at the time of treatment is provided in a timely manner when requested by State Fair officials before, not after an Appeal Process as outlined in General Terms & Conditions 34-50 has been initiated and is recorded and present on the exhibit's Animal Affidavit.
 - c. Is determined by the Purdue University Meat Lab Manager or State or Federal Meat Inspectors to be unacceptable for human consumption either during or post-harvest.
 - d. Provides any potential performance enhancing quality or any potential showing advantage including but not limited to tampering, altering, or misrepresenting any exhibit; coloring that alters or misrepresents breed characteristics [except as allowed in 4-H Beef Cattle, 4-H Sheep, and 4-H Meat Type Goats]; pumping air or other substances to alter conformation; methods to induce artificial fill; performing surgical and/or non-surgical procedures to alter the animal's configuration or natural conformation of any part of the animal's body; and unethical fitting. The following generally accepted management practices are allowed: hoof trimming, dehorning, removal of hair, castration, branding, tattooing, ear notching, and docking of tails.
- 9. Treatment of Acute Injury Policy for 4-H Animal Exhibits at the 2020 ISF. In the event that an animal suffers an acute injury, it is permissible for the animal to be treated with FDA approved medications. An ISF veterinarian must administer all treatments. The determination of the time of injury and its impact on the animal is solely based on the evaluation and diagnosis of the attending ISF veterinarian. For market animals, all withdrawal times must be completed prior to the start of the show. Failure to meet this withdrawal time requirement shall disqualify an animal from exhibition. Non-market animals are exempt from withdrawal times being completed by time of show with the exception of any breeding females which may be loaded on market trucks at the ISF.
- 10. The use by non-veterinarians (exhibitor or otherwise) of animal compounds or other substances in any manner other than in accord with the labeling approved by FDA is a violation of federal law and individuals found to be in violation may be disqualified and/or ejected from the event at the discretion of event/show management.

Animal Affidavit

- 11. Upon check-in at the State Fairgrounds, an animal affidavit (found at https://www.indianastate-fair.com/p/state-fair/competitions--contests/livestock-information) shall be submitted for all animal exhibits (i.e., market and breeding) in the:
 - a. Beef Cattle Department,
 - b. Dairy Cattle Department,
 - c. Swine Department,
 - d. Sheep Department,
 - e. Dairy Goat Department,
 - f. Boer Goat Department, and
 - g. Meat Goat Department.
- 12. Other Departments (e.g., Horse and Pony) may require animal affidavits at their discretion and as part of drug testing.
- 13. Disclosing drugs and/or alterations on the animal affidavit does not affect the imposition of penalties should there be a violation of the drug testing /examination principles outlined above. Should testing results reveal off/extra label compound use, consideration may be given if credible veterinary disclosure and/or testimony accompanied by credible documentation citing appropriate exercise of the Animal Medicinal Drug Use Clarification Act of 1994 (AMDUCA) within an existing Veterinarian Client Patient Relationship (VCPR) at the time of treatment is provided in a timely manner when requested by State Fair officials before, not after an Appeal Process as outlined in General Terms & Conditions 34-50 has been initiated and is recorded and present on the exhibit's Animal Affidavit. Attaching accompanying veterinary documentation to support any Animal Affidavit claims is recommended.
- 14. Failure to complete the animal affidavit shall result in automatic disqualification and may result in additional imposed penalties as listed below in General Terms & Conditions 41-45.

Veterinary Treatment Of Animal Exhibits

- 15. Upon check-in at the State Fairgrounds, all 4-H Exhibitors irrevocably consent to emergency medical care that may be needed to preserve an animal's life or prevent extreme suffering. 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them hereby waive any claim related to emergency medical care and, to the fullest extent permitted by law, 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them hereby agree to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Indiana State Fair Board, Indiana State Fair Commission, Purdue University, Indiana 4-H Program, Cooperative Extension, the State of Indiana, and respective agencies, affiliates, agents, officers, and employees from all claims and suits including court costs, attorney's fees, and other expenses related to emergency medical care. If the following conditions have been met, the Indiana State Fair is expressly authorized to perform any medical treatment, including but not limited to medical practices/ procedures, administering of medications, surgery, and euthanasia, for an animal in the absence of the 4-H Exhibitor if:
 - a. The 4-H Exhibitor is unreachable after due diligence has been made to contact the 4-H Exhibitor, and
 - b. A State Fair Veterinarian along with the Department Superintendent and Livestock Director determines that the animal's health is in danger and delaying treatment would be detrimental to the animal's life, or that the animal is in extreme pain.
- 16. Only the State Fair Veterinarians may administer drugs to animal exhibits at the Fairgrounds.
- 17. Within 2 hours of treatment, the State Fair Veterinarians shall report all performed treatments to the Department Superintendent on an Indiana State Fair-provided reporting form.

Nonambulatory Deceased Animal Policy

- 18. The Indiana State Fair will not allow the unloading of animals that are nonambulatory (i.e. downer) or unable to walk off the vehicle under their own power. The exception to this policy will be unloading the animal for euthanizing and disposing of the animal. If an animal becomes nonambulatory after arrival at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, then the following policy will be strictly enforced:
 - a. The owner shall immediately notify the Superintendent in charge of that department.
 - b. The Department Superintendent shall immediately notify the State Fair Veterinarian and the Livestock Director about the animal in question and circumstances evolving around how this condition happened.
 - c. The State Fair Veterinarian, the Indiana State Fair Board member assigned to the department, Department Superintendent, the Livestock Director, the Indiana State Fair Executive Director's designee and the owner (or representative) will consult each other to come to the best decision for the animal with the emphasis being for the well-being of the animal. If the animal in question is a 4-H entry, the Director of Extension or their representative will also be advised. Only the persons that are available need to be involved in the decision. If euthanasia is determined to be the best option, this will be at the owner's expense.
 - d. Livestock that becomes nonambulatory after arriving at the Indiana State Fairgrounds must be disposed of or removed for treatment within 12 hours of discovering or receiving notice of the animal's

condition. If the animal is treatable and the above committee agrees, the owner must remove that animal from the Fairgrounds (at the owner's expense) within the 12-hour period.

19. In the event of an animal dying while at the Indiana State Fairgrounds, the animal's owner(s) is/are responsible for removing it from the Fairgrounds. The timetable is as follows, remove from the building or display area within 30 minutes to either their vehicle or a designated location. The owner then has up to three (3) hours to remove the carcass from the grounds to a proper disposal site at the owner's expense. If necessary fair-grounds staff will assist moving the carcass to a designated area/into the owner's vehicle.

Judges & Judging

- 20. The Livestock Director will hire all judges for livestock events. The Livestock Director and the Department Superintendent shall set the time/place for competitions to occur. All competition times are subject to change.
- 21. The Department Superintendent (in consultation with the Livestock Director or Program Manager) shall sanction violations of this General Terms & Conditions 22 27 and the Indiana State Fair Board may impose additional penalties at its discretion. The 4-H Exhibitor may submit a Grievance Form (located in show offices) and may use the Due Process procedure below to appeal a sanction.
- 22. Once a judge had completed judging on a class their decision is final and cannot be changed even at the judges request once a judge moves on to evaluate a different class.
- 23. 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them shall treat officials and judges with respect. 4-H Exhibitors shall not interfere/attempt to interfere with or influence/attempt to influence a Judges' decision.
- 24. Judges shall report directly to the Department Superintendent upon arrival on the Fairgrounds and shall avoid any attempt by 4-H Exhibitors and any person affiliated with them to interfere with and/or influence the Judges' decision.
- 25. Any exhibit not presented promptly when called shall be disqualified.
- 26. Regardless of multiple competitors, Judges shall not award and the Indiana State Fair reserves the right not to award prizes/premiums to unworthy and/or improperly entered exhibits.
- 27. Competition placings are not official until all carcass examination, animal testing, re-weighing, and animal verifications are complete.
- 28. 4-H Exhibitors may appeal a Judge's decision only by alleging either that a specific and applicable Term & Condition was violated, or that the Judge's decision was improperly influenced. 4-H Exhibitors appealing a Judge's decision shall describe relevant facts and their proof (e.g., witnesses) as well as give verbal notice to the Department Superintendent, Livestock Director, Indiana State Fair Executive Producer or his/her designee, or the Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension or their designee within two (2) hours of the alleged infraction.
- 29. Within twenty-four (24) hours of the competition's completion, 4-H Exhibitors appealing a Judge's decision shall personally present a Grievance Form (found at https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair/competitions--contests/livestock-information) complying with the requirements of General Term & Condition 35 to the Indiana State Entry Office. No other persons have standing to present a Grievance Form.
- 30. Within 30 days of receiving the Grievance Form, the Executive Director or their designee or Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service or their designee/s shall notify the 4-H Exhibitor in writing of their validity determination and/or denial reasoning along with any actions taken as a result.
- 31. The 4-H Exhibitor submitting the Grievance Form shall use the Due Process procedure below to appeal.

