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JUNIOR CLASS

General Rules

- 1. It is a privilege to participate in the Jefferson County Fair. This privilege can be revoked for conduct unbecoming an exhibitor, parent, leader or volunteer. Exhibitors not obeying the rules may be disqualified, lose awards, premiums and /or lose eligibility to exhibit at the Jefferson County Fair.
- 2. It is the Exhibitor's responsibility to be aware of all dates and deadlines published in this book and changes that may be emailed and posted online at JcFairPark.com
- 3. The Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to interpret the rules and regulations of the Fair Premium Book.
- 4. The Jefferson County Fair Park is not responsible for LOST or STOLEN articles, or for INJURY or DEATH of live-stock. Owners/exhibitors assume full responsibility. Exhibitors exhibit at their own risk.
- 5. The Jefferson County Fair Park has the right to publish, and copyright any exhibitors image (including audio, moving image or photography) for educational programs, websites, and promotion of its programs.
- 6. All rules apply to all departments unless stated otherwise.
- 7. Open and Senior department entries are open to Jefferson and adjoining county residents, as space permits.
- 8. Junior department entries are open to members of 4-H, FFA, a scouting program, a breed group, or another recognized youth organization under adult leadership that has an education program appropriate to that organization and is approved by the fair board.
- 9. Junior Exhibitors shall be Kindergarten through one year past High School Graduation on January 1 of the current fair year. In any class where there is a grade division, all grades are based on exhibitor's grade as of January 1 of the current fair year.
- 10. Junior Exhibitors must have met the requirements of the youth organization they represent in order to participate in the fair and the entries they submit will be the result the exhibitor's project(s) in which they are enrolled
- 11. All Exhibits must be the result of the exhibitor's own labor.
- 12. All Divisions are limited to one entry under each Class unless otherwise stated.
- 13. No animal or article shall compete for more than one premium except as part of a group in livestock exhibits or in showmanship.
- 14. Exhibits may not have been shown at a previous Jefferson County Fair with the exception of animal projects.
- 15. Any exhibit containing illegal or protected materials will be disqualified.
- 16. Exhibits not fulfilling all department rules and requirements will be lowered one placing.
- 17. The Judge, Superintendent, and Fair Staff have the right to disqualify any exhibit. Animals that are not clean, properly groomed, halter broke or unsafe will be disqualified and forfiet premiums.
- 18. Extra awards, Champion, Grand Champion, Best of Show, etc. will not be awarded in Divisions having less that 5 exhibitors competing in a Class.
- 19. Exhibitors entered in Face to Face Judging Divisons must be present when their exhibits are being judged.
- 20. Animal Exhibitors must show their exhibit animal unless special permission is granted because of a medical condition (i.e. broken leg).
- 21. Premises ID number must be included at the time of entry submission.
- 22. All exhibits must be in place by the specified entry check-in deadline. Any exhibit arriving after the deadline will not be judged.
- 23. No animals will be unloaded from trailers until all necessary papers are checked by the Superintendent or Fair Staff. Failure to do so will result in disqualification and the animal may be reloaded and sent home.
- 24. Exhibitors are responsible for furnishing bedding and feed for their animals unless otherwise stated.
- 25. No advertising may be posted on any building unless approved by the Fair Office.
- 26. Entry tags will be printed for non-animal classes. Tags must be picked up at the Fair Office. Email reminders will be sent when tags are available.
- 27. Use Gate 1 off Jackson Ave. when bringing animals into the fair.
- 28. Only the exhibitor, immediate family (father, mother, grandparents, sibling or guardian) another Jefferson County Fair exhibitor or Certified Leader will be allowed to assist the exhibitor with Fitting. No professional fitters will be allowed to work on animals at any time during the County Fair. Animals need to be fit in designated areas only.
- 29. No tents or canopys allowed in the barns without prior approval of the superintendent or fair office staff.
- 30. Additional Fitting Rules can be found under the Jefferson County Fair Ethics Policy.

