Rules and Procedures

Competitive Exhibits are at the heart of the Tanana Valley State Fair. Each year thousands of exhibitors showcase the products and skills that represent the best in our talented community.

Thank you for taking part, and we hope you enjoy the Fair!

Entry Rules

- 1. Entries are open to all people.
- 2. Every exhibit must be entered in the name of the grower or maker, except for livestock, which must be entered in the name of the owner.
- 3. Junior exhibitors (age 16 and under) must enter Junior Departments, with their current age written on the exhibit tag. Age will be used only to determine age group and for labels.
- 4. Exhibitors may enter as many competitive exhibits as they wish, but only **one (1) entry per Lot per Class**. Refer to the livestock rules in Division 4 for livestock entry information.
- 5. No entry may be allowed to compete in more than one (1) Lot within the same Class.
- 6. Up to five (5) entries may be entered in the Non-Competitive Class. Check your Division to see if this class is available.

 Non-Competitive Classes will not be judged for any ribbon or monetary prize.
- 7. TVSFA reserves the right to refuse any exhibit not deemed appropriate for Fair entry. These decisions are made at the discretion of Fair staff and Superintendents.
- 8. Except for live animals or plants, no entry shall have been previously exhibited at the Tanana Valley State Fair.
- 9. Entries that were entered Non-Competitively in 2019 may return in 2021, but you must have the corresponding Non-Competitive Tag for proof of Non-Competition.
- 10. No smoking, drinking, or eating is allowed in the exhibit areas. No drugs or drug paraphernalia are allowed on the Fairgrounds. Beer and wine may be consumed only in areas designated on the Fairgrounds by the Board of Directors.
- 11. No animals are permitted on the Fairgrounds, with the exception of service dogs and animals entered as exhibits or as part of a Fair-sanctioned special event.
- 12. No "For Sale" signs, business cards, religious or military pamphlets permitted on any exhibit during the Fair. Displays are strictly Exhibits only.

- 13. Any exhibitor found plagiarizing or turning in an entry that is not their own work will forfeit ALL premiums and placing for the year.
- 14. Entering an exhibit into the Fair indicates that the exhibitor accepts and agrees to abide by all rules and procedures as presented in the Exhibit Guide and other incidental materials.

Entry Procedures

- **1.** Log into the Fair Entry System and create a profile. Each exhibitor must create a profile on the ShoWorks System. This account is permanently on the system and can follow you to any future TVSFA Fair using the system!
- **2. Print your Entry Tags.** An entry tag must accompany each exhibit. The exhibitor is responsible for checking in and printing out their exhibit tags.
- **3. Know your deadlines.** Exhibitors are responsible for knowing applicable entry periods, and to abide by those dates.
- **4. Enter your exhibit.** Turn in your exhibit with its exhibit tag to the Superintendent or clerk at the Division locations. You can get help on Entry Day from designated Staff or Volunteers. Call the Fair Office if you need access to a computer before Entry Day.
- **5. Remember to pick up your Exhibit and Premiums.** Take note of the dates to reclaim your items and winnings and be sure to bring the receipt!

Unfortunately, we cannot accept entries before or after the published entry dates and hours. If you are unable to attend Entry Day, consider asking someone to take your entry to the Fair with your items!

Judging

All judges at the Tanana Valley State Fair are volunteers, with the exception of livestock judges. The Tanana Valley State Fair Association recognizes that qualified and impartial judges are the most important part of the process. Quality judging is recognized as one of the keys to quality exhibits at the Fair. Another key is exhibitor understanding of how exhibits are judged. The following is a description of the two methods of judging used at the Tanana Valley State Fair.

<u>DANISH:</u> The DANISH system of judging uses an established standard of perfection as the basis for judging. Each exhibit is judged individually in comparison to the standard. The judge then decides whether the exhibit is deserving of a Blue Award (Excellent), Red Award (Good), White Award (Worthy), or no award. It is possible, therefore, to have several Blue Awards in the same Class. The Danish system is used in the 4-H/FFA and Girl Scouting Divisions.