Grievance Procedure

- 32. Within twenty-four (24) hours of observing any suspected infraction, 4-H Exhibitors competing in a 4-H competition shall personally present a Grievance Form (found https://www.indianastatefair.com/p/state-fair/com-petitions--contests/livestock-information) to the State Fair Entry Office. No other persons have standing to present a Grievance Form.
- 33. If a Grievance Form is presented after judging for a competition has begun, the judging shall proceed, and the Grievance Form will be considered following the judging.
- 34. Within 30 days of receiving the Grievance Form, the Executive Director's designee and/or Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service or their designee shall notify the 4-H Exhibitor in writing of their validity determination and/or denial reasoning along with any actions taken as a result.
- 35. The 4-H Exhibitor submitting the Grievance Form shall use the Due Process procedure below to appeal.

Determination and Interpretation Principles

- 36. The Indiana State Fair Board and the Director of the Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service and their designees:
 - a. Shall act to ensure integrity in all 4-H Competitions and penalize Terms & Conditions violations, fraud, deception, and improper/unethical activities,
 - b. Have the final authority to interpret all Terms & Conditions and make determinations at their discretion,

- c. May resolve any unforeseen matters in their sole discretion, and
- d. May amend or add to these Terms & Conditions and/or withdraw all premium offerings in any Departments should they determine that an emergency exists and/or circumstances require such action.

Indiana State Fair Board Due Process, Determinations, Penalties and Appeals

- 37. The Indiana State Fair Commission is the final authority for all actions relating to programs funded through it.
- 38. When a Terms & Conditions violation is reported, the Executive Director's designee and the Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service shall investigate and determine whether a violation has occurred and either may seek assistance, guidance and vet any questions via the Indiana State Fair Board or the Indiana State Fair 4-H Animal Testing Program Advisory Committee.
- 39. Upon determining a Terms & Conditions violation has occurred, the Executive Director's designee and the Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service may adjust, amend or impose a penalty, sanction, disqualify, ban from future competition, assign alternative penalties or dismiss from violation any exhibitor or project determined to be in violation. These determination decisions may extend to a 4-H Exhibitor's immediate family. No action of the family or exhibitor shall affect the timeline or process for the appeal Ind Code 4-21.5-3 et seq (the Administrative Orders and Procedures Act, AOPA)
- 40. 4-H Exhibitors whose animal exhibit tests positive for any substance in violation of General Term and Condition 8a shall be subject to the following penalties:
 - a. First Offense
 - i. Disqualification of that animal exhibit from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with that animal exhibit.
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with that animal exhibit,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the animal exhibit being awarded 4-H Champion Award.
 - b. Second Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award, and
 - v. Ban from competing in the Indiana State Fair for the following year.
 - c. Third Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award, and
 - v. Lifetime ban from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
- 41. 4-H Exhibitors whose animal exhibit test positive for any substance or are determined to be in violation of General Term and Condition 8b, 8c, or 8d shall be subject to the following penalties
 - a. First Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award,
 - v. Ban from competing in the Indiana State Fair for the following 2 years, and
 - vi. Forfeiture of any proceeds from an animal exhibit awarded premiums from the Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions (the Indiana State Fair Board shall withhold proceeds and shall donate the entire sum to the Indiana State Fair Foundation).
 - b. Second Offense
 - i. Disqualification of the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair,
 - ii. Forfeiture of all entry and other fees associated with the exhibitor,
 - iii. Forfeiture of all monetary awards associated with the exhibitor,
 - iv. Forfeiture from the exhibitor being awarded 4-H Champion Award,
 - v. Forfeiture of any proceeds from an animal exhibit awarded premiums from the Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions (the Indiana State Fair Board shall withhold proceeds and shall donate the entire sum to the Indiana State Fair Foundation), and
 - vi. Lifetime ban from exhibiting at the Indiana State Fair.
- 42. The Executive Director's designee and the Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service reserve the right to assess additional penalties beyond those listed.
- 43. The Indiana State Fair Board may notify the International Association of Fairs and Expositions and the North American Livestock Stock Show and Rodeo Managers Association (NALSRMA) of any decision related to their National Code of Show Ring Ethics including but not limited to addition to the NALSRAMA Rule Infraction Database (RID) List.

- 44. The Indiana State Fair Board may be required to notify the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and/or the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) of any finding that violates applicable regulations.
- 45. Within 15 days of the violation determination, the Executive Director's designee and/or Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service shall notify the 4-H Exhibitor in writing of the violation determination and imposed penalty. For violations not involving 8a or 8b the exhibitor may appeal the decision in writing to the Indiana State Fair Board within 15 days of the determination of a violation. Within 15 days of receipt of the written appeal the Executive Directors designee or Director of Purdue University Cooperative Extension may rescind their initial determination.
- 46. The 4-H Exhibitor may request an appeal hearing for the violation determination and/or imposed penalty. The Indiana State Fair Board must receive the 4-H Exhibitor's written request for hearing appeal within 18 days of the initial violation determination letter being sent.
- 47. Upon timely receipt of the 4-H Exhibitor's written hearing request, the Indiana State Fair Board will set a date for the appeal hearing. The 4-H Exhibitor will be notified in writing at least 15 days prior to the hearing date.
- 48. The State Fair Board shall appoint a hearing panel, an Administrative Law Judge may be appointed, to conduct an appeal hearing, which shall be public meeting under Indiana's Open Door Law. Indiana Code chapter 5-14-1.5.
- 49. Within 15 days of the hearing's conclusion, the Presiding Officer shall send a written notice to both the 4-H Exhibitor and the Indiana State Fair Board concerning the hearing panel's findings and recommended order
- 50. Upon receipt of the Presiding Officer's recommended order, the Indiana State Fair Board shall adopt a final determination at its next regularly scheduled meeting, which shall be a public meeting under Indiana's Open Door Law.
- 51. The 4-H Exhibitor may file written objections to the Indiana State Fair Board. Within 15 days of the Indiana State Fair Board meeting's conclusion, the Indiana State Fair Board shall send a written notice of its final determination to the 4-H Exhibitor.
- 52. The issuance of the Indiana State Fair Board's final determination concludes the Administration Review.
- 53. Any judicial review shall take place in a competent court situated in Marion County, Indiana.

4-H Determinations

54. Independently, the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension or his/her designee may assess penalties under 4-H Policies and is the final authority for all actions pertaining to the statewide policies and programs of Indiana 4-H, including but not limited to eligibility determinations for competitions

Premises ID

55. The Indiana State Fair requires all Indiana Exhibitors to provide the Indiana State Board of Animal Health required Premises ID number on all entry forms for beef and dairy cattle, goats, swine and sheep. Indiana exhibitors of horses, poultry, Ilamas and alpacas as well as out of state exhibitors will be requested to voluntarily provide Premises ID numbers. To obtain a Premises ID #, please contact the Indiana State Board of Animal Health at 877-747-3038. Information can be found on the Indiana State Board of Animal Health website at www.in.gov/boah.

4-H Substitute Showman

56. 4-H exhibitors having an entry in animal classes at the State Fair must show their own animals. In cases where this cannot be done, the owner may request another Indiana 4-H member to serve as a substitute showman. Substitute showmen **must** be approved in writing by the 4-H show manager 24 hours prior to the showing of the animal(s) needing a substitute showman. Requests will only be granted for medical emergencies, conflicts with showing other animals, or circumstances deemed unavoidable by the 4-H show manager. Failure to be excused from a job and/or participation in a sporting event or sports practice will <u>not</u> result in a substitute showman being granted.

Supreme 4-H Livestock Showmanship

57. The champion and reserve champion senior beef showmen, champion senior barrow showman, champion senior gilt showman, the champion senior market lamb showman and champion senior breeding ewe showman, champion senior meat goat wether & wether dam showman and the champion senior meat goat breeding doe showman will compete for the title of Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman. The winner will be declared the Indiana State Fair Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman and will receive a \$500 award. Once a 4-H member is declared the Indiana State Fair Supreme 4-H Livestock Showman, they will become ineligible to compete in 4-H beef, sheep, and swine showmanship classes at the Indiana State Fair in future years.

4-H Grand & Supreme Drive

- 58. Should a champion animal become ill/injured or be determined to be unsound and unable to participate in either the Grand or Supreme Drive, the reserve animal of that breed will represent the breed. The Department Superintendent shall inform the judge of the situation prior to judging the Grand/Supreme Champion. The reserve breed champion from the same breed as the Grand Champion is eligible to be selected for the ISF Celebration of Champions.
- 59. Once a market animal is selected for the Celebration of Champions it cannot be withdrawn and will undergo testing and harvest.
- 60. All 4-H Celebration Champions market animals will be transported by the State Fair to the processing harvest site.

- 61. All 4-H Celebration market animal carcasses will remain under the jurisdiction and ownership of the State Fair until such time as all carcass examinations, tissue testing, and/or any other required testing as determined by the State Fair officials or State 4-H Youth Department officials have been completed.
- 62. Monetary awards will not be issued until test results are complete.

Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions

- 62. The 2020 Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions will honor the top five in 4-H market lambs, barrows, beef steers, the Grand Champion Dairy Steer, the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion Meat Goat Wether, the Grand Champion 4-H Commercial Waterfowl, the Grand Champion 4-H Garden Exhibit, the Champion Cache of 4-H Honey, the Grand Champion 4-H Meat Pen of Rabbits, and the Grand Champion 4-H Meat Type Chickens, 4-H Grand Champion Dairy Goat Wether as market projects.
- 63. The 2020 Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions will also honor the 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Beef Heifers, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Gilts, 4-H Supreme, Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Ewes, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Cows, 4-H Supreme Champion and Reserve Supreme Champion Dairy Heifers, 4-H Supreme Champion Full Blood & Supreme Champion Percentage Meat Goat Does, 4-H Grand Champion Meat Goat Wether Dam, 4-H Supreme Champion Sr. & Supreme Champion Jr. Dairy Goat Does, 4-H Best Exhibition in Show Poultry and 4-H Best of Show Rabbits as non-market/breeding projects.
- 64. An exhibitor may only receive one Celebration award per project category (Market and Non-Market), however if an exhibitor is selected for multiple Celebration awards outlined in rules # 62 and # 63 in a Market and Non-Market/Breeding project category they may receive two Celebration awards, one per project category (market and non-market). Exhibitors selected for multiple Celebration honors will automatically receive the largest Celebration award per project category (Market & Non-Market/Breeding).
- 65. The Youth Development and Fundraising Committee reserves the right to eliminate any 4-H animals from the ISF Celebration of Champions which it deems to not be in the best interest of the Indiana State Fair.
- 66. The Indiana State Fair Celebration of Champions Award total monetary amount includes premiums, accomplishment award, and market value price for market animals. Total monetary award amount is based on a formula. Awards will not be given to exhibitors until testing results are complete.
- 67. With regard to ISF Celebration of Champions animals, it is understood that the market animals awarded my upon showing and/or processing have urine, blood, saliva and/or tissue samples taken per the mandatory testing under 4-H General Terms & Conditions and the animal/item may be examined by a panel of licensed and accredited veterinarians. Upon said examination, if in the opinion of the examiners, the animal has been fitted in an unethical manner or tampered with the animal will be disqualified from the ISF Celebration of Champions, all premiums and awards forfeited, and the award proceeds will be withheld by the Indiana State Fair Board and donated to the Indiana State Fair Foundation.
- 68. Exhibitors of reserve 4-H breed champion market animals not selected for the Celebration must take their animal home.
- 69. The ownership of a market animal or an exhibit receiving an ISF Celebration of Champion award is maintained by the exhibitor until the conclusion of Grand Drive, Sunday, August 4. The animal or exhibit must be on display until the Transfer of Ownership is signed over to the Indiana State Fair.

Recognized 4-H Breed Participation Policy

70. Recognized Breed Participation/All Other Purebreds: Indiana State Fair recognized breeds (those listed in the current 4-H entry book) are required to have a minimum of five (5 market animals and/or five (5) breeding animals in order to offer breed/gender classes. ISF recognized breeds (those listed in the 4-H entry book) that have fewer than five (5) market and/or breeding animals will show in an AOP (ALL OTHER PUREBRED) class. Regardless of the number of animals in the AOP class, premiums will be offered for AOP division. Champion of the AOP division would be eligible for overall champion. Purebred or composite breeds NOT recognized by the Indiana State Fair 4-H Entry Book will be considered for commercial/crossbred classifications and not be considered for AOP classification. This five (5) head minimum does not apply to exhibition breeds during their two (2) year establishment trail, see 4-H General Terms & Conditions for more information about exhibition breeds.

Establishing New 4-H Breeds In Competition

- 71. The Indiana State Fair must approve a state-affiliate breed association application for a breed show. For proposed 4-H breeds showing for the first time at Indiana State Fair the breed must show for two years and have a minimum of 10 head exhibited in either proposed breed/gender classification. During these two years, the breed will be classified as exhibition only with NO premiums remitted (includes any special program premiums i.e. Indiana Bred). This rule does not apply to any Poultry or Rabbit exhibits.
- 72. To place an established breed of livestock on probation the following shall apply:
- 73. 4-H Breeds will not be placed on probation but rather if minimums are not met exhibited in AOP division.
- 74. The same entry fees shall be paid by all livestock exhibitors regardless of show classification.
- 75. The Indiana State Fair reserves the right make, amend and change any and/or all final breed participation policy determinations based on both exhibitor and entry numbers.
 - * Definition of "breed" includes purebred breeds, composite breeds, divisions, varieties, classifications, etc.
 - * Policy does not apply to any Poultry or Rabbit exhibits.

Loss or Damage

76. It is mutually agreed that the Indiana State Fair assumes no liability for loss to property or by reason of any claim for personal injury, including death. The exhibitor herein agrees to release, discharge and indemnify the State of Indiana, Indiana State Fair Board, Indiana State Fair Commission, its component members, and their successors from liability by reason of injury to property and/or persons, including death, which may occur within or upon the premises herein described in any manner connected with use thereof by exhibitor.

NSF Checks

- 77. A \$35.00 handling charge will be added to all checks returned as non-sufficient funds (NSF).
- 78. Any exhibitor not redeeming a non-sufficient funds check will be ineligible to show and/or forfeit all premiums and awards won.
- 79. An exhibitor with any NSF checks not redeemed by the entry deadline(s) will be assessed all applicable late fees.
- 80. NSF checks are not re-deposited.

Premiums

- 81. Premium Checks will be mailed in October for all departments.
- 82. Premiums will be paid according to official judging result sheets.
- 83. Any exhibitor receiving \$600.00 or more in monetary awards will be required to provide the Indiana State Fair with a completed IRS Form W-9 (W-8BEN for foreign exhibitors) providing a taxpayer identification number. Failure to provide this information will result in the forfeiture of all premium monies. Forms may be obtained at the Barn Offices, at the Entry Office in the Pop Weaver Youth Pavilion or on the IRS website at www.irs.gov..
- 84. Questions and/or discrepancies noted in issued premium checks must be addressed to the Indiana State Fair Entry Department prior to **December 1, 2020** for resolution. Premium records will be considered closed on December 1, 2020. After this date the exhibitor's right of protest is relinquished.

Entry Information

- Online Entry https://exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com/. Online entry requires credit card payment (accepting Visa, MasterCard, Discover, American Express).
- Entry Forms Indiana State Fair entries will not be processed without complete information, proper signatures and appropriate payment. Make sure that all of the information requested is completed correctly. Double check your total fee to make sure your check or money order is correct and enclosed. Previous year's entry forms will not be accepted. Mail in entry forms must be postmarked before or on the deadline day to receive the lower fees, even if deadline day falls on a weekend day or holiday.
- <u>Entry Deadline</u> Please refer to individual departments for entry deadlines.
- Entry Fees Please see individual departments for entry fees.
- Refunds Entry Fees, late fees, processing fees, overpayments and any additional fees will not be refunded. If
 one check pays for more than one 4-H member's entries and any entry is incorrect, the correct entries will be
 processed, and the check will be deposited. The fees for the incorrect entries will be considered an overpayment on the correct entries. The incorrect entries will be returned to the exhibitor. After correction, the entries
 must be returned with entry fee as directed by the Entry Department and will be subject to applicable late
 fees.
- Entry Revisions Substitutions may be made within the same section, unless stated otherwise in departmental terms and conditions, provided the same number of entries is maintained as was entered on the original entry form, (i.e. If eight (8) exhibits are on the original entry form, you are limited to 8 entries, without paying additional fees). If a new section is entered, this is a new entry with all applicable fees. Any exhibit entered on an original entry form may be added any class for which it is eligible. Classes designated as group classes (containing more than one animal) can be entered without additional fees, provided the animals in the group are entered in individual classes.
- <u>Check-in Entries</u> Entries will be accepted at Check-in, unless otherwise stated in departmental deadlines, however, there will be additional late fee(s).
- All 4-H animal exhibitors must be officially enrolled at the county level and subject to verification of county enrollment to be eligible to exhibit at the Indiana State Fair.
- 4-H animals do not need to be county winners to qualify as a State Fair entry; however, exhibitors must have satisfactorily fulfilled the county requirements.
- · No livestock will be released until all fees, including those for veterinary services, have been paid in full.
- <u>Advertising</u> Commercial advertisement, names or insignia, farm names and family names on 4-H exhibitors
 or exhibits while showing is prohibited. An exception is made for 4-H Rabbit Exhibitors due to safety concerns
 (see individual department terms and conditions). Distribution or posting of flyers, advertisements, banners or
 posters are prohibited from being hung in the Barns or Coliseum, Youth Arena or any other building, except
 for those in preapproved areas as directed by a Commission Department Manager.

Exhibitor Admission

- Exhibitor Tickets \$8.00 Tickets can be purchased online on Exhibitor's Corner account.
- All exhibitors entering the Fairgrounds or picking up exhibits on or after Friday, August 7, are required to pay
 admission and parking or have an exhibitor ticket and parking pass to give to the gate attendant or to be
 scanned
- <u>Pass Outs</u> Any exhibitor leaving the Fairgrounds that wishes to return on the same day must obtain a hand stamp from the gate attendant or pay admission to re-enter. This policy will be strictly enforced. Pass outs are not permitted after 8pm.