Ethics Policy

- 1. Tampering, and/or inhumane treatment; and/or misrepresentation as to breeding, age, ownership and any other irregularity in showing will be considered fraud and deception.
- 2. To maintain a high degree of confidence and integrity in the livestock shows, the Jefferson County Fair Park Committee reserves the right to disqualify any animal fitted in an unethical manner and disqualify the exhibitor. Unethical fitting shall include any injection of gas, solid or liquid to alter the normal confirmation. In addition, it shall include any cutting or tearing of the hide, cutting or tearing underneath the hide or removal of tissue in any attempt to alter the shape or appearance. It shall also include attempts to disrupt or change normal dental development, dyeing or coloring hair, adding artificial tailheads, switches, polls, hair and heels, as well as any attempt to change the confirmation and degree of firmness, by administration of fluids internally or externally in a liquid or solid state. The use of any medication not perscribed under a veterinarians direction is prohibited.
- 3. All exhibitors, their immediate family and any other parties involved in the unethical fitting and showing of an animal will be subject to forfeiture of award(s) and premium(s), and/or dismissal from the fair park; and/or being barred from competition immediately in the department in which the violation has occurred and/or from all departments entered; and/or in future competition at the Jefferson County Fair.

International Association of Fairs & Expositions (IAFE) National Code of Show Ring Ethics (Jefferson County Fair is a member of the IAFE)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to Junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs and livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in any event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other samples taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally.

- 4 (Continued). It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, it's integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collections and preservation, transfer to the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsibility person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions provided by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Parking & Camping Information

Parking in the general lots on the North and Northwest of the Fair Park outside of the gates is free. Parking inside the Fair Park fence is available for an additional fee and is located on the Northwest area of the Grandstand. The form to reserve a paid parking space is available on JcFairPark.com. The spaces are open to the public to purchase and are good for all 5 days of the Fair.

Animal Exhibitors may park their trailers inside the Fair Park fences during the fair for free. Please fill out a trailer parking form at JcFairPark.com to reserve space for your trailer.

Camping is available for Animal Exhibitors. The camping application and rules can be found at JcFairPark. com or by calling the Fair Office 920-674-7148 or the Camping Superintendent 920-988-0880.

Animal Health Regulations for Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2018 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code

for show organizers

General Requirements | All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description)
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- If requested by the fair or show organizer, the documentation showing legal importation (if applicable) and movement to the event

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily and review the above required records.

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease.

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents. Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) documenting official animal ID and all required tests and certifications
- Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers)
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/CattleBison.aspx)
- Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin
- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES)(starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - American ID tag 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin:

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Swine

Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate):

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease.
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and SECD (Swine Enteric Coronavirus Disease) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition.
- · Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.

Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin.
- The negative results of the SECD test from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and SECD or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection
- Official individual ID

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- · USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- · Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. For these animals see the section on Exotic ruminants below.

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- · If sexually intact, need official individual ID at any age
- · If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older
- Official ID includes scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name
- · Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin need:

 Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID: scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name

Sheep and goats (cont.)

Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone also need:

- · Import permit
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older
- · Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Swine

Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate):

- Stating that the entire herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease.
- Non-terminal Exhibitions: All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and SECD (Swine Enteric Coronavirus Disease) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the exhibition.
- Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.

Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. For these animals see the section on Exotic ruminants below.

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual ID at any age
- · If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older
- Official ID includes scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name
- Cannot be under restriction for movement to fairs and shows

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin need:

 Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID: scrapie ear tags or tattoos, USDA 840 ear tag, approved microchips if a reader is available and if accompanied by breed registration papers in the owner's name, or breed association tattoo if accompanied by registration papers in the owner's name

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- · Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- To return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Equine

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA test done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- · Official test report VS 10-11, or
- · USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- · Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin need:

- · Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA test done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- · No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- · Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- · The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- · Proof of a negative EIA test in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

South American Camelids: llamas, alpacas, guanacos, vicunas

South American camelids from within Wisconsin have no requirements. South American camelids from outside Wisconsin must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) and official individual ID. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- · Microchip number
- · Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin must have

- · Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)
- · Official individual ID (one of the following)
 - Approved USDA ear tag number
 - Microchip number
 - Breed association registration number
 - Breed association tattoo
- · Import permit
- · Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
 - Tuberculosis (TB) negative test required within 60 days before entry
 - Brucellosis negative test required within 30 days before entry

Poultry and Waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

- A NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum

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Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. All birds must test negative for pullorum-ty-phoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID.

Not required:

· Import permit number

Small animals: Dogs, domestic cats, and other household pets (ferrets, pet birds, rabbits, gerbils, guinea pigs, hamsters, domestic mice and rats)

Note: These rules do not apply to animals that are part of menageries. For those rules, see below. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

Dogs from within Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.

Animals from outside Wisconsin generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- · Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)
- Import permit number

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals (cont.)

