### Bonham Elementary Update

Thank you to the residents who voiced their concerns about the proposed closure of Bonham. The time, energy, and support that our neighborhood gave to fight this issue demonstrated what can be accomplished by working together - Bonham has been spared for now!

#### **SACS Spring Grant Program**

The San Antonio Conservation Society (SACS) is offering a targeted spring grant program for residential properties in the southeast section of our neighborhood. With the cooperation of the KWA and the City, the Conservation Society held two free workshop sessions for homeowners in March. The workshops featured information about housing related programs, funding sources, architecture, and local history, and enabled attendees to ask questions of skilled contractors who are wellversed in home problems and solutions. If you were unable to attend the workshop and would like more information about the grant program, please contact the KWA office. The deadline for grant applications is April 20 at 4:30 p.m.

#### **Special Event Permit Parking**

We have been trying to structure a wellrounded and unbiased questionnaire for distribution to the entire neighborhood concerning First Friday parking issues and the related graffiti and trash problems. This questionnaire will ask residents if they would like street parking to be restricted on their block during special events. We will record all responses to determine which blocks have a majority of residents in favor of restricting street parking. We will then pursue the City to designate First Friday as a special event.

Of the 80+ emails we've received, the overwhelming majority would like to see something done to combat the parking issue, although several areas don't want restricted parking unless the rest of the neighborhood votes to have restricted parking. In other words, if several blocks vote to restrict parking then it would just move the problem to the blocks that vote not to restrict parking. Several discussions on this issue have led me to believe that the time is right for this change and that all of the parties involved will end up supporting the direction being suggested.

# FAIR\*VIEW: Too Big or Not Too Big

In the following article, I offer some general thoughts about the Fair. Please be

on the lookout for the "Fiesta Edition" of this newsletter, to arrive later this month. That issue will contain invaluable information about the Fair, survival tips, and free admission for residents.

#### **Neighborhood Ideas**

It seems like the Fair keeps getting bigger and bigger, but that's not necessarily what the neighborhood wants. As a community, we've had many formal surveys, informal discussions, and committee debates. Consequently, for many years, the Fair Committee has been sensitive to these concerns and has struggled to find ways to contain the Fair and limit its negative effects.

Although the Fair Zone may still feel crowded, the

number of booths has decreased in the last years. There has also been an attempt to move Food Booths around so that no one house has a BBQ in front of it each year. The Fair itself stopped any effort to advertise, although we do receive some indirect advertising as an Official Fiesta Event. In the last several years, we have significantly reduced our entertainment budget, which may indirectly affect attendance. The Fair's admission policy may also limit event size.

From time to time, it has been suggested that we relocate the entire Fair to the area south and east of Alamo Street (in the "Baja" some would say). We have looked into that possibility, but have been stymied by the narrow streets and fire marshal requirements. There is also the enormous cost of the electrical system, which we own but that was "fitted" for the current Fair Zone. At least for now, the footprint of the Fair Zone remains the same.

A number of people have told me there's no way to limit the size of the Fair. I hope that's not true. If you have ideas about improving the Fair, please contact me. **Outside Help** 

Regardless of the sheer numbers who attend the Fair, we cannot operate without support, especially as it becomes more difficult for the neighborhood residents to shoulder the entire burden of running what is essentially a small business. This year, support has come from new and exciting corners.

Valero Energy will provide financial sponsorship for the King William Stage, as well as hundreds of volunteers to operate our beverage booths. Volunteers will also come from Rackspace, ACCD, and Page Middle School. Say Sí will launch a two-year program for developing a video that showcases all the great things the Fair allows our nonprofit to do.

But still we need YOU! We need help with a variety of tasks, such as marking booth placement, supervising stage and booth placement, greeting Fair-goers at the Admission Booths, posting signs and banners, removing signs and banners, monitoring the parade route, answering questions at the Information Booths, riding the trolley, coordinating beverage sales, assisting vendor setup, etc. Please check out our new interactive volunteer form: http://www.kwfair.org/volunteers



## **Fair Admission**

Fair admission this year will be \$3 for adults, free for children 17 and under. Admission will be required for all adults entering the Fair Zone. If you're interested in buying bulk admission for parties or family, be sure to see the Fiesta edition of your newsletter coming soon.

## Fair Zone Parking

Extensive details about the Fair will appear in the Fiesta edition of the newsletter, to appear in your mailboxes in late April. Until then, please take note of this important preliminary information for all those who live in the "Fair Zone."