AMERICAN: In the American system of judging, exhibits are placed before a judge or panel of judges who rank the entries. A standard of quality is employed here also, but the exhibits are judged against the standard as well as each other. Most often the best exhibit receives a First Prize ribbon, the next best exhibit a Second Prize, and so forth. However, the judge(s) may determine there is no exhibit worthy of first prize, and may award the best exhibit a second prize, or even no prize at all. A judge is not required to award any prizes at all, but may not award the same prize to more than one exhibit.

Judging Rules

- 1. Judging may begin in any Division immediately following the closure of entries. If judging is on a point system, judging may begin as entries come in.
- 2. The TVSFA reserves the right to close exhibit areas to public viewing until judging is complete.
- 3. Superintendents have the right to disqualify an entry if entry procedure or preparation has not been followed.
- 4. Superintendents may change the Class of any entry if it has been entered in the wrong Division or Class, or may create a new Lot for any Class entry identified as appropriate. This must be done before judging begins or the entry will be disqualified. Although Superintendents are encouraged to reclassify exhibits when appropriate, it is the responsibility of the exhibitor to enter their exhibit in the correct Class and Lot.
- 5. All junior entries that do not place will receive a Participant Ribbon.
- 6. All judging is final. A formal protest may be submitted if the exhibitor feels they have been unfairly judged.

TVSFA Protest Policy

Decisions of the judges are final. If an exhibitor feels the rules and/or procedures regarding their entry into the Tanana Valley State Fair have been improperly followed or interpreted, a protest may be submitted to the Executive Director at the Fair Office. Questions regarding entry should be addressed to the Division Superintendent. No appeal based on alleged incompetence of the judge(s) will be considered.

Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to talk to the Division Superintendent and/or Competitive Exhibits Manager prior to initiating a formal protest. Should a resolution not be reached after speaking with the Superintendent and Competitive Exhibits Coordinator, a formal protest may be submitted in writing within 24 hours of the event or of the results being made public.

Protests must plainly state the cause of complaint or appeal. Protests will be accepted only from exhibitors, or parents or guardians of exhibiting minors, directly affected by the outcome of judging being protested. All protests shall be accompanied by a \$25 protest fee that will be returned if the protest is upheld.

Exhibit Pick-up and Payout Information

NON-PERISHABLE EXHIBIT PAYOUTS will begin <u>TUESDAY</u>, <u>AUGUST 3</u>, and be available for pickup at the Summer Fair Office during regular hours throughout the Fair.

NON-PERISHABLE EXHIBITS will be available for Pick up August 9, 2-6 PM, items unclaimed on the 9th can be picked-up the 13th & 14th 2-6pm in Upper Totem. Perishable Exhibits can be picked up Monday, August 9, 2-6 PM.

PERISHABLE EXHIBIT & CONTEST PAYOUTS will be available for pickup August 13, 2-6 PM and August 14, 2-6 PM. *Any premiums under \$25 not picked up by 6:00 PM on Saturday, August 14 will be forfeited. All exhibit payouts over \$25.00 will be mailed to exhibitors. Please make sure we have an accurate mailing address on file.

- 1. Non-Perishable Exhibits may not be removed from the Fairgrounds prior to Monday, August 9, 2-6 PM. Special provisions for removal of livestock exhibits are covered in the Livestock Rules listed at the beginning of Division 4.
- 2. Any exhibitor obtaining a premium through false evidence or misrepresentation, or by violation of any of the rules and regulations, shall have the money or other premium withheld by the Fair until the issue has been resolved.
- 3. Livestock and equine exhibitors must adhere to all rules of conduct and responsibility or forfeit any premiums due. See **Livestock Rules and Ethics Policy** for more specific information.
- 4. Premiums in question should be resolved by August 31, 2021 through the Fair office.

Exhibitors are responsible for picking up their exhibits. TVSFA is not responsible for exhibits, premiums, or ribbons left at the Fairgrounds after Saturday, August 14 at 6 PM unless prior arrangements have been made. (For livestock, see **Livestock Rules** in Division 4. Livestock Release).