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov.

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Circuses and individual circus acts
- · Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- · Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See https://dnr.wi.gov/topic/wildlife-habitat/captive.html

Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- · Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used at the show, before and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

Guidelines for housing and managing animals (cont.)

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- · House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
 - House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- · House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- · House swine separately from any other mammals
- · Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- · Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

Instructions for Submitting Entries

- 1. Review the Fair Premium Book online at JcFairPark.com to determine the Departments, Division, and Class numbers you wish to enter.
- 2. Click the link provided at JcFairPark.com to enter the ShoWorks system.
- 3. A thorough explanation of entering online is available at JcFairPark.com
- 4. You will need to create a new account every year
- 5. Save your username and password.
- 6. Cancelations cannot be made through the online ShoWorks program. Cancelation of entries can be made by filling out the Cancelation Form online at JcFairPark.com
- 7. Enter only in the proper age category in the projects in which you are enrolled through 4-H/FFA or other organization.
- 8. If you are enrolled in a Project within a Department you can enter any class in that Department!
- 9. Double check your entry. What it says on-line is what you are entering.
- 10. Showmanship is NOT an automatic entry. Each exhibitor must enroll in showmanship online if they wish to participate,
- 11. Herdsmanship IS an automatic entry and CANNOT BE entered on-line. The department Superintendent(s) will determine what clubs are entered in what herdsmanship categories based on stall/pen assignments.

Entry Deadlines & Fees

Junior Exhibitors: All complete entries with payment are due online by 11:59 p.m. May 18, 2018. Late entries will be accepted until 11:59p.m Friday June 1, 2018 and will be charged a \$100 late fee in additional to entry fee and pen/stall fee, per entry. No entries will be accepted after June 1, 2018. Changes to entries made prior to the May 18th deadline can be done for no fee. Changes requested after the May 18th deadline will be accepted until the time of judging for a \$25 fee per change. A \$7.00 entry fee will be required for each Junior exhibitor to register for the Fair. This also qualifies them to get an admission wristband that they will receive when the first project is brought in. Young people not exhibiting will not be eligible for a junior fair exhibitor wristband.

Open & Senior Exhibitors: All complete entries with payment are due online by 11:59 p.m. June 15, 2018. Open and Senior Exhibitors may submit paper entries to the Fair Office by 4:00 p.m. June 1, 2018. Paper entries will not be accepted via United States Postal Service (USPS) Mail. Entries must be brought to the Fair Office during normal business hours or left in the Fair Park Office Dropbox that is affixed to the Activity Center building near the entrance doors. For online entries visit JCFairPark.com. Late entries will be accepted until 11:59p.m Friday June 27, 2018 and will be charged \$100 per entry. Changes to entries made prior to the June 15th deadline can be done for no fee. Changes requested after the June 15th deadline will be accepted until the time of judging for a \$25 fee per change. A one-time \$2.00 fee to enter in Open & Senior Departments. If you enter both Departments your one-time fee will be \$4.00.

Cancellations: Cancellations should be reported to the Fair Office by Monday July 2, 2018. Entries can be cancelled online using our "Cancellation Form"

Substitutions: Substitutions to your non-animal entries can be made by filling out an Exception Notice by July 2nd. If the exception notice is approved the exhibitor will show for ribbon only, No premiums will be awarded. Animal Exhibit substitutions will be accepted until time of judging for a \$25 fee per change.

Additional Fees: Other fees apply for animal exhibits. Please reference the rules under each Department.

Rules:

1. All State of Wisconsin mandatory health regulations apply. See State, County & District Fairs, Rules & Regulations of Animal Health in front portion of book.

- 2. All Jefferson County Junior Fair Rules, Ethics Policy and Show Ring Ethics apply as printed in the front of this book. In addition, the following rules will also be enforced.
- 3. All junior fair dairy cattle must be housed with the club exhibit. A request can be made to the Superintendent to be tied with another club/organization and will be accepted before July 1 for stall assignments.
- **4. Registered animals must be shown in the breed of registry.** A registered Holstein has to be 87% RHA and above to be eligible to show. Animals shown in grade classes at the County Fair are ineligible to show at State Fair.
- 5. Substitutions may be made only within the lot number as entered except for ringworm, warts, or other health conditions.
- 6. Bedding and feed are the responsibility of each exhibitor. If space is limited, a one day of feed and bedding space will be allowed. Any changes to this rule will be noted at JCFairPark.com.
- 7. Bedding may not be put into the stalls until the superintendent posts the stall assignments. Superintendents reserve the right to change stall assignments due to cancellations at check-in.
- 8. White pants with an official show shirt may be worn during the heifer/cow classes. (No Club Shirts/Farm shirts will be accepted)
- 9. White shirts and White pants WILL BE required for participation in showmanship classes. Failure to wear white clothing will result in the exhibitor being dropped one placing.
- 10. A \$3.00 per lot, non-refundable fee will be charged.