The Fair Zone closes on Friday, April 28, 2007, and residents will need to park at the H-E-B headquarters Friday night if they would like to move their vehicle from the neighborhood on Saturday. Space is available for off-street parking during the day Friday at the Blue Star Art Space, but your vehicle must be moved by 5:00 pm.

On Fair day, Saturday, April 28, the Fair Zone will be closed to residents until 8 pm at night. Please note this is a later time than in past years.

Once the Fair Zone streets are reopened to residents on Sunday, April 29, we ask that you refrain from parking on the streets until Sunday at noon for two important reasons. First, we are planning to have the streets cleaned Saturday night, and vehicles parked in the street interfere with that effort. Second, the Fair's electrical system will not be picked up until Sunday morning, and we cannot do that if vehicles are parked on the wiring.

## Pre-Fiesta Brush Pick Up

You may start to put items at the curb for the Fiesta brush pick up on April 13. The brush pick up itself will happen on April 23 and April 24. The brush trucks will be followed by street cleaners in the evening of April 24 or in the morning of April 25.

To ensure accessibility for collecting the piles and sweeping the streets, please do not park in front of the brush piles beginning on April 23 until after the street cleaners have come through. The trucks will make only one pass through the neighborhood.

# Bonham Elementary Update

The Bonham Elementary School community wishes to thank the King William Association for its strong continued support of our historic neighborhood school, as evidenced most recently by the response of the paid borhood to the pa

neighborhood to the news of Bonham's inclusion on a list of nine schools being considered for possible closure by SAISD. The neighborhood association's response was timely, well organized, overwhelmingly positive and thus very gratifying to those whose jobs and children's education were "on the line." Thank you!

As of now, Bonham is no longer being considered for closure in the upcoming school year. Two schools – Bowie Elementary and



Cooper Middle School – are still on the list and will be recommended to the School Board by the District Administration for closure in 2007. The District Superintendent, Robert J. Duron, has been very emphatic in saying that the school consolidation process is just beginning and would continue for several more years to come. It is possible that the remaining seven schools on the List of Nine will find themselves once again being considered for closure as early as next year.


As one of School Board President Julian Trevino's appointees to the District's Facilities Advisory Committee (FAC), I will say that, in my opinion, the process whereby all SAISD schools were evaluated for their "efficiency" left a lot to be desired, and the results of the efficiency analysis are therefore suspect. Several of the criteria used in the matrix analysis were, as far as I and others can discern, biased against small historic neighborhood schools, against small campus acreages, against those having special populations that "cost more to educate," against those with smaller class sizes, and against those whose staff have many years of experience and higher credentials and therefore carry higher staffing costs. No wonder several wonderful high performing schools ended up on the list!

At the third and most recent FAC meeting held on March 8, the committee was unable to reach consensus on an endorsement of the District staff's efficiency analysis. A fourth FAC meeting may be scheduled, presumably to consider revisions to the analysis. If this same analysis is intended to be used in future considerations of school closures, it is imperative, in my judgment, that the analysis be overhauled. Stay tuned for more on this issue!

Meanwhile, Bonham is proceeding with its application process for Internal Charter status and will present our case before the School Board at an upcoming meeting. As you know, we are proposing through our charter application both academic program aspects (languages, fine arts, and science emphases) as well as school reconfiguration aspects (going PK-8) -- decidedly an ambitious, though sound, plan for Bonham's future. With an extensive community consensus-building process behind us, a well thought out plan, the overwhelming support of our school parents and staff, and the unanimous support of our neighborhood and downtown area associations (again, THANK YOU!), we believe we are in a strong position to secure the approval of the school board, our last hurdle before becoming an internal (or in-district) charter school.

Your neighborhood association's resolution in opposition to Bonham's closure and in support of its Internal Charter plan (academic program and PK-8 extension) is greatly appreciated, and may well help to secure Bonham's continued success far into the future. 


Nix House view from East Johnson (Portico Residential LLC)

# The Nix House Recognized as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark

The Nix House, 434 King William, has been recognized as a significant structure in Texas history by being named as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark by the Texas Historical Commission. This designation is the highest honor the State of Texas bestows to a historic structure for architectural integrity and historical associations.