Assignment Of Stalls

- Assignment of stalls will be made and enforced by department personnel.
- <u>Alteration or removal of stall or pen structures</u> Exhibitors are required to notify and obtain approval from department personnel to alter any assigned stall(s) or pen structure(s), or any part thereof. If an Exhibitor does not seek and obtain such approval, the Exhibitor shall indemnify and hold harmless the Indiana State Fair Board and the Indiana State Fair Commission for any damage to person or property that results from such alteration or removal and penalties may me imposed on the exhibitor. The Indiana State Fair reserves the right to alter, move or revoke stalls on an as needed basis.
- Feed and Bedding of good quality will be available for exhibitors to purchase at reasonable prices. The Indiana State Fair will not furnish these items. The selling of feed or bedding is strictly prohibited, with the exception of the approved Indiana State Fair vendor.

Schedules

- Arrival/Check-in/Show Schedules Please see individual departments for arrival/check-in/show times.
- Exhibitors and animals must arrive before the end of their scheduled check-in time, if animals are entered in another Fair, they may arrive later than the specified arrival time. The Department Superintendent must be notified of this in advance and the Department Superintendent reserves the right to deny entry to any exhibitors and animals that fail to pre-notify.

Loss Or Damage

Campgrounds Terms & Conditions

- Spaces in the Indiana State Fair 46th Street Campgrounds will be reserved on a first come-first served basis. The charge for a camping spot will be \$40.00 per day (this price includes 7% sales tax). In order to reserve a spot, full payment is required in advance. Reservations are required and are made on our website https://www.indianastatefair.com/state-fair/camping-information/ Payment will be taken at the point of reservation. Check-out time is NOON.
- Reservations will not be accepted until May 1, 2020.
- These terms and conditions apply to the 46th Street campground located south of 46th Street. Spaces will be assigned according to trailer length and electrical needs. ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

FOR EXHIBITION OF DOMESTIC ANIMALS IN INDIANA 2020 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

This document describes the Indiana State Board of Animal Health's (BOAH) requirements for all animal exhibitions in the state. HOWEVER, exhibition organizers may impose additional animal health requirements as a condition of entry. BOAH recommends contacting the exhibition organizer for specific information about requirements for each event.

Please call the Indiana State Board of Animal Health at 877-747-3038 with questions concerning animal health requirements.

A. Limitations on Exhibition

This section describes limitations on exhibiting animals in Indiana. Other exhibition limitations may be described in the species-specific requirements that follow.

- Failure to meet all animal health requirements will result in removal of animals from the exhibition premises.
- 2. The following animals are not eligible for exhibition in Indiana:
 - a. Animals that originate from a herd that is under quarantine.
 - b. An animal prohibited from exhibition under any law or order.
 - c. Any animal classified as a brucellosis "suspect".
 - d. Animals showing signs of any infectious or communicable disease or that are a health hazard to people or other animals.
 - e. Any animal that does not meet state animal health requirements.
- 3. Any animal that develops or shows signs of any infectious or communicable disease during exhibition must be removed from the premises, including the surrounding exhibition grounds. An owner who is disputing the exclusion of his/her animal(s) from exhibition may not exhibit the animal in question pending any appeal.

The State Veterinarian is authorized to make the final determination as to an animal's eligibility for exhibition. The state veterinarian may order removal of any animal from the exhibition grounds.

Exhibition organizers may impose health requirements in addition to those prescribed by BOAH. Added requirements may not contradict requirements imposed by BOAH.

Exhibition organizers may have a licensed and accredited veterinarian review animals and animal health documentation during the exhibition.

B. Certificates of Veterinary Inspection

- 1. **For animals that originate in Indiana,** contact the exhibition organizer to determine the certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) requirement, if any. A copy of the CVI for each animal exhibited must be on file at the State Veterinarian's office prior to the opening day of the exhibition.
- 2. For animals that originate outside the state of Indiana, the exhibitor must have a properly completed official certificate of veterinary inspection (commonly known as "health papers") for the animal. This CVI requirement applies to all domestic animals (except for fish).
- 3. A certificate of veterinary inspection on any animal coming from outside Indiana for exhibition in Indiana is valid for 30 days from the date it is issued by a veterinarian.
- 4. Certificates of veterinary inspection accompanying animals for exhibition must be completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian who has personally inspected the animals. CVIs must clearly include a description of each animal including the age, sex, and breed of the animal, and the official, individual identification.
- 5. Out-of-state swine and cattle attending an Indiana exhibition must have a pre-entry permit number noted on the certificate of veterinary inspection. Permits are available online at: http://www.in.gov/boah/2661.htm.
 - a. Certificates of veterinary inspection for all out-of-state swine and cattle going to the Indiana State Fair must have the import permit number for the 2020 Indiana State Fair, "INSF20", written on the certificate.
- 6. Out-of-state poultry and hatching eggs attending an Indiana exhibition must be accompanied by one of the following documents.
 - a. An official certificate of veterinary inspection completed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian within 30 days immediately prior to the animals entering Indiana.
 - If the poultry or hatching eggs are from a flock participating in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP), they may move with the appropriate NPIP inspection/testing/participation certificate or records.
- 7. Out-of-state cervides (reindeer, fallow deer and CWD non-susceptible species) must have a permit approved by BOAH at least 5 business days before the movement. Contact BOAH cervid programs to obtain a pre-entry permit.

C. Identification

All exhibition animals must be permanently and individually identified by an acceptable method. Official ear tags are tags approved by the USDA. Official ear tags must bear the US shield to be considered official identification (official ear tags placed before March 11, 2015 that do not have the US shield will be accepted.) Official identification acceptable for specific species of livestock exhibited in Indiana are as follows:

CATTLE

- 4-H Beef Cattle and All Dairy Cattle: 840 RFID tag
- Open Cattle: 840 tags may or may not be RFID (radio frequency identification), 15 digits, beginning with 840, or
- NUES (brite) tags, steel or plastic, or
- o Official USDA program tags, such as orange calfhood vaccination tags

SHEEP AND GOATS

- Scrapie program flock tags
- Electronic implant (goats only), for breed-registered animals only when noted on registration paperwork
- Tattoo, if accompanied by registration papers with tattoo noted
- Tattoo of the scrapie flock ID number along with an individual animal ID number
- Wethers younger than 18 months of age must bear a unique, permanent ID of any form (not necessarily an official/scrapie tag)

SWINE

o All Swine: 840 RFID tag

HORSES

- Physical description of the animal including: name, age, breed, color, gender, distinctive markings, cowlicks, scars, blemishes, biometric measures, brands, tattoos, etc.
- Digital photographs
- USDA-approved electronic implant (microchip)

LLAMAS/ALPACAS

- o Official ear tag
- Tattoo
- Electronic identification implant (microchip)
- o Digital photographs sufficient to identify the individual animal

ALL OTHER SPECIES

- o Physical description sufficient to identify the individual animal.
- o If any additional identification other than the official identification is present, one of the additional identifications should also be listed on the certificate of veterinary inspection.

D. Testing

All tests required for exhibition must be conducted at the Animal Disease Diagnostic Laboratory (ADDL) at Purdue University, a laboratory approved by the Indiana State Board of Animal Health or a state or federal-approved laboratory.

CATTLE

- 1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
- 2. Cattle from Indiana do not need a brucellosis test or a tuberculosis test for exhibition in Indiana.
- 3. The following **cattle from outside the state** must test negative for **tuberculosis** within 60 days prior to the date of arrival to the exhibition:
 - a. All sexually intact female dairy cattle that are 6 months of age or older that will be sold or otherwise not removed from the state within 10 days of the exhibition event.
 - Cattle from states that are not designated tuberculosis free by USDA must meet additional requirements for entry into Indiana. Contact the Indiana State Board of Animal Health for specific information
- 4. **Cattle from outside the state** do not need a brucellosis test as long as the state of origin is classified as brucellosis free by USDA.

5. All cattle, including Indiana cattle, that are to be offered for sale at an exhibition must have the necessary testing and other requirements completed within 30 days prior to the sale date.

SHEEP AND GOATS

- 1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
- 2. Blankets must be removed from all sheep and goats at the time of arrival.
- 3. All sheep, goat wethers, and market does must be presented slick-shorn for inspection at arrival.
- 4. No sheep or goats may be exhibited that are showing signs of being infected with ringworm.

SWINE

- 1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
- 2. Brucellosis testing
- 4. Swine from Indiana do not need a brucellosis test.
- 5. Swine from outside the state do not need a brucellosis test, as long as the state of origin is classified brucellosis free by USDA. A certificate of veterinary inspection is still required.
 - a. Pseudorabies testing
- 6. Swine from Indiana do not need a pseudorabies test.
- 7. Swine from outside the state do not need a pseudorabies test as long as the state of origin is classified pseudorabies free by USDA. A certificate of veterinary inspection is still required.
 - a. All swine that are to be sold at a breed sale should have a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within **30** days prior to the sale to facilitate interstate movement after the sale.