Exhibit Security

Fair management uses every possible precaution to protect exhibits and property while on exhibition. However, the TVSFA shall not be held responsible for loss, damage, or injury of any kind from any source. Due to conditions beyond our control, Fair management, and/or Association members, will not be held responsible for personal injuries, accidents, or losses sustained by visitors, exhibitors, or other people on the Fairgrounds. Any concerns regarding the security of your exhibit must be dealt with prior to the Fair. Entering an exhibit into the Fair indicates that the exhibitor accepts the inherent risks in displaying their exhibits in a public forum.

The TVSFA Board of Directors reserves the right to interpret these rules and regulations and to arbitrarily settle and determine all matter, questions, and differences in regard thereto, or arising out of, connected with or incident to the Fair, and it reserves the right to rule on any matter not covered.

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Division 1 4-H Club Work

This division is open to 4-H Members only.

RULES

- 1. 4-H exhibitors must be enrolled in their projects by June 14th.
- 2. Participants must enter in the appropriate age division according to their age during the 2020/2021 school year.
- 3. All exhibits must be a result of a 4-H learning experience during the current project year, and should show a progression of skills from one year to the next.
- 4. Exhibitors may participate in interview judging on Entry Day
- 5. Exhibits are judged on the Danish System. Ribbons of blue (excellent), red (good), or white (worthy) will be awarded according to quality in comparison to an established standard.
- 6. Members ages 5-7, as of August 15, 2020, are considered Cloverbud 4-H members and will receive a rainbow ribbon and a \$1 premium per winning entry.
- 7. All exhibits must be clean, neat, and properly prepared for exhibition and judging. Substandard or improperly prepared exhibits or animals will not be accepted.
- 8. 4-H entries are also subject to Fair entry rules and procedures.
- 9. Three (3) entries will be accepted to each lot

EDUCATIONAL DISPLAY

Each Division offers the opportunity to enter an educational display. Individual displays are limited to a maximum of 72 inches in height, 26 inches in width and 30 inches in depth (front to back of display) when exhibited. Displays must be freestanding. Displays must reflect actual club-related work or projects; school-related projects should be entered to Division 20A – Education Showcase. A display may be 3-dimensional or use a notebook. If you choose to do a poster, check Division 1J, Class F to see which Division is more appropriate.

Explanations should include how the exhibit was made or what was done in the project; operating instructions if appropriate; information sources; and what the member learned. Explanations must be complete to qualify the exhibit for judging.

Division 1A 4-H FOOD & NUTRITION

Exhibitor must be enrolled in a food project. All foods must be displayed on appropriately sized paper plate and enclosed in plastic. Recipes must be written on 3"x5" or larger cards and taped to the exhibits. All food exhibits must be safe to taste at room temperature. Dishes that are kept above 140° or below 40° will not be accepted. If a lot has a number of items listed next to it, be sure to include that number of items in the entry. Failure to meet the required number of items in the entry can result in disqualification.

GENERAL INFORMATION

ENTERING: animal or pen of animals must have a stall card (available in the Fair Office and online). Information must match your online entry form.

PURE BREED JUDGING: Purebred registration papers must be available if required and must include animal identification. Add the name of the breed to the Lot number on the stall card. At least three animals of the same breed for large animals and five animals of the same breed for small animals must be entered to be eligible for a Best of Breed ribbon.

JUDGING SYSTEM (LIVESTOCK): Open Class judging in this Division is done using the American System. 4-H and FFA Classes are judged on the Danish System.

GENERAL LIVESTOCK RULES

ANIMAL ENTRY: Exhibit forms and stall cards must be submitted on ENTRY DAY, Saturday July 24, 1-6 PM. Entries will be accepted at the Largen Barn on the Fairgrounds.

DELIVERY TO THE FAIR: All **large animals** must be delivered Thursday July 29, between 4 and 8 PM. The exhibitor is responsible for having each large animal inspected by the veterinarian-on-call before taking the animal into the barn. **Rabbits, cavies, and poultry** must be delivered between 2 and 8 PM on Thursday July 29. Small Animals must be vetted in before animals can be placed in their pen.

STALL AND CAGE RESERVATIONS: Completed entry forms and stall cards must be turned in to reserve stalls and cages on Entry Day, July 24 by 6 PM.