Portico Residential LLC has succeeded in restoring one of the oldest mansions in downtown San Antonio into one of the leaders of energy efficient design. The project is being studied as a successful example of integrating

historic preservation with sustainable green design at this year's American Institute of Architect's (AIA) National Convention in San Antonio in May 2007.

You are invited to attend the dedication ceremony of The Nix House at 434 King William on May 5 at 11:00 a.m. A tour of the house is scheduled after unveiling a new, Texas Historic Commission cast-medallion historic marker. Speakers for this brief event will include Dr. Félix D. Almaráz, Jr., distinguished professor at the University of Texas at San Antonio, and Michael Buckley, Director of the Real Estate program at Columbia University in New York City. The event coincides with the publication of a new book entitled, "The Nix House, Innovation and Style in Texas' Oldest Historic District," by King William Resident Roy R. Pachecano, published by Watercress Press. The book

chronicles the 1899 development of a pair of houses in King William by the prominent Nix family and reveals remarkable career beginnings—including that of a young, unknown architect named Atlee B. Ayres who studied at The Met in New York in 1894—that would eventually rise to transform the skyline of downtown San Antonio and usher in a new health care industry.

As time goes on, it only makes sense to have the parking directed to the commercial lots along S. Alamo, S. St. Mary's and S. Presa, and to have the merchants arrange transportation along these commercial corridors to facilitate the less agile members of the public. #### Graffiti

The First Friday related graffiti was particularly bad in February and March. Thanks to Harry and Molly Shafer and their clean-up team for quickly combating the graffiti to keep our neighborhood beautiful. It sure seems to me that the problem is escalating rather than abating. Efforts by Southtown and their new Director have not come to fruition. It is a multi-faceted problem that will require efforts along several lines of communication and problem-solving. We are looking at numerous methods of addressing and funding solutions to the problem. If you have any suggestions, please email them to the office for consideration.

#### **Architectural Review Committee**

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) has been meeting regularly to review and make recommendations on all King William area Historic Design and Review Commission (HDRC) agenda items. The ARC is a new project for us and is ever evolving. Our goals are twofold: to let there be a source of assistance to anyone in the neighborhood needing help in planning any improvements and to let the neighborhood know that we respect the Historic nature of our improvements and will not let unauthorized/unpermitted projects continue without being addressed by City Planning, the HDRC and the City permit/code compliance departments.

#### Train Noise

The Board has established a subcommittee to examine the possibility of developing railroad quiet zones. We have contacted the City's Public Works Department to ask for their assistance in investigating the establishment of railroad quiet zones at the Probandt and South Flores crossings. At this time, we have not yet received a response from the City.



## Tails from the Cat Lady KWA Renews Support of Spay &

### Neuter Program

The King William Board of Directors recently approved additional funding for the Spay & Neuter Program that was introduced last year. This program allows residents to get reimbursed for having their animals spayed or neutered. Under this plan, residents will be reimbursed for the following services:

- Neuter of a Male Dog: \$50.00
- Spay of a Female Dog: \$70.00
- Neuter of a Male Cat: \$30.00
- Spay of a Female Cat: \$40.00
- Rabies Vaccination: \$10.00
- Feline Combo Testing: \$15.00
- Heartworm Testing: \$15.00

Only residents of King William are eligible for this program. In order to be reimbursed, a resident must follow the following auidelines:

· Owners can take the animal to any low cost spay and neuter clinic or to their private Vet.

· They must turn in an itemized receipt with the owner's name and address printed on it.

· The services must have been provided starting in January 2006.

• There is a limit of three animals per household

· The amounts listed are maximum amounts. If a resident pays less than the stated amounts then they will only be reimbursed for the actual amount of the service.

· Funding is not available for routine examinations and vaccinations.

A limited amount of funding is available for this program. If anyone would like to donate to this program, checks can be made payable to the King William Association. Please make reference to this program on the memo line of your check. For questions please call Gretchen Garceau-Kragh at 846-7794.

# Out in the Garden with Alan Cash

Once the weather warmed, spring came upon us quickly. Rains came timely so that blooming plants are making a real showing. I hope you noticed the white blooming Mexican Plum tree at the



back gate of the Steves Homestead at 509 King William St. The vines with bright yellow trumpet like flowers seen around the neighborhood are Carolina Jasmine which always blooms early. Next, look for Cross Vine on the fence at Cedar and Stieren, and Confederate Jasmine on the fence at King William and Johnson. All three vines

are evergreen and can be found this time of year in most nurseries. Mimosa is a pink blooming tree that will bloom soon. Its flowers are fragrant and the tree has a canopy of filtered shade due to its lacey leaves. You do not see them much, but there is one at 318 Mission St.