HORSES

- 1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
- 2. Horses coming from outside Indiana for exhibition in Indiana must meet the following requirements:
 - a. Each horse must test negative for equine infectious anemia (EIA) (a "Coggins test") within 12 months of the date of exhibition. Each horse must be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection that indicates the results of the EIA test.
 - b. A suckling foal accompanying a dam that has tested negative for EIA within 12 months of the exhibition is exempt from the EIA testing requirement.
- 3. The following applies to horses coming from Indiana for in-state exhibition:
 - a. A certificate of veterinary inspection is not required.
 - b. An EIA test is not required.

NOTICE: Indiana state 4-H imposes vaccination requirements for horse show participants beyond the requirements of the Indiana State Board of Animal Health minimum requirements. Check with your local 4-H Purdue Extension educator for those requirements.

LLAMAS/ALPACAS

- 1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.
- 2. No test is required on any llamas or alpacas for exhibition in Indiana.

POULTRY

1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES

- 2. Indiana defines poultry as: chickens, turkeys, ostriches, emus, rheas, cassowaries, waterfowl (domesticated fowl that normally swim, such as ducks, geese and swans), and game birds (domesticated fowl such as pheasants, pea fowl, partridge, quail, grouse, and guineas).
- 3. All poultry presented for exhibition, except waterfowl, must meet **one** of the following requirements:
 - a. Test negative for pullorum-typhoid within 90 days prior to the date of their exhibition.
 - b. Be hatched from eggs originating from certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean flocks.
 - c. Originate from a flock where the entire flock is certified NPIP pullorum-typhoid clean.

DOGS

1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

- 2. Each dog presented for exhibition must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination or other statement, signed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian, that indicates the vaccinations each animal has been given. A certificate of veterinary inspection may be used to document vaccinations but is not required for dogs within Indiana.
- 3. All dogs 3 months of age and older must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law. A certificate of vaccination for rabies must accompany the animal to the exhibition.

NOTICE: Indiana state 4-H imposes vaccination requirements for dog show participants beyond the requirements of the Indiana State Board of Animal Health minimum requirements. Check with your local 4-H Purdue Extension educator for those requirements.

CATS

1. SEE GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL SPECIES.

- 2. Each cat presented for exhibition must be accompanied by a certificate of vaccination or other statement, signed by a licensed and accredited veterinarian, that indicates the vaccinations each animal has been given. A certificate of veterinary inspection may be used to document vaccinations but is not required for cats within Indiana.
- 3. All cats older than 3 months of age must be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed and accredited veterinarian in accordance with the state rabies vaccination law.

NOTICE: Indiana State 4-H imposes vaccination requirements for cat show participants beyond the requirements of the Indiana State Board of Animal Health minimum requirements. Check with your local 4-H Purdue Extension educator for those requirements.

INDIANA 4-H PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY:

The Indiana 4-H program serves the youth of Indiana by providing a strong educational youth development program. This program delivers educational experiences in a variety of settings. Caring, capable, and contributing adults assist in the 4-H program as role models for youth. The rich heritage of the 4-H program is one to be valued and passed along to future generations. This document sets out certain standards and guidelines to assure that 4-H is a positive youth development program. County 4-H policy is guided by the county 4-H policy-making or governing board (i.e., 4-H council) as provided by the County Extension Board. Legal authority for the 4-H program rests with the Director of Cooperative Extension, Purdue University. No county 4-H policy may conflict with state 4-H policy or federal requirements. Deadlines for county and state participation should be carefully constructed so as to encourage rather than to discourage participation. Such deadlines should be well published. Members not complying with established and

published dates and deadlines for exhibition may be denied the opportunity to exhibit. It is the policy of 4-H to be an inclusive organization. No county policy or practice should be used to arbitrarily exclude youth from either membership or participation. Youth should participate in 4-H Youth Development opportunities at levels and times that best suit the youth's development and support family involvement.

4-H MEMBERSHIP:

Youth may become 4-H members when they enter the third grade and may continue their membership through the completion of grade 12. Each individual may continue membership for a maximum of ten (10) consecutive years. An individual's 4-H grade is determined by the school grade in which he or she is classified at the time of year he or she enrolls in 4-H. A member does not advance in 4-H grade until he or she enrolls in 4-H for the subsequent year. Each member should enroll in the division of a project/subject that would best suit his/her interest and potential for personal growth and would enhance their family involvement. Opportunities in the 4-H program are available to all Indiana youth as defined regardless of race, religion, color, sex, age, national origin, marital status, parental status, sexual orientation or disability. Married young men and women of 4-H age may participate in any of the 4-H projects and activities. However, married persons must participate by the same terms and conditions and/or guidelines as unmarried participants. Membership in 4-H is gained by annually enrolling through a Purdue University Cooperative Extension Service Office located in each of Indiana's 92 counties. The Indiana 4-H Youth Development program year is October 1 to September 30 annually. Enrollment is an annual process attained by completing individual 4-H enrollment via the 4HOnline enrollment process. Statewide 4HOnline enrollment occurs annually October 1 through January 15.

COMPLETION:

The completion of a 4-H experience may include a variety of options and must not be misinterpreted solely as exhibition of a project at a local, county, or state fair. There are a number of ways that a young person may participate in the 4-H Youth Development Program in addition to the club-based option. Participating in these 4-H opportunities enable the youth to build skills that will serve them well throughout their adult lives. Some of these participation options do not include the preparation of a specific exhibit by an individual that would be on display at a fair or similar event. In some cases, the youths' actual participation may be the final product that results in their completion of a year of 4-H. Some examples of this participation include working as a team to develop a robot for a workshop or challenge; completing a Spark Club experience; participating in State 4-H Band or Chorus; taking part in a science training or experiment; participating in an after school 4-H experience; etc. 4-H members are considered complete in their 4-H educational experience for the year when they have (1) completed the 4-H member enrollment process prior to the established and published date for enrolling; and (2) had an officially recognized 4-H volunteer/Extension Educator verify the existence of the completed project/subject or the member's participation in a 4-H educational experience. Additionally, 4-H members who participate in a club- or fair-based 4-H project/subject will submit a completed 4-H record sheet based on printed or web-based educational materials (used by Indiana 4-H Youth Development) prior to the established and published date. Though exhibiting in local, county, and state exhibits/fairs is not required for project completion, as it does not necessarily relate directly to content and skills learned in the development of the 4-H project, project exhibition is encouraged as a continuation of the educational experience. Extension employees and volunteers are obligated to eliminate (and should not create) any practices that limit, deprive, or tend to deprive any youth of opportunities for membership and/or participation in the Indiana 4-H program.

EXHIBITION AT THE INDIANA STATE FAIR:

Exhibition of 4-H projects in local, county or state exhibits/fairs is considered a privilege and is voluntary on the part of the exhibitor. The exhibition of 4-H projects provides 4-H members an opportunity to display their 4-H projects, enter into competition and participate in an educational/social environment with their peers. With exhibition also comes the responsibility for abiding by all of the terms and conditions pertaining to the respective 4-H project. Not following the established terms and conditions of the projects will be grounds for exclusion from the competition/exhibition or the project itself.

- 1. If DNA is not submitted by May 15th to the County Extension Office that animal is not eligible to show at the Indiana State Fair.
- 2. An exhibit may not be entered in more than one State Fair 4-H class except in some animal classes where designated. In a State Fair class requiring more than one item, all items must be exhibited by the same 4-H member. All parts of an exhibit made in one class must belong to one 4-H member.
- 3. All 4-H exhibits at the State Fair must be prepared during the current 4-H year. Eligibility rests solely with the State 4-H Youth Program Leader or their designee on entries in all 4-H classes.

- 4. Any 4-H exhibit removed from display prior to the official release will be disqualified. Any 4-H placings/prizes (including ribbons, money, medals, trophies, etc.) awarded that exhibit will be forfeited.
- 5. 4-H exhibitors having an entry in animal classes at State Fair are expected to show their own animals. In cases where this cannot be done, the owner may request another Indiana 4-H member to serve as a substitute showman. Substitute showmen must be approved in writing by the 4-H show manager, 24 hours prior to showing of the animal(s) needing a substitute showman. Requests will only be granted for medical emergencies, conflicts with showing other animals, or circumstances deemed unavoidable by the 4-H show manager. Failure to be excused from a job and/or participation in a band or sporting event or practice will not result in a substitute showman being granted.

4-H ANIMAL OWNERSHIP, POSSESSION AND EXHIBITION:

Each 4-H member shall own his/her own 4-H exhibit. Ownership must be in effect on or before the county and state ID deadlines and continuously until after the 4-H show at the County and/or State Fair.