SAFETY: Because of the public nature of the fair, all large animals must be manageable. If the Superintendent(s) determine an animal is unsafe to either the public or the exhibitor, it may be barred from the show ring or the Fair. All exhibitors with horned livestock need approval for entry from species Superintendent. Request for approval may be done before entry day.

ANIMAL CONDITION: All livestock must be free from disease, in good health and good condition. Diseased or unsightly animals will be barred from entry or removed from exhibit on ruling by a qualified veterinarian or Division Superintendent. Test Certificates must accompany the animal.

SWINE: All swine entries must show documentation of complete course of vaccination for erysipelas vaccination consistent with manufacturer's recommendations. An annual booster may be required. Documentation includes: Date the vaccine was given, Name of the vaccine, Manufacturer, Lot, Number, Expiration date (vaccine shall not be expired when administered), dose and who administered the vaccine.

HEALTH REGULATIONS: All livestock will be carefully examined upon arrival for evidence of infectious disease and if such is found, they will be removed from the grounds or held in quarantine and treated at the owner's expense until they can be removed. **All OPEN ENTRY ANIMALS must have the same ANIMAL HEALTH RECORD AND PROOF OF VACCINATION required**

for 4-H/FFA entries. These Guidelines are provided by state veterinarian, Dr. Robert Gerlach. **Proof that Vaccinations were** administered must be submitted on Entry Day.

OTHER ANIMAL REQUIREMENTS: The following animal conditions must also be met:

- CATTLE: To prevent escape or loose cattle, no rope halters or neck collar ties are permitted. Horse halters used on cattle are not allowed. Cattle halters must have a buckle closure. All cattle may be required to be tied based on space/pen availability at Cattle Superintendent's and General Livestock Superintendent's discretion.
- RABBIT TATOO: All rabbits must have a legible, permanent tattoo in the left ear. Tattooing is available on Entry Day for a fee
- CAVY TAG: Cavies must have a tag in left ear. Tags are available on Entry Day for \$1.00/tag.
- **DEHORNING/DOCKING:** All dairy goats, market sheep, and finished market beef over seven months of age must be dehorned. Sheep must be docked.
- **POULTRY BANDING:** All poultry must have a leg or wing band. Bands are available on Entry Day and Delivery Day for a fee, per animal, depending on size. Include band number and color (if applicable) on entry forms and stall cards.

NUMBER OF ENTRIES: Large livestock exhibitors may make more than one entry per Lot, except in 4-H/FFA Market Livestock Project. See Division 4C, Poultry & Rabbits, for specific limits per Lot for each variety.

EARLY REMOVAL OF EXHIBITS: All animals must remain on exhibit and cannot be removed from the Fairgrounds before the end of the proper exhibit limit, except with written permission of the Division Superintendent. Any animals removed in violation of this rule will forfeit all premiums and any deposit.

LIVESTOCK RELEASE: All livestock exhibits must be picked up on Sunday, August 8, 7 AM. Exhibitors must arrive by 7 AM to participate in the cleaning of the Barns. Stalls must be clean and inspected by Superintendents before animals are released from the Fair. Prizes and premiums will be forfeited by exhibitors who do not participate in the 7 AM final Barn cleaning and/or who leave unclean stalls, pens, and cages. Animals not picked up by 11 AM will be considered abandoned and will be impounded and subject to a daily charge for animal care.

^{****}Keep original in Record Book. Make a copy to turn into Vet with animal on Fair delivery date***

