The Mission City Hot Rhythm Cats is a 6-piece (formerly 4-piece) traditional jazz band based in San Antonio. The band organized in early 2008 and is comprised of several former members (shown listed with an asterisk) of the Jim Cullum Jazz Band. The band recently added bassist Tim Paco and reed man/vocalist Pierre Poree to their regular lineup. Both Mr. Paco and Mr. Poree are from New Orleans, relocating to San Antonio to escape hurricane Katrina.

During a personal interview with the author, co-leader and trombonist Mike Pittsley, along with co-leader and cornetist/clarinetist David Jellema, both stated that the change to a 6-piece band has been extremely positive, with the band receiving excellent reviews for the group's enthusiasm, as well as for the band's high level of musicianship.

The group frequently adds talented, well-known local area guest musicians to their lineup from time to time. The group cites influences such as Louis Armstrong, Bix Beiderbecke, Jelly Roll Morton, Jack Teagarden and Fats Waller (among others), as well as some of the hot Chicago-style jazz bands of the 1930's and 1940's.

As a result of the new 6-piece instrumentation, the Mission City Hot Rhythm Cats has also been in demand to perform material from the big band swing era, citing swing influences such as Louis Jordan, Louis Prima, Benny Goodman and Count Basie.

Iditarod Takes Sarida Bradley Back to Alaska

How did a South Texas girl become a fan and fundraiser for Lance Mackey, three-time consecutive winner of the 1100 mile Iditarod dog sledding race? Longtime KW resident, former KWA president and Fair Chair Sarida Bradley grew up in an Air Force family and moved to Elmendorf AFB near Anchorage in 1969. She went to high school there and graduated in 1972.

During those years the sprint races at Fur Rendezvous, a winter

festival similar to our fiesta, dominated the dog sled races in the state. Her family would go downtown to see the race starts. Sarida remembers wandering around the dog trucks while eating a caribou sausage and watching the mushers get their dogs lined out.

Her mom worked at a bank downtown and she was acquainted with some of the well known mushers because they did their banking there. At that time, she heard rumors of a dog team race that would be from Anchorage to Nome, 1100 miles!

Sarida's family left Alaska in 1972, missing the first Iditarod, which took place in March 1973. The coverage of the race was one sentence on the evening news with Walter Cronkite. In the 1980's the coverage consisted of quick highlights but none of the strategy that makes the race so compelling. Everything changed in the late 1990's when the internet made it possible to read the Anchorage Daily News online for Iditarod reports. Then Cabela's put up a website. The Iditarod Trail Committee went online, so then three daily reports were given to compare the strategy and maneuvering. Sairda has been following the Iditarod online for a decade, which has fed her addiction and allowed her to follow individual mushers and teams.

Lance Mackey first caught Sarida's attention in 2004. In 2005 he won the Yukon Quest and placed 7th in the Iditarod. The guy ran two 1100 mile races back to back, winning one and placing in the top ten of the other!

Sarida started looking for everything she could find about Lance Mackey on the internet. His story captivated her. He was diagnosed with throat cancer right after his first Iditarod. The radiation treatments left him without saliva glands and even a year later he was still on a feeding tube. He had nerve damage in his left hand from the radiation and had to have his left index finger amputated. Sarida was especially touched by reading about how his dogs had helped to bring him through the ordeal. It all seemed rather spooky to Sarida because she underwent cancer treatments at the exact same time. Different cancer, breast, but still that spring and summer were four rounds of chemo, radical surgery, and later two months of radiation treatments. She also suffered nerve damage from the radiation therapy. And like Lance, the love and trust of a dog helped her through the toughest days of her ordeal. Her "angel dog" Lucky is the same age as Lance's incredible lead dog, Larry.

Lance became a huge inspiration to Sarida and in 2007 he became the first continued on page 4



Out in the Garden with Alan Cash



Do you have a yard or a garden? A yard is just a place with green growing things that have to be maintained every couple of weeks. A garden is a tranquil paradise where you can relax, read a book, or just sit and enjoy the fruits of your labor. Add a wind chime to top it all off. No need to travel far and wide. Your garden can be your own private resort away from the hustle and bustle. These comments are from Mr. Neil Sperry, well known gardener, in the latest edition of his "Gardens" magazine.

Although not a good time to plant, summer is a good time to check out your neighbors' gardens to see what is doing well and make a list of plants to add to your own garden. Here are a few suggestions for beautiful drought tolerant plants. Remember

drought tolerant does not mean no watering needed. All plants do better with periodic moisture. Lantana is good for sunny locations and attracts butterflies. New varieties have a wide selection of colors and can be found at most nurseries. Firebush attracts hummingbirds, and adds a bright orange to the garden. A good example can be seen in the front yard at 421 E. Guenther. Thryalis has bright yellow flowers and attracts butterflies. One can be seen in the front of 203 King William St at the end of the drive. All of these shrubs are perennials, are generally free of pests and should be trimmed back to about 6 inches high around Valentine's Day.

A large shade tree I consider to be exotic because of its foliage is the Mexican Sycamore. If you sit in the Carlos Cortez "wooden" bench in Upper Mill Park on Washington St. and look across the river you will see a well shaped tree with leaves that are light green on top and gray on the underside. Go when there is a light breeze. The leaves seem to change color as they move in the wind. Mexican Sycamore will add to your garden for over 50 years. A small tree with flowers is the Desert Willow. It will get about 20 feet tall, and has trumpet shaped flowers most of the summer and has no pest problems. You can find them in either white, pink, or burgundy colors. The Desert Willow attracts hummingbirds and has a light shade so you can grow other plants underneath it. It is a good choice for courtyards, patios, and small yards. A good example of an 8 year old tree can be seen inside the fence at 327 Cedar at the corner with Stieren St.