- 1. For 4-H breeding animals, family corporations and/or partnerships of 4-H members with one or more parents, siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles, or legal guardians are acceptable.
- 2. For 4-H dairy cattle, family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H member with unrelated persons or dairy operations are also acceptable.
- 3. Dairy heifers, horses, ponies, alpacas and llamas may be leased subject to approval of both the county 4-H dairy, horse and pony, or llama committee and the respective County Extension Educator. 4-H animals (horse and pony, dairy, alpacas and llamas are only eligible to be leased by a single 4-H member in a 4-H program year.
- 4. 4-H animals are expected to be in the personal possession and regular care of the 4-H member who owns/leases them (unless other arrangements have been agreed upon by the County 4-H Extension Educator) from the animal ID deadline until the conclusion of the County and/or State Fair.
- 5. 4-H animals purchased, sold, or offered for sale after the enrollment deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction"), shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, is considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction."
- 6. 4-H animals exhibited after the animal ID deadline (April 1 for steers, and May 15 for all other animals) at any show by anyone other than the individual whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4HOnline will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings and parents, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. 4-H animals exhibited after the animal ID deadline (April 1 for steers, and May 15th for all other animals) at any show by anyone other than the individual whose 4-H enrollment record is connected to the ID of the animal in Indiana 4HOnline will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This term/condition does not apply to siblings, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. 4-H animals that are selected by 4-H Extension Staff or 4-H Adult Volunteers for use in supreme showmanship contests (Master Showmanship, Round Robin, etc.) may be used in those county events without jeopardizing State Fair eligibility. This policy applies to all 4-H animal projects. For animal projects without ID deadlines, the person who enters them in the Indiana State Fair 4-H show is the equivalent of the owner of the animals.
- 7. 4-H members showing registered beef, Boer goats, dairy, dairy goats, sheep and swine must present a registration certificate (no photocopies, carbons or fax copies, except a fax directly from the national breed association to the Indiana State Fair) to the 4-H show manager before the specified time for each specie, showing that the exhibitor owns the animal being exhibited, as per ownership terms, on or before the May 15 ID deadline and continuously until 4-H show day at the Indiana State Fair. 4-H breeding beef, Boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine must be registered in one of the following ownership methods:
 - a. in the 4-H members' name
 - b. John Smith and Sons
 - c. John Smith, Sons and Daughters
 - d. John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only)
 - e. Mark Smith (brother) and Mary Smith (sister)
 - f. Family corporations, where the 4-H members' name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date
 - g. Family partnership where the 4-H members father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal, notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be on file with the Extension Office before the ID deadline.

8. 4-H breeding beef, Boer goats, dairy goats, sheep and swine will NOT be accepted in the State Fair 4-H Show if they are registered in a father's name only, farm name only, or partnerships with unrelated persons (such as "Smith View", "Smith Oak", "John Doe and William Smith (4-H member)", "Long Oak and William Smith (4-H Member)", etc.).

BEHAVIORAL CRITERIA:

There are many opportunities for 4-H members, volunteers, parents and the public to participate in 4-H events and activities. When involved in such experiences; members, volunteers, parents and the public are expected to follow all terms and conditions/rules and regulations as outlined by those responsible for the specific program or activity. When attending, participating or acting on behalf of the 4-H program, all persons are expected to conduct themselves in accordance with accepted standards of social behavior, respect the rights of others, and refrain from any conduct which may be injurious to the 4-H program. The following actions constitute misconduct for which persons may be subject to disciplinary penalties and/or dismissal from the program:

- Dishonesty in connection with any 4-H activity by cheating or knowingly furnishing false information.
- 2. Alteration or unauthorized use of 4-H records.
- 3. Obstruction or disruption of any 4-H activity or aiding and encouraging other persons to engage in such conduct.
- 4. Failure to comply, aiding or encouraging other persons not to comply with specific terms and conditions of a given project, contest, or activity.
- 5. Failure to comply with directions of 4-H officials acting in the proper performance of their duties.
- 6. Inhumane treatment of 4-H animal projects. In all 4-H activities, the following constitute a violation of behavioral expectations:
- 7. Possession or use of fire crackers, gun powder, firearms, chemicals or other materials that can be used to create an explosive mixture.
- 8. Misuse of fire equipment or sounding a false fire alarm.
- 9. Having a guest of the opposite sex in your sleeping quarters.
- 10. Physical or verbal abuse of any person/animal or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any person.
- 11. Theft of or malicious damage to property.
- 12. Possession, use, or distribution of alcohol, illegal drugs, tobacco and tobacco-like products, electronic smoking devices (including, but not limited to, e-cigs, vapes, juuls), or other dangerous substances.
- 13. Lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct.
- 14. Unauthorized entry, use or occupancy of any facility.
- 15. Any conduct which threatens or interferes with maintenance of appropriate order and discipline or invades the rights of others. When violations occur at out of county, state or national 4-H events, the following procedures will be followed.
 - a. The parents/guardians will be contacted to arrange transportation home for the violator(s) and
 - b. The local extension educator will be notified

Penalties: If, in the opinion of the State 4-H Program Leader or their designee, evidence of alteration, excessive outside help, unethical preparation, or misconduct is noted, the exhibit and/or 4-H member may be disqualified, all premiums and awards forfeited, or the 4-H member may be subject to a disbarment from participation in that project or other related 4-H projects, events, or activities. Enforcement may be selective which does not waive the state 4-H Youth Program's right to enforce collectively at a future date and appropriate circumstance.

• Any State Fair 4-H situation not covered by these policies shall be handled by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader or their designee as appropriate.

DUE PROCESS AND RIGHT OF APPEAL FOR VIOLATION OF STATE 4-H PROGRAMS AND POLICIES WHILE AT THE INDIANA STATE FAIR

- 1. The State 4-H Youth Program Leader, or their designee, shall notify the person in writing of the violation and the penalty imposed.
- 2. A person may appeal a decision, in writing, to the State 4-H Youth Program Leader, within 15 days of receiving written notification
- 3. Within 15 days of receipt of a written appeal, the State 4-H Youth Program Leader may rescind the initial determination. No further determination as to the reported violation may be subsequently made by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader. The person filing the appeal shall have no further remedy available upon rescission of the initial determination. In short, the case would be closed.
- 4. If the State 4-H Youth Program Leader does not rescind the initial determination within 15 days of receiving the appeal, a hearing will be set by the Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service. The person filing the appeal shall be notified of the date in writing.
- 5. The Director of the Purdue Cooperative Extension Service or their designee shall conduct the hearing as the sole hearing officer.
- 6. Within 15 days of the conclusion of the hearing, the hearing officer shall submit to the State 4-H Youth Program Leader, his/her findings and recommendations with regard to the reported violation(s), penalties and the person's appeal.
- 7. Upon receiving the recommendations of the hearing officer, the State 4-H Youth Program Leader shall take action upon the recommendation.
- 8. Final actions will be stated in writing and provided to the person filing the appeal within 15 days of the determination by the State 4-H Youth Program Leader.
- 9. Any appeal beyond this point deemed necessary by the appellant would need to be filed in a Marion County, Indiana court of law.

Terms & Conditions for Dairy Cattle

- 1. <u>Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions</u> By entering exhibits at the Indiana State Fair, you agree to the Indiana State Fair General Terms and Conditions on page 1.
 - a. All animals must meet the official health requirements, general terms and ownership conditions located in the front of the State Fair 4-H Entry Book. Especially note terms and conditions on tampering, misrepresentation, conduct, drugs, etc. Officials reserve the right to require drug steroid testing and examination of animals entered for show.
 - b. Read official health terms and conditions, general terms and conditions and official ownership terms and conditions located in the front of the 4-H Entry Book. Pay particular attention to the terms and conditions on tampering, misrepresentation, conduct, drugs, pumping, forced fillings, etc.
 - c. Each animal entered in the following shows: Beef Cattle Department, Dairy Cattle Department, Swine Department, Sheep Department, Dairy Goat Department, Meat Type Goat Department must be listed on a 4-H Animal Affidavit to exhibit at the Indiana State Fair. The completed and notarized form must be turned into their respective department during check-in. Failure to complete and submit an affidavit as requested may result in disqualification of the animal, or the exhibitor from the Indiana State Fair.
 - d. All Dairy stalls and tack in the West & South Pavilion must be ADA compliant, all barn aisles between stalls/tack must be no less than 36 inches wide with open floor space that is wheel-chair accessible.
- 2. <u>4-H County Terms and Conditions</u> For 4-H animal ownership, possession and exhibitor guidelines relative to State Fair exhibition, see 4-H ANIMAL OWNERSHIP, POSSESSION AND EXHIBITION on page 17 of the Indiana State Fair 4-H Entry Book.
 - a. Only animals who are properly identified by May 15 (or earlier deadline set by county) through Indiana 4-H Online (https://in.4honline.com) are eligible for entry in the State Fair 4-H Dairy Show. To be properly identified, 4-H members must enter the 840-RFID tag number, animal's registered name and registration number (or dam's registration number) completely and correctly into Indiana 4-H Online. The registration name and number must match the corresponding number on the animal's registration paper during check-in at the Indiana State Fair in order for the animal to be eligible for the 4-H dairy show.

After your county fair auction is completed, the Extension Educator will denote any animals that were purchased, sold or offered for sale after the ID deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair (including animals that have gone through a "Premium Only Auction") in Indiana 4-H Online and shall not be eligible to show in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. Sale of products of animals (milk, cheese, wool, etc.) in lieu of the animal, is considered equivalent to a "Premium Only Auction."