- **ADMISSION:** Exhibitors must purchase either daily or season passes for entrance onto the Fairgrounds to show and tend their animals.
- **SELLING TO THE PUBLIC:** No "For Sale" or "Free" signs may be displayed on animals, stalls, or cages during the fair. Giving rides for hire on any animal is strictly prohibited.
- CARE OF ANIMALS: Exhibitors are responsible for ensuring their animals always receive proper care including daily food and water available. All animals, pens, equipment, and aisle spaces are always to be kept clean. All exhibitors are required to provide their own feed. The Fair will furnish wood shavings for bedding of all animals. If other bedding is desired, the exhibitor must furnish it. Manure must be deposited in designated areas only. Exhibitors are required to abide by the individual rules set out by each Division for which they have animals entered. If a Division Superintendent needs to call the veterinarian for emergency animal care during the Fair, the owner will be responsible for the charges. If a Division Superintendent determines that the health and welfare of an animal is at risk due to insufficient or inadequate care, the exhibitor may be disqualified and asked to remove their animals from the Fairgrounds. In extreme circumstances, the animal may be delivered to the Fairbanks North Star Borough Animal Shelter at the exhibitor's expense. The Tanana Valley State Fair Association has no liability for sick or injured animals. Exhibitors who fail to take proper care of their livestock will forfeit all premiums.
- **POSTMORTEM EXAMINATION:** The Fair requires a postmortem examination of any animal which dies during the Fair. The animal's death must be reported to Fair management within four (4) hours, and Fair management will contact the attending veterinarian. All charges incurred for veterinary service or necropsy will be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- **BARN DUTY:** Open, 4-H, and FFA exhibitors **must** sign up for two 2-hour Barn duty shifts in each area they are exhibiting in during the week to help keep the barns, aisles, and surrounding areas clean, and to answer questions from the public. If there are not enough exhibitors to fill Barn duty shifts, the Superintendents may make the Barn duty shifts a longer duration. The Superintendents will determine duties.
- **LIVESTOCK AREAS:** Specific areas are designed for activities such as showing, judging, exercise, transport, feeding, watering, and grooming. No animal will be allowed outside the designated areas. The owner or exhibitor must attend to all animals being exercised. Failure to comply with this rule will result in forfeiture of premiums and/or expulsion from the Fairgrounds.
- **OVERNIGHTERS:** A parent or guardian must accompany all youth exhibitors under 18 spending the night in the livestock parking area. Livestock exhibitors willing to volunteer as night guards in the Livestock barn should call the Fair Office or the Division Superintendent. A midnight curfew will apply to the livestock buildings, barns, and parking areas. **Quiet hours of 11 PM to 7 AM must be observed.**
- **EXHIBIT SECURITY:** The TVSFA management uses every possible precaution to protect the exhibits and property while on exhibition. However, the TVSFA shall not be held responsible for loss, damage, or injury of any kind from any source. Due to conditions beyond our control, the Fair management and/or Association members will not be held responsible for personal injuries, accidents, or losses sustained by visitors, exhibitors, or other people on the Fairgrounds. Any concerns regarding security of your exhibit must be dealt with prior to the Fair. Entering an exhibit into the Fair indicates that the exhibitor accepts the inherent risks in displaying their exhibits in a public forum.
- PARKING: Vehicle entry for the purpose of caring for or exhibiting animals will be made only through Green Gate (see Fairground map). This area is for Livestock and Equine exhibitors only. Livestock/Equine parking will be as follows: \$3 per day for day parking only (no overnight), \$5 per day for a 20' x 40' space, and \$7 per day for a 20' x 60' space. Passes are available through the General Livestock Superintendent. No parking passes will be sold through the Fair Office or at the gates. Superintendents and Show Managers have reserved spaces. Failure to honor these will result in a towed vehicle. One must have a parking pass PLUS paid gate admission to be allowed into this area. NO EXCEPTIONS WILL BE MADE. The wristband issued for Livestock and Equine areas is for identification only and does not replace a parking pass or paid gate admission. Parking passes for Livestock Exhibitors may be purchased from the General Livestock Superintendent on Entry Day when turning in entry forms. Failure to abide by the directions of the Fair staff or Security team will result in a verbal or written warning and potential expulsion from the Fairgrounds. Purchase of a Livestock parking pass implies agreement to these conditions and rules.

ETHICS POLICY FOR ANIMALS

Every person with a live animal has a moral obligation to conduct themselves with the highest standards of honor and dignity toward said animal and all people involved. Those ethics are to be used as guidelines for fair treatment of animals while on the property of the Tanana Valley State Fair Association.

Exhibitors, owners, or responsible persons in possession of animals on the Tanana Valley State Fair Association property shall at all times conduct themselves honestly and display good sportsmanship. TVSFA requires all exhibitors, owners, trainers, or responsible persons to be responsible for the care and management of their animals and to keep them healthy, clean, and safe.

