## War Memorial Unveiling, Dedication 10:30 At Courthouse

Formal dedication and unveiling of the Lea County war memorial located on the southwest corner of the courthouse block is planned from 10:30 to 11 a.m. on Saturday, November 10. The ceremonies are planned under the auspices of Lovington American Legion Post # 68, Charlie Pappas announces. The memorial, a black granite structure, was over a year in the planning stages. Each war where Leal one in Lea County to attend. Countians lost their lives, World War I, World War II, Korean and the Vietnam war, are represented on the three black granite slabs. The full names and branches of service are included.

Among those taking part in the event will be representives of Lea County Commission. The Commission provided monetary support for the project. A flyover by Confederate Air Force is scheduled and a group of Lovington High School band members will participate, Pappas notes. Taps will be played by a band member.

Pappas says that an attempt has been made to invite Gold Star mothers of this area, Legion Auxiliary members who have lost loved ones in war. American Legion honor guards from Lovington, Hobbs, Eunice and Jal are expected to take part.

He emphasizes that the dedication will initiate a campaign by the American Legion to make Lovington, New Mexico, the leader in the nation in the number of flags waving over the community on special days with emphasis on the proper display of the American flag on national holidays and during designated events. "This is not a short term aim, however long it takes, we will get it done," he says. The idea was already in the planning stages before September 11, he adds. Fifty flags were on order a number of weeks ago and will soon be available, he concludes.




Noel E. Robbins World War I






The Lovington High School band played The National Anthem and Keith Rall played taps.