Rules:

- 1. All State of Wisconsin mandatory health regulations apply. See State, County & District Fairs, Rules & Regulations of Animal Health in front portion of book.
- 2. All Jefferson County Junior Fair Rules, Ethics Policy and Show Ring Ethics apply as printed in the front of this book. In addition, the following rules will also be enforced.
- 3. Breed Classes for steers must be identified at the Fair weigh-in. Exhibitors can change to a crossbred class, but then cannot show the animal in a breed class. Market Steers will be weighed and lots established on a weight and or breed basis. There needs to be a minimum of 5 head to qualify for breed verification or they will be placed in the Any Other Breed Class.
- 4. All entries and registrations papers will be reviewed at check-in. All purebred breeding stock and purebred market steers must be registered per their respective breed organization and be registered in the family member name, same as State Fair. Tattoos on all registered animals will be read and checked against registration papers. Tattoos must be legible. Ear tags are not acceptable except for Jefferson County MAP ID. Any animals that don't match tattoos to papers (or no tattoos) will need to exhibit in crossbred class.
- 5. An exhibitor may exhibit four beef animals with no more than two of these being market steers.
- 6. Market animals must be steers. Heifers may not be shown in the market steer class.
- 7. All beef exhibits are to be stalled with the club exhibit for which they entered.
- 8. The beef Superintendent must be notified of any change in head count of animals at least two weeks prior to Fair. Any club or chapter not giving proper notification, and therefore having excess space will, at the discretion of the Superintendent, automatically be docked one placing in herdsmanship and will be the first ones cut if barn space is tight the next year.
- 9. Once barns are locked up at 10:00 p.m., no animals are allowed to leave the building until 6:00 a.m. the following morning. If you wish to exercise your animal other than during that time, they must remain in sight of the beef barn at all times, preferably in the grass to the south end of the beef barn. The show ring is OK once it is set up; please clean up after you are finished.
- 10. All animals must be haltered and double tied with neck collars at all times.
- 11. No butt fans allowed. Overhead fans may be used. Fans must be securely mounted above the animal with a limit of 2 per animal. Fan diameter to be no larger than 24". No fans will be permitted to be in the aisle or on the floor of the barn.
- 12. All stalls must be kept in good condition. The barns will be regularly inspected and exhibits must be kept neat at all times. The superintendent reserves the right to withhold premium money for such exhibits as is held unworthy.
- 13. The junior exhibitor making the entry must show their beef animals, unless the superintendent has granted permission for another Jefferson County Fair junior livestock exhibitor to show the entry.
- 14. Exhibits deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit by the superintendent will be dismissed from the fair-grounds and no premium will be awarded.
- 15. Fitting No chutes are allowed in the barn at any time.
- 16. Animals are only allowed to show under one lot number except for Lot #1 Market Steer, Class J Showman-ship, Class K or Club group.
- 17. All animals must be dehorned. If regrowth occurs as a scur it must be less than 1 inch and accompanied with a letter from your veterinarian.
- 18. An exhibitor shall be limited to one managerial breeding animal. A managerial animal is an animal that is under the daily care of, but not owned by the exhibitor.
- 19. Displays MAY NOT be torn down until the animals are released at 7pm.
- 20. A \$18.00 non-refundable fee per lot number will be charged for bedding, recycling manure & judge with the exception of Class K & M. Fees must be paid online at time of enrollment.
- 21. Bedding must be moved 2 feet from the walls on Sunday after your animals are removed.

All affected animals must be removed immediately from the Fair Grounds, and the determination of the on-site veterinarian will be final.