ANIMAL PREGNANCY: No animals will be allowed in the last half of their pregnancy. Any exhibitor who has an animal that gives birth at the Tanana Valley State Fair will be banned from the Fair for one year for first violation. The exhibitor of the animal(s) will forfeit premiums for the year. Second violation of this rule will result in a five-year ban of the exhibitor and animal(s).

CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Adapted from the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall always deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to both Junior and Open Class exhibitors who compete in structured Class of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at the Tanana Valley State Fair.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, and responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of Fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership, and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- **2)** Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of vaccine drug residues. The act of entering an animal in the Tanana Valley State Fair is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or responsible person for Fair management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local statutes, regulations, and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state, and local statutes, regulations, and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally, and the cost of the tests will be the responsibility of the owner of the animal. If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock does not indicate the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, the cost of the tests will be the responsibility of the Tanana Valley State Fair Association. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory, to which it is sent, is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.
- 5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- **6)** The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair management, or other fair officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether they were instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the Tanana Valley State Fair Association for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the Tanana Valley State Fair without recourse against the Tanana Valley State Fair Association.
- **11)** The act of entering of an animal in the Tanana Valley State Fair is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or responsible person that he or she has read the Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of, and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or local statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.



JUDGING: The Danish System will be used, giving blue, red, or white ribbons. The judge will place animals in a ranking order for sale purposes.

SALE OF ANIMALS: Judges will make the final decision on whether animals qualify for the

Market Auction. Only animals taking a blue or red ribbon in a confirmation Class will be allowed to be sold at the auction. Animals taking white ribbons will **not** go to the auction.

WEIGH-IN: All market animals will be weighed in at the specified time.

MANDATORY ITEMS DUE ON ENTRY DAY: Due July 24, 2021 Completed Record Book, Copy of Market Livestock Agreement, Animal Health Record & Proof of Vaccinations, Buyer contact Sheets, Auction Biography, W-9 and Ethics Policy for Animals/Code of show Ring Ethics.

PAYMENT: All money is handled through the 4-H Livestock Committee. Checks from sale of animals will be mailed to exhibitors by the 4-H Livestock Committee.

AUCTION: Animals entered in Market Livestock Class will be offered for sale at a public auction on Friday, August 6, starting at 6 PM. Sale order will be published prior to the auction. Animals committed for sale cannot be withdrawn, and no substitutions are allowed. Placing will determine sale order. The exhibitor must be prepared to enter the sale ring when they are called. Failure to produce the animals for sale, unsportsmanlike behavior, or misrepresentation may result in being barred from the sale. A qualified auctioneer will conduct the sale. Brochures are available to interested buyers through the 4-H Office located at 1000 University Ave, room 109.

BUTCHERING SMALL ANIMALS: Exhibitors are responsible for making sure that rabbits, chickens, ducks, geese, and turkeys are butchered, dressed, and delivered to the buyers within 14 days of the fair, unless another date is mutually agreed upon.

STALL RESERVATIONS: Stall reservations and cards will be filled out at the mandatory meeting, date to be announced.

HEALTH: Proof of negative EIA (Coggins Test) is required for all equine animals before entering the Fairgrounds.

RULES: Read the General Rules and Regulations carefully, paying special attention to those dealing with livestock exhibits and

equine barn rules.

PARKING: Vehicle entry for the purpose of caring for or exhibiting horses will be made only through the Green Gate (see Fairground map). This area is for Livestock and Equine exhibitors only. The Superintendents can arrange purchase of parking passes for exhibitors participating in Fair Halter. No parking passes will be sold through the Fair Office or at the gates. Superintendents and Show Managers have reserved spaces. Failure to honor parking regulations will result in having your vehicle towed.