- 3. YQCA: To exhibit beef cattle, dairy cattle, swine, sheep, meat goats, dairy goats, poultry and rabbits, 4-H members must be certified through the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals program. 4-H Members should present a copy of their YQCA completion certificate upon species check- in. This is an annual program that can be completed via online modules or in-person trainings. For more information about in-person trainings in your county, please contact your County Extension Office. More information about YQCA is available at http://yqca.org/.
- 4. **Indiana Bred:** Implemented to provide Indiana purebred seedstock producers with enhanced marketing opportunities while encouraging and incentivizing Indiana State Fair 4-H exhibitor participation. For animals to be eligible they must be Indiana bred, born and owned exclusively by residents of the State of Indiana. Must either be registered or certified by its national breed association or registry to provide proof that animal was bred within the State of Indiana. Complete Indiana Bred information available in the General Terms & Conditions.
- 5. Animal Official ID Requirements ALL Dairy Cattle (4-H and Open) must have an 840-RFID tag

- 6. Animal Ownership and Registration Identified dairy cows and heifers must be owned or leased by the 4-H exhibitor by May 15 and must remain under that 4-H member's continuous care and responsibility through the date of the 4-H dairy show at the Indiana State Fair.
 - a. Each 4-H member shall own (or lease) his/her own exhibit. The ownership or lease agreement must be in effect on or before the county and state Identification deadlines and continue through the State Fair 4-H Dairy show. 4-H animals purchased, sold or offered for sale after the identification deadline and prior to the Indiana State Fair shall not be eligible to show at the State Fair. 4-H animals exhibited after the animal identification deadline (May 15) at any show, by anyone other than the person listed on the Indiana 4-H enrollment form will not be eligible to be shown in the 4-H show at the Indiana State Fair. This does not apply to siblings and parents, who may show each other's animals at any show during the year without jeopardizing state fair eligibility. Family corporations and/or partnerships of the 4-H club member with a parent or unrelated persons, are accepted for breeding animals in 4-H dairy classes. Dairy cows and heifers owned in a partnership may not be exhibited by more than one person from May 15 until conclusion of the State Fair 4-H Dairy Show. This person must be the exhibitor of the animal in the current State Fair 4-H Dairy Show or the animal will be ineligible for this show.

The Dairy lease program is only for 4-H members who do not own their own dairy cows and/or heifers. 4-H members may <u>not</u> enroll both leased and owned dairy animals. Only dairy heifers that will be less than two (2) years-of-age at the time of the Indiana State Fair 4-H dairy show may be leased. Leasing a dairy heifer will be considered the equivalent of ownership. 4-H animals (horse and pony, dairy, alpacas and llamas) are only eligible to be leased by one individual 4-H member in a given 4-H program year.

- b. The 4-H member should be regularly involved in the care of the heifer regardless of where the heifer is kept, and the 4-H member should have exclusive show rights to the heifer during the 4-H lease period from May 15 through the 4-H dairy show at the Indiana State Fair. Leased 4-H dairy heifers must be registered (although it is not necessary to have the registration paper transferred to the 4-H member's name) by May 15 with their registration number listed on the 4-H member's 4HOnline profile in the animal identification section under the dairy species. At check-in during the Indiana State Fair, the 4-H member with a leased dairy heifer must provide the heifers registration paper and a lease agreement signed by them and the person they are leasing the heifer from.
- c. If a 4-H dairy member lists the dam's registration number on his/her dairy in Indiana 4-H Online, then the animal's name, date of birth and dam's registration number <u>must</u> all match the corresponding information on the animal's registration certificate during check-in at the Indiana State Fair in order for the animal to be eligible for the 4-H dairy show.
- d. A registration certificate (no photocopies, carbons or fax copies except a fax directly from the national breed association to the Indiana State Fair) must be presented to the 4-H show manager before 5 pm the day preceding the 4-H Dairy show, indicating that the exhibitor owns the animal being exhibited, as per ownership terms, on or before the May 15 enrollment deadline and continuously until show day. Acceptable registrations are (1) in the 4-H member's name, (2) John Smith & Sons, (3) John Smith, Sons & Daughters, (4) John Smith & Family (family includes sons, daughters, and legal guardian youth only), (5) Mark Smith (brother) & Mary Smith (sister), (6) Family Corporations, where the 4-H member's name appears as a holder of stock in the corporation, and proof of the same must be supplied on or before the enrollment date, (7) Family partnership where the 4-H'ers father, mother, brother, sister, aunt, uncle, grandparent, and/or legal guardian is also in the family partnership and the 4-H member's name appears on the legal, notarized partnership. A copy of the written document must be attached to the enrollment form before the enrollment deadline.
- e. 4-H animals, in breeding classes, will NOT be accepted at the State Fair, if they are registered in a father's name only or farm name only, (such as "Smith View", or "Smith Oak", etc.) unless the 4-H member has a certified lease agreement for this animal.
- f. The State Fair 4-H dairy show is for registered animals only (no commercial dairy cattle).
- g. All dairy cows and heifers must be purebred animals that are registered in recognized herd books of the following <u>American</u> Associations: Ayrshire Breeder's Association Brattleboro, Vermont; Brown Swiss Cattle Breeder's Association Beloit, Wisconsin; American Guernsey Association Plain City, Ohio; Holstein Association U.S.A., Inc. Brattleboro, Vermont; American Jersey Cattle Association Reynoldsburg, Ohio; American Milking Shorthorn Society Beloit, Wisconsin.
- h. Registration papers must be made available upon request for checking ear tags, tattoos or color patterns at the stalls on the afternoon before the 4-H dairy show. Dairy cows and heifers whose ear tags, tattoos or color patterns do not match their registration paper will be disqualified from the 4-H dairy show.

- 7. A dairy cow or heifer may be co-enrolled by siblings, as long as the animal(s) is/are listed in Indiana 4-H Online under the sibling that wishes to exhibit it and can be shown by only that 4-H member at the Indiana State Fair Dairy Cattle Show.
- 8. All guidelines will be in accordance with THE PUREBRED DAIRY CATTLE ASSOCIATION SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS (http://www.usjersev.com/Reference/PDCAethicscode.htm).
- 9. Dairy animals may be any one (1) of the following breeds: Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey or Milking Shorthorn.
- 10. A 4-H member may show more than one (1) dairy breed, but they may <u>not</u> show more than one (1) animal in each of the age group classes listed on the following pages under **AGE GROUP CLASSES**.
- 11. New for 2020: A 4-H member may only show in one (1) breed showmanship class per year.
- 12. Sand will not be permitted in the cattle barn.
- 13. Grand champion 4-H dairy cattle from previous Indiana State Fairs are eligible to show again this year.
- 14. Yearling heifers that are "in milk" must show in the cow class.
- 15. It is required that 4-H exhibitors wear white pants or slacks (culottes or skirts also acceptable, shorts are not allowed) in the dairy show ring. White or colored shirts with 4-H emblems and/or breed insignias are permissible.
- 16. Milking machines must have belt covers, etc.
- 17. Power washers will not be allowed in the wash racks.
- 18. Only one (1) overhead fan located in front of the animals will be permitted for each three (3) head of dairy cattle per 4-H family. Fans must blow on the halter side of the animal. No butt fans or misters will be allowed.
- 19. Fans must have proper (safety approved) shrouds.
- 20. Hay and straw storage: one (1) large bale of hay and one (1) large bale of straw allowed in barn after initial bedding. All other large bales can be stored out of barn in designated area at exhibitor's risk.
- 21. The breed associations reserve the right to have a qualified veterinarian check all questionable animals for their correct age and insure that all animals have a legible tattoo. Any altered tattoos will be disqualified. Any misrepresented animals will be disqualified from the show and will be reported to the national associations.
- 22. Requirements for the Production and Handling Milk Requirements for the production and handling of milk produced on the grounds of the Indiana State Fair during the course of the Fair are prescribed by the Dairy and Milk Products Division and the Indiana State Board of Animal Health. Bring your stall number to the milk house/parlor when you register.
 - a. Cows' udders shall be washed with sanitizing solution prior to milking and the udder dried with a clean cloth or cow towel.
 - o. Milk will NOT be sold at the Indiana State Fair. The milk will be disposed by the Indiana State Fair.
 - c. Cow(s) may be milked in the designated area provided near the milking parlor. Exhibitors supplying their own milkers, milking claws and milk pails shall take this equipment to the milk parlor for cleaning, sanitizing, and approval prior to the first milking. The equipment will be returned to the milk parlor after each use for washing and storing.
 - d. State Fair and 4-H officials may use technologies for testing bodily fluids like milk or blood or other examination techniques at any time while the animals are on the grounds to detect any unethical procedures. By making an entry: (1) Exhibitor consents to the collection of materials such as milk, blood, etc., photographic or direct examination of the animal; and (2) owner, Exhibitor and/or any individuals handling or fitting Exhibitor's animal agree to produce proper animal and personal identification when requested by show management.
- 23. The exhibitor or representative is to be at stalls with registration papers for registration paper & visual check.