- 2. All Jefferson County Junior Fair Rules, Ethics Policy and Show Ring Ethics apply as printed in the front of this book. In addition, the following rules will also be enforced.
- 3. Any goat with abscesses or showing symptoms of any contagious disease will not be allowed at the Fair.
- 4. The superintendent WILL disqualify and send home any goat that smells of buck, is not clean, or properly groomed, fitted, fed and cared for at the fair.
- 5. Goats with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed (i.e. Boer, Angora, miniature goats). Dairy goats must be neatly disbudded or dehorned (if not naturally hornless) and scurs should be less than 2 inches. Goat Superintendent(s) have the right to disqualify, remove or isolate goats deemed unsafe.
- 6. In order to have a goat penned at the fair, the goat must be entered in the appropriate class for its age and registration status. Only goats entered are allowed at fair, no additional goats can be brought to the fair. This includes all nursing kids. Nursing kids are not allowed to be penned at the fair unless they are registered properly.
- 7. Registered and recorded grade goats must be shown in grade classes UNLESS copies of the official registration papers are presented to the superintendent upon check-in of animals. This is the responsibility of the exhibitor. These papers will remain on file through fair. YOU MAY NOT change lots after entries have been received except with exception form from the Fair Office for ribbon only.
- 8. Age classifications: The age of the goat shall be determined as of the opening day of fair. Does that have freshened at least once, including dry milkers may only compete in the milking doe classes or the Pet Class. Does that are over 24 months of age and have not freshened can only be entered in the Pet Class.
- 9. On the last day of Fair, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to clean all their pens and empty their hay feeders.
- 10. A \$1.00 per lot number, non-refundable fee will be charged.

Rules:

- 1. All Horse and Pony Project exhibitors must comply with State of Wisconsin, Jefferson County Fair, Superintendent (Horse and Pony Project Committee) and Wisconsin 4-H Horse Association Rules
- 2. All State of Wisconsin mandatory health regulations apply. See County & District Fairs, Rules and Regulations of Animal Health in front of this book.
- 3. The Superintendent, as defined in the Constitution & Bylaws of JCHP Article IV, Section 11, will handle each dispute on an individual basis. All decisions of the Superintendent will be final as defined in the Project's Constitution and By-Laws.
- 4. Fitting regulations follow typical equine breed association rules and do not necessarily follow fitting rules in the front of the book.
- 5. Grade of exhibitor is as of current enrollment year; the minimum grade to exhibit is Grade 3.
- 7. To be eligible to show at the Fair, exhibitors must have completed all JCHP Forms and requirements.
- 8. Any Dept 6 Horse and Pony Project questions arising are referred first to the Jefferson County Premium Book, secondly to the Horse and Pony Project website, and thirdly to the Wisconsin State 4-H Horse Association rules and Expo guidelines.
- 9. 1.A negative EIA (Coggins) test is required for all equine exhibiting. The test must be CURRENT and valid through September 30th of the current fair year. Original documentation must be shown at the check-in table prior to unloading the animal by 8pm Tuesday night of Fair Week. In addition the 4 in 1 vaccine should be given prior to May 1 (the 4 in 1 includes Eastern and Western Encephalomyelitis, Tetanus, and Equine Influenza.) For more information see the JCHP Horse Health Vaccination Form.
- 10. The age of animal is as of January 1 of the exhibit year.
- 11. The Superintendent will make stall assignments based on entries provided by the Fair Park Office.
- 12. Only one animal (horse, pony or draft) per exhibitor.
- 13. In the case of animal substitutions, all horses shows at the Jefferson County fair must be listed on the members Exhibitor Agreement and Horse Identification Form which was submitted to the UWEX Office by the 3rd Friday in May. The JCHP Committee recommends that each member submit more than one horse for identification whenever possible.
- Once a horse is checked in and unloaded it may not leave the fairgrounds until after 6 p.m. on Sunday. Request for exceptions must be brought to the Horse and Pony Project Committee.
- 15. Definitions: Pony through 56 inches, Horse over 56 inches. Ponies must be measured at check-in. Any horse measuring 56" and under may show in pony classes. Such a horse may show in horse classes If the exhibitor chooses. You must enter EITHER all pony or all horse classes. No cross entering is allowed.
- 16. Miniatures: We recognize that miniature horse is a horse breed, but for safety reasons, they must enter pony classes.
- 17. Stallions may not be shown at the fair. Stallion is defined as any unaltered male equine over 1 year of age. Mares with foals at their side will not be allowed to exhibit.
- 18. Only the exhibitor will be allowed to ride their horse with exception made for tandem and per the show bill. Riding is limited to the riding arenas or when entering the show ring. Horses must be led to and from the barn. Exhibitors are allowed to have assistance for safety reasons. The exhibitor must be in the immediate area while getting the assistance. This assistance is limited to handling, and NO EXCEPTION is made which allows someone other than the exhibitor to ride the horse. Driving exhibitors may have an adult ride in cart for safety (helmet required).
- 19. No one may approach the judge before or during the show. Technical questions should be directed to the ring steward, or if they are not available, to the Show Office.