ETHICS POLICY FOR CARE OF ANIMALS: Every person with a live animal has a moral obligation to conduct themselves with the highest standards of honor and dignity toward said animal and all people involved. Those ethics are to be used as guidelines for fair treatment of animals while on the property of the Tanana Valley State Fair Association. Exhibitors, owners, or responsible persons in possession of animals on the TVSFA property shall at all times conduct themselves honestly and display good sportsmanship. TVSFA requires all exhibitors, owners, trainers, or responsible persons to be responsible for the care and management of their animals and to keep them healthy, clean, and safe

SAFETY RULES:

- 1. Arenas close at 10 PM.
- 2. Proper headgear and footgear is required.
- 3. No riding double.
- 4. Handle horse in a safe manner.
- 5. Safety and courtesy required.
- 6. Animals must have proper care.
- 7. Stallions over 6 months old cannot be handled in 4-H.
- 8. Lead your horse outside arena areas.
- 9. A midnight curfew will apply to the livestock buildings, barns, and parking areas.
- 10. Quiet hours of 11 PM to 6 AM must be observed.

BARN AND STALL RULES:

- 1. No unauthorized motor vehicles in arenas or barns.
- 2. No smoking in barns or stall areas.

- 3. No advertising posted on stalls.
- 4. No personal padlocks on stalls.
- 5. No storage or feed outside of stalls.
- 6. Do not leave horse in stall with tack on.
- 7. No dogs allowed in barns or stall areas.
- 8. Horses and equipment must be stalled in appropriate areas.
- STALLS ARE TO BE CLEANED EACH DAY.
 Cleaning means picking out manure and wet

shavings. Bedding does not have to be taken down to mats, except when a horse is checked out of the Fairgrounds. If you leave your stall dirty, you will be charged a FEE to have it cleaned. This is your responsibility and part of the program.

DRESS CODE: Fitting and showing: All exhibitors are required to wear black pants, white, long-sleeved shirt (tucked in), belt, appropriate riding boots, and a western hat or an ASTM/SEI approved riding helmet. Western and English Class: Refer to The Alaska 4-H Horse Rules Book for attire appropriate for discipline. Chaps are prohibited in bareback equitation. Western Chaps are optional in Stock Seat Equitation, Trail, Reining, Gymkhana, and Western Games. English half chaps and paddock boots are allowed; however, boots must match chaps in black or brown.

Food Preservation

Special Preparation: Containers should be standard type canning jar when applicable or of clear glass (no aluminum cans) and must be completely labeled with the name of product, date of preparation, canning method, and length of processing time. Vegetables and meats should be canned by the pressure cooker method. Jams, Jellies, and Soft Spreads must be prepared using the water bath method. Inversion method & paraffin wax is not accepted on any food preservation entry.

All containers will be opened, and contents will be inspected by the judges. Any product not properly sealed will be disqualified. To avoid food waste, an exhibitor may bring a duplicate entry for display with their judged entry. For entries with duplicates, the judged entry will be stored in refrigeration for pick-up by the exhibitor.

Handbooks: Please refer to the Alaska Cooperative Extension Booklet, "Attractive & Safe Food Preservation Exhibits," for exhibit preparation. You may obtain copies by calling 474-1530 or visit cespubs.uaf.edu/publications, keywords 'attractive & safe.'

Labels: Note the date the product was sealed/prepared, complete name of product, pounds of pressure (if appropriate) and canning method. State amount of alcohol used in alcoholic beverages. Failure to label entries correctly will result in disqualification. See diagram for an example of how to label entries properly. All entries must be labeled. If possible, place the label on the jar rather than the lid.

Work that still has grades and other scholastic markings on it may be entered into Division 20A-Education Showcase. All entries in the Creative Writing Division must adhere to the following requirements:

Use only 8.5"x11" papers (may be white or pastel). All work must be typed and double-spaced; 12-point font is highly recommended. Margins should be 1" on each side. Small artwork or small graphics are only accepted if they are an integral part of the manuscript. Make sure your name does not appear anywhere on the manuscript.

Manuscripts of 2 or more pages must be fastened together (stapled). Do not use binding, plastic covers, or a cover sheet of any kind except on desktop publishing entries where bound

pages are okay. Re-type work you have done for a Class to be sure all grades and teacher's markings are removed. Do not staple the exhibit tag to your entry. Manuscripts that are not properly presented on entry day will be refused.