Entry Information

- 1. All entries must be made in accordance with the terms and conditions.
- 2. Online Entry To enter into the Indiana State Fair, please go to https://exhibitorscorner.indianastatefair.com/ and enter online. Each exhibitor is required to pay an entry fee at the time of entry. An exhibitor will not be considered entered into the Indiana State Fair until payment is made in full. Payment can be made online with a valid credit card. Entries will not be accepted over the phone.
- 3. An Unloading/Load Out permit, and 6 admission tickets will be included with the department fee. Purchasing of Parking Passes are optional and are sold separately through Exhibitor's Corner.

- 5. <u>Confirmation of Entry</u>- A confirmation email will be sent to the email address used to sign in for the account once entries have been paid in full.
- 6. Exhibitor Packets- NEW for 2020: Exhibitors will have the option to have their exhibitor packet sent to them electronically via email at no charge or have the packet mailed to them. Packets will include department information, admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and any additional items that were purchased during time of registration. Electronic Packets (E-Packets) will be sent automatically as soon as the order has been submitted. If an exhibitor chose to have a copy of their packet mailed to them, the Indiana State Fair Entry Department will mail out the packet if the entry is made prior to July 29. Entering on July 29 or after, packets will only be mailed if there is sufficient return mail time based on the department's arrival times. If a packet cannot be sent out, payment will have to be made to get into the fair, then packets can be picked up in the Entry Office. Refunds will not be given for gate admission and/or parking fees. Packet information will be available to all exhibitors by logging into their Exhibitor's Corner account. Admission tickets, unloading/load out permits, and parking passes will be scanned when coming through a gate.
- 7. 4-H members are encouraged to make stall requests on the State Fair Online Registration.
- 4-H members wishing to compete in open class must enter online under the open class department, pay all open class fees, and meet open class deadlines as listed in open class Entry Book.
- 9. Substitutions within a breed are allowed during the scheduled entry period on Saturday morning (if the animals have been properly identified by May 15 in Indiana 4-H Online).

Arrival and Release Procedure –

- 1. Upon arrival, all trucks and trailers must enter Gate 3 from 38th Street. In the event that the unloading area is filled, you will be directed to the 46th Street lot for number assignments. Trucks will be released by cattle and traffic departments as unloading spaces are available.
- 2. Inside Gate 3, turn right and proceed to the unloading point at the south end of the cattle barn.
- 3. Animals must be checked by designated cattle barn staff when unloading.
- 4. Stall cattle and move in supplies. Each 4-H animal will be assigned a stall by the department superintendent or their staff.
- 5. All 4-H trailers and large trucks must be parked in the 46th Street lot; therefore, as soon as your unloading has been completed, move your "rig" following the route designated by the traffic department.
- 6. Transportation will be provided for exhibitors from the 46th Street lot to Gate 1 on the Fairgrounds (Main Gate on 38th Street) and from the same location to the 46th Street lot.
- 7. 4-H animals and exhibitors will be released following the 4-H dairy show.
- 8. When you are ready to depart, bring your "rig" to the same loading and unloading area. Only right-hand turns may be made into the Fairgrounds; no left-hand turns.

4-H Dairy Cattle Classes and Showmanship Qualifications

Showmanship Description

- 1. SHOWMANSHIP CLASS each breed association is responsible for determining the number of 4-Hers in their breed to participate in showmanship. Only the grand champion showmen of previous years are ineligible. Awards will be based on the showmanship ability of the exhibitor.
- 2. 4-H members who compete in the State Fair dairy showmanship classes must show one (1) of their own animals that was exhibited in a halter class of the 4-H dairy show. Each exhibitor will receive a showmanship participation ribbon.
- 3. CHAMPION SHOWMAN a champion Junior, Intermediate and Senior showman from each breed will be selected.
- 4. A 4-H member may only show in one (1) breed showmanship class per year.
- 5. All of the showmanship classes and selection of overall Senior Showman will take place in the Pop Weaver Youth Pavilion and Cheri Daniels Arena.
- 6. Grade in school on January 1 of current year.

<u>Junior Showmen</u> - all 4-H exhibitors in the 3rd, 4th and 5th grades are eligible. Once an exhibitor is the overall junior dairy showmanship winner, the 4-Her is only eligible to compete in the intermediate or senior dairy showmanship classes in future years.

<u>Intermediate Showmen</u> - all 4-H exhibitors in the 6th, 7th and 8th grades are eligible (exception - previous years' junior showmanship winners). Once a 4-H member is the champion intermediate dairy showman, they must compete in senior showmanship in subsequent years.

<u>Senior Showmen</u> - all 4-H exhibitors in the 9th grade and above are eligible (exception - previous years' intermediate showmanship winners). The Champion Senior Showman of each breed (Ayrshire, Brown Swiss, Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Milking Shorthorn) will be eligible to show for Grand Champion 4-H Dairy Showman.

Overall Senior Showman Competition Details

- 1. The overall Senior Showmanship competition will be scored 100% on the showing of the animal.
- 2. Each breed champion showman will be scored from 1 10 on their showing ability. Each of the judges will score the contestants independently from the other judges (no collaboration).
- 3. The overall showmanship winner will receive \$500. The other five (5) contestants will each receive \$150.
- 4. Ties will be broken by the lead judge.
- 5. The Grand Champion Showman will be selected by the breed judges. One of the 4-H dairy judges will be selected alphabetically within the breeds to serve as the "lead judge" for the showmanship finals. This person is the **Holstein** judge in 2020.
- 6. The six senior breed champion winners and the overall winner of the Grand Champion 4-H Dairy Showmanship Contest will be announced during the Supreme Drive in the Indiana Farmers Coliseum.

Outstanding 4-H Dairy Producer Competition

- 1. The Outstanding 4-H Dairy Producer competition is open to Indiana 4-H members in the 8th grade and above who are entered in the 4-H dairy project. 4-H members <u>must be entered in the 4-H Dairy Cattle Department</u> and have to exhibit at the Indiana State Fair in order to compete in the outstanding 4-H Dairy Producer Competition
- 2. This competition will take place on Saturday, August 11 starting at 10 am at the North Foyer on the Indiana State Fairgrounds.
- 3. The objectives of this award are to:
 - a. Emphasize the educational aspects of raising and showing livestock
 - b. Provide a learning laboratory which will enhance knowledge of the dairy industry
 - c. Improve self-confidence and verbal skills in one-on-one communication
 - d. Develop critical thinking and problem solving skills
 - e. Provide additional opportunities to recognize youth for their accomplishments
- 4. Scholarships will be awarded based on knowledge and skills demonstrated in different contests within the dairy species. Please see the last page for award information.
- 5. The contest format is a four (4) phase competition consisting of the following events:
 - Phase 1 four (4) stage skill-a-thon contest
 - Phase 2 50 question dairy management test. Questions could be on dairy nutrition, health, reproduction, milk marketing and other dairy related information.
 - Phase 3 Judging Contest. The contest will consist of a minimum of four (4) classes and a maximum of six (6) classes. A combination of cows and heifers from the six (6) dairy breeds will be used. Questions will be asked on at least two (2) classes.
 - Phase 4 Showmanship. Points will be assigned for participation in showmanship, which will take place on Saturday, August 11. Animals are not required to be fitted for showmanship.
- 6. Each of the four (4) phases will be weighted equally.
- 7. Results will be announced at the conclusion of the showmanship. Recognition will be given to the top individuals in each phase as well as to the overall winner.

4-H Dairy Skill-a-Thon Contest Format -

- 1. The 4-H Dairy Skill-a-thon is open to any Indiana 4-H member entered in the dairy project in grades 3, 4, 5, 6 or 7 as of January 1 of the current year. You <u>must</u> exhibit at the State Fair to participate.
- 2. Pre-registration for the contest is not required. You may sign up the day of the contest in the Cattle Barn Office.
- 3. The objectives of the Skill-a-thon are to:
 - a. Provide a learning laboratory which will enhance knowledge of the dairy industry.
 - b. Improve self-confidence and verbal skills in one-on-one communication.
 - c. Develop responsibility for completing a project.
 - d. Develop critical thinking and problem solving skills.
 - e. Provide additional opportunities to recognize youth for their accomplishments.
- 4. The skill-a-thon will consist of six (6) stations, worth 20 points each. If a tie exists at the end of the event, contestants will answer a tiebreaker question at one of the stations.
- 5. Example topics for the dairy skill-a-thon are given but are not necessarily limited to the following list:

Representatives of State Breed Associations will provide awards to the Champion Junior, Intermediate, and Senior Showman from each breed.

Milk Promotion Services of Indiana will sponsor the awards for Outstanding 4-H Dairy Producer.

- At least one (1) \$1,000 scholarship will be awarded to the first place individual. Cash prizes will be awarded to the top three (3) individuals in each phase of the competition.
- The 1st place scholarship may be won only once. Previous scholarship winners are ineligible to compete.
- Scholarships will be paid directly to the accredited school or advanced educational program after enrollment.

Milk Promotion Services of Indiana will sponsor the awards presented to the top three winners of the 4-H Dairy Skill-A-Thon Contest.