- 20. Known kickers must wear a red ribbon on their tail. This will not be judged against the horse. Known biters must wear a green ribbon in their forelock. This will not be judged against the horse.
- 21. Exhibitors are REQUIRED to enter a showmanship class. Members taking the non-state qualifying showmanship class may not enter a 2nd showmanship class.
- 22. Exhibitors may enter a maximum of 5 other premium classes for a total of 6 premium entries. Members can choose to enter Western Riding as a 6th premium class. Western Riding is the only exception to increase the 5 class maximum.
- 23. No exhibitor will be excused from a premium class without authorization of the Superintendent. Such requests must be made at least 1 hour prior to class in order to be considered. If an exhibitor does not show in a premium class and has not requested removal according to this policy, the exhibitor's eligibility for State sponsored events may be effected.
- 24. Long pants, boots with a cut out heel, and SEI approved (and fastened) helmets, must be worn when mounted or driving on show grounds.
- 25. The entry gate will be held a maximum of two minutes. Exhibitors requiring a tack change must notify the gate person of the request a minimum of two (2) classes before their class is called.
- 26. The Superintendent reserves the right to combine or divide lots, in accordance with ATCP 160.04 and ATCP 160.7. If a question arises, the decision of the Superintendent shall prevail.
- 27. WALK TROT EXHIBITORS MAY NOT CANTER but are allowed to enter these classes. Cantering by WALK TROT Exhibitors will result in disqualifications during these classes.
- 28. \$1.00 per lot number, non-refundable fee will be charged.

1. Exhibitor Eligibility & General Guidelines:

• Each exhibitor is allowed a maximum of 20 total entries within the Poultry Department including Junior and Open entries. Exhibitors shall be allowed one (1) entry per lot number.

• A \$.75 per lot number, non-refundable fee will be charged with the exceptions of Classes H & I.

All exhibitors who are under the age of 18 shall be required to attend a mandatory learning workshop
to be eligible to show. Exhibitors under the age of 18 shall only be exempt from attending this
workshop if they have participated in the Jefferson County Fair

Poultry Show for more than four consecutive years. Exhibitors which have chosen to exhibit eggs or posters only shall be exempt from attendance at the learning workshop.

- All exhibitors must perform a minimum of two (2) hours of volunteer service in conjunction with this show. Volunteer service shall include; 1 hour of show set-up, ½ hour of barn duty and ½ hour of show tear-down. Exhibitors who do not participate in volunteer service shall forfeit all premiums and trophies for that exhibition year.
- Exhibitors are encouraged to decorate their cooping area to promote a positive image of agriculture. Coops and animals must be kept accessible to the public while the barn is open or as designated by the Su perintendent. All waste, feed, manure and trash should be disposed of properly.
- All exhibits will receive the best care and protection the surroundings will afford, but they are at all times—subject to the owner's risk. All exhibitors are expected to conform to Jefferson County Fair participation and exhibition policies. Failure to comply may result in premium and awards forfeiture, dismissal from the grounds and being barred from immediate and/or future exhibitions. The Superintendent(s) reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations; split or combine classes; accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

2. Animal and Exhibitor Safety:

- All exhibitors are strongly encouraged to display positive animal welfare practices while at the Fair. The Superintendent(s) reserves the right to disqualify and/or remove exhibitors/entries deemed to not be presenting positive animal welfare practices.
- · No animals other than those entered will be permitted in the East Building.
- Due to animal wellness and safety concerns all poultry are restricted to the designated East Building and the immediate surrounding area. Animals found outside of the designated area will be immediately disqualified. The Superintendent(s) has the discretion to approve special circumstances.
- For public safety and liability reasons exhibitors may not use space in or around their exhibits to conduct any type of direct contact/petting or photo opportunities geared toward fairgoers/public.
- Animals deemed uncontrollable and unsafe to exhibit will be dismissed from the show ring and/or fair grounds. The Superintendent(s) retains the right to warn the exhibitor and dismiss any animal deemed unsafe or uncontrollable at any time. No premiums will be awarded if an animal is dismissed.
- Exhibitors and visitors are prohibited from handling birds other than their own without the consent of the Superintendent(s). Violation will result in loss of all premiums.
- Eggs laid at the Fair become the property of the Jefferson County Fair and will be properly disposed of at the Superintendent(s) discretion.
- All market entries should be market ready (age and condition) and will be weighed. Market Entries that do not receive a weigh-in weight will not be judged.