Do not forget that climbing roses and mountain laurels should be trimmed after their spring bloom.

With warm weather and rains come spring flowers, but also weeds. Weeds are easier to control if pulled soon after they sprout. Also look for unwanted trees, such as hackberry, which grow quickly and may not be noticed until they emerge above a hedge or shrub.

One of the popular new roses is Knock Out. It is not an antique rose, but has many of the same good characteristics. It grows to a height of 3 to 4 feet, blooms from spring to frost, and can be trimmed as needed with hedge trimmers. It is disease-resistant and tolerates a wide range of soils. Knock Out sounds better than sliced bread but remember, as with all roses, the more sun it gets, the better.

If you would like to grow fresh herbs for your kitchen, but do not think you have enough sun, try growing them in containers. Some herbs that are easy to grow for a wide variety of dishes include rosemary, oregano, thyme, society garlic, and basil. Put each herb in a 12 inch pot or larger, with soil that drains well. The pots can be moved as the sun location changes with the season. If the pots are placed on top of the ground, put some type of saucer under them to prevent ants from getting into them. Once established, herbs need little water.

Bees and butterflies are needed for plant pollination. Attract these beneficial insects to your garden by putting in a birdbath and planting their favorite plants. These include honeysuckle, Mexican heather, lantana, and butterfly bush. If you grow mustard greens, let some go to seed because their flowers are good insect magnets.

For a pleasant time and to get ideas for your garden, visit the Botanical Gardens on Funston a few blocks east of Broadway. Visit often as the seasons change, but spring is an especially good time.

Garden Note: A few aches and pains are signs of a busy gardener.

### Trees Project Update -Water Hoses Needed

This is an update on trees that have been planted along streets as a joint project between the King William and Lavaca neighborhood associations. As of this newsletter 231 trees have been planted, including 42 initially planted as part of

the Mission Trails Parkway between Pereida St. and the underpass by Brackenridge High School. Most of the trees were obtained from the City nursery at no cost, but many were purchased with funds contributed by individ-

uals. The project is ongoing and future progress will be reported.

## Community-Wide Fire Ant Management

It's fire ant season again! As you may have noticed, battling fire ants can be difficult. Many times you treat your yard, but your neighbors don't treat theirs and their fire ants just move over the fence! For longer lasting fire ant control, it is best to treat with your neighbors using baits. Baits have low toxicity and are applied at very low rates because they will be picked up by fire ants as food. Fire ants take the baits back into their nest and feed the food to the queen. When the queen dies, the fire ants die. Baits are also safe to use in yards where children and pets play. Baits are applied at such low rates that chickens, birds, and wildlife cannot pick up enough bait to get sick.

Community-Wide Fire Ant Management Programs work best because more neighbors treat their yards at the same time. If you are interested in participating in a community-wide fire ant management program, Texas Cooperative Extension will help coordinate the efforts, choose the best bait, and apply the bait. All you have to do is sign up if you are interested and pay for the bait. The more people that participate, the lower the price per home; but the average price per home is only \$2 to treat both front and back yards.

Texas Cooperative Extension is an educational agency that provides free educational programs to Bexar County. We have information about many different subjects including: food and nutrition, food safety, agriculture, natural resources, horticulture and gardening, 4-H clubs for

### Southtown Urban Mainstreet Alliance Goes Wi-Fi

Southtown Urban Mainstreet Alliance is currently testing Wi-Fi technology for Southtown merchants to use as a marketing tool to draw locals and visitors to the Southtown Business District. Soon the entire Southtown business district will have wireless internet access for everyone to use as they visit the district's shops and eateries.

The development will be done in three phases: the first phase will cover the S. Alamo Street and Durango Street intersection south to the Blue Star Complex located at S. Alamo and Probandt Street. The second phase will cover S. St. Mary's Street south to Eagleland Drive. The third and final phase will include Durango Street and S. Presa Street south to Florida Street.

The principle of this initiative is to help create a climate for the attraction and retention of visitors to Southtown by using Wi-Fi technology as an economic development strategy. In the future, Southtown will also use this technology as a cultural tourism tool by providing a self-guided walking tour Podcast for people visiting Southtown and the surrounding historic neighborhoods.