3. Equipment:

- Tack: Show boxes, feed, bedding and other show equipment which is used for the care of the poultry must be kept neatly in the club's designated tack area and out of the public aisles. It is import ant to keep all livestock and livestock housing areas orderly and safe to demonstrate a positive image of animal agriculture to the public.
- · Carrying Cases: All exhibitors are required to remove their carrying cases after caging their entries.
- Coop Cups: Two cups of appropriate size must be provided by the exhibitor for each bird being shown. No disposable type cups, paper, pastic or styrofoam will be permitted. Cups must be secured in a manner that they cannot be spilled by birds. Cups must be placed in cage prior to poultry being checked in. Feed and water will be supplied, but all exhibitors are responsible for the feeding and watering their own birds. Poultry must have access to fresh water at all times.

4. Health Records:

- Persons exhibiting poultry at Jefferson County Fair must send a copy of Official Documentation or Form 9-2 demonstrating that their birds are pullorum-typhoid free prior to July 1. Poultry may not be exhibit ed at Jefferson County Fair unless accompanied by the required health forms. All documentation received will be retained by Jefferson County Fair and shall not be returned to the exhibitor. The Jefferson County Fair will not be responsible for pullorum testing. All poultry over 4 months of age, except pigeons, shown in public exhibition must show proof of disease status by presenting one of the following:
 - Certified flock status (Official Documentation)
 - NPIP Participant or Affiliate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Tested Flock Certificate
- Wisconsin Associate Flock Certificate
 - Wisconsin Individual Poultry Test Report (Form 9-2)
- Individual identification must be on the test report
- · Youth Exhibition Exemption
- Leader Letter and Hatchery Receipts
- All Poultry will be health inspected upon entry. Poultry with any external parasites (lice, mites, fleas) will be disqualified from competition and will be removed from the show at the Superintendent(s)' discretion. Exhibitors must check their birds in with the superintendent(s) before placing poultry in coops. Wet poultry will not be accepted at time of entry.
- If, at any time, any poultry shows evidence of a contagious or infectious disease, it shall be removed immediately from the exhibit, quarantined or harvested as directed by the Jefferson County Fair Veterinarian or the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection Repre sentative. All poultry exhibited may be subject to quarantine or harvest if any contagious or infectious disease is discovered among any of the poultry in the exhibit.

5. Class Definitions:

- · Cock, Hen, Old Male, Old Female hatched prior to the calendar year shown.
- · Cockerel, Pullet, Young Male, Young Female hatched during the calendar year shown.
- Questionable age verification will be determined by the Superintendent(s) or by the department judge and that decision is final.
- · Chicken and Pigeon Must be at least eight (8) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- · Waterfowl Must be at least ten (10) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- · Turkeys Must be at least fifteen (15) weeks of age at time of exhibit.
- Birds must be entered and exhibited in the class created for that specific breed and variety. The any other variety division is solely for varieties which have no other class. Birds incorrectly entered by the exhibitor will be disqualified.

6. Identification:

Per state requirements all poultry must be marked with numbered leg bands which must appear on the entry forms and must be recorded on the back of the entry tag, by the exhibitor, when the bird is cooped. All pigeons must be seamless banded with a numbered band from a recognized banding organization in the current year.

7. Cooping

- The show will be cooped in a classified manner as to breed, variety and sex. The Superintendent(s) re serves the right to consolidate coops.
- Exhibitors must keep cages clean throughout the fair. Cages found to be in unsanitary conditions will re ceive a notice to remedy the situation. If conditions are not brought up to standard the entry shall be dismissed from the exhibit. No premiums will be awarded if a bird is dismissed.

8. Judging:

- Judges may disqualify birds which are incorrectly entered and those which are not a true breed rep resentative. Judges also reserve the right to disqualify birds of questionable condition and not place unworthy entries. Exhibitors and spectators shall not converse with the judge during judging. Coop tags will be covered at the time of judging. Shows will be judged according to APA rules and regula tions with the following exception:
- Fowl shall be judged by the latest revised edition of the American Standard of Perfection, copyrighted by the American Poultry Association, Inc.
- Pigeon shall be judged by comparison and judges will use the National Pigeon Association Standards as their guide.
- Sticker awards will be placed on coop tags upon completion of judging. Exhibitors are to pick up their ribbon/trophy awards at the completion of the show on Friday.
- Herdsmanship shall be divided by large and small club at the Superintendent(s) discretion and shall be awarded by 4-H or FFA club affiliation.

- 6. Baled hay display is to be a slab approximately 6" thick, wrapped in a heavy duty plastic bag. Plastic wrap or oversized bags are not to be used. DO NOT TAPE entry tag to the bag.
- 7. Stalk exhibits of corn are to be displayed with the roots on. Remove ALL soil from the roots and exhibit your stalks in a CLEAN 5 gallon bucket. Do not use plastic bags. Tie stalks together loosely with twine.
- 8. Pecks are to be exhibited in a one Gallon Zip Lock Bag. Grain and haylage must be 1" below the top. Grain judging will be based on uniformity of kernel, soundness, percentage of foreign matter, damaged grain and weight per bushel.

Rules:

1. All State of Wisconsin and Jefferson County Junior Fair rules apply. In addition the following rules will also be enforced.

- 2. All photography work exhibited in this department must have been made since the last county fair. Ex hibitors must enter classes that match the unit and year in which they are enrolled. Exhibitors may enter only one exhibit per lot number.
- 3. Exhibitors may enter any class and lot numbers appropriate for Grade with a maximum of 20 projects. During Face to Face judging, exhibitor can only have 10 projects judged at one sitting. All exhibitors will have equal opportunity to spend time with a judge.
- 4. Photo entries will be judged and awarded ribbons as follows: Story telling ability within the photo will be 20%; photo quality and mounting will be 30%; and picture composition will be 50%. The only exception will be the Graduate Portfolio in Class H Photography Portfolio.
- 5. Photographs entered must demonstrate the exhibitor's knowledge of photography. All entries MUST be the exhibitor's original work. A copy, in whole or in part, will be disqualified.
- 6. Photo sets of 3 may be cropped no smaller than 3" x 3". Cropping a photo must improve the composition and have some background. Photo sets will contain photos no larger than 3" x 3" to 4" x 6". Photo enlargements must be 5" x 7" 8" x 10". Cropping must improve the composition and have some background.
- 7. Photo exhibits must be mounted onto a sturdy piece of black or white poster board. Sizes: Photo sets of 3 on a 11" x 14"; 8" x 10" enlargements on 11" x 14"; 5" x 7" enlargement on 8" x 10". Optional: A thin material, such as construction paper may be mounted under photos. This under mount should not extend more than ¼" from beneath the edge of the photo.
- 8. Mounting: Photos and any optional under mount should be securely mounted with a sturdy adhesive such as glue, rubber cement or archrival adhesive. This must be done before judging day.
- 9. No other decoration, captions, or title will be allowed. The only exception will be the Captioned Photos in Class H "Photography Projects".
- 10. Entry tags need to be mounted on the front of the exhibit, with tape or rubber cement. DO NOT attach with string or ribbon. This must be done before judging day.
- 11. All photos that are created by or from a computer-editing program will be considered digital photo graphs and must be entered in the digital class.

- 5. To prevent spoilage, keep cold foods cold and hot foods hot. Use coolers or insulated containers for transporting foods.
- 6. Display trays will be provided for all food entries at time of judging. Bring string to attach Entry Tag
- 7. A microwave oven will be available for reheating during judging.
- 8. NO recipe may include a mix NO MIXES OF ANY TYPE!! (Ex. Pancake, muffin, bread machine, pasta, cake, Bisquick, brownie, etc.)
- 9. Recipe MUST be on a 3" x 5" or 4" x 6" index card neatly written or typed so the judge and others can read it. These cards will be displayed with the food item during the fair for fair-goers to read and copy. Exhibitor WILL be dropped one placing without this recipe card.
- 10. All entries should be appropriate serving size as listed by lot #.
- 11. Every item that exhibitor brings should include 1-2 new techniques learned.
- 12. Bring appropriate silverware (knives, spoons, etc.) for the project. Especially knives to cut and serve pies and cakes!

- 12. Only one entry per lot number allowed per member.
- 13. Previous years entries may NOT be re-entered!
