Special Note to Exhibitors

The premium list as published will be our guide, so **read all the rules and be certain you understand them** when entries are made. The Executive Committee reserves the right to correct or interpret any part of the rules or premium list.

Before making your entries, notice carefully the rules and regulations governing the department in which each entry belongs, then be sure to fill out the entry form (one form may be used for all divisions), giving the correct division and class number.

If possible, make your entries before the last day; this will save confusion and waiting at that time. Notice carefully the time of closing entries. Be sure to have your livestock entries in place according to the Fair and Judging schedule. Fees for changing entry after entries close will be double the entry fee. If you make an entry and decide not to show it, advise the Secretary and your entry will be taken from the Judges' books. There is no charge for this.

The Fair Management has arranged to give the patrons of the Warren County Fair the best from an educational and entertainment standpoint, with more livestock and agricultural exhibits of all kinds.

The Fair Management believes that Warren County is entitled to the best. In turn, they have confidence that you will support their efforts by your attendance and cooperation, for which they thank you sincerely.

Schedule for Taking Entries

The time for making entries in all departments will be Monday, June 18 and end Saturday, June 23. Time is noon to 7 PM weekdays and 8 to noon on Saturday. All entries will be made at the Warren County Extension Office, 909 East 2nd Avenue, Indianola. All stall rent, pen rent, or other fees are due at time of making entry. Late entries will be accepted, provided there is room, until the Judges' books have been posted, and a \$25 late fee per person will be assessed, until June 27th @ noon. Late entries must be made with Fair Secretary by noon.

General Rules and Regulations

- Rules of the Fair must be observed by all exhibitors. The
 Executive Committee reserves the right to withhold part or
 all premiums from exhibitors who fail to observe the rules
 that are in force when entries are made.
- 2. Competition in all departments, unless otherwise designated, is limited to residents of Warren County or members of 4-H or FFA clubs in Warren County.
- 3. Entry Tags will be furnished by the Secretary. Exhibitor should write the division and class number and name of the article on the tag and attach it to some conspicuous part of the article. It must not be removed until the close of the Fair.
- 4. Livestock and Open Class Exhibitors may only bring exhibits that have been entered with the Fair Secretary. All entries must be in place according to the Fair and Judging Schedule printed in the front of this book. 4H and FFA Static Exhibits for judging on Saturday prior to the fair, do not require pre-entry.
- 5. Fees for changing an entry after entries close will be double the original entry fee. Fees must be paid and in good standing prior to the first day of the fair.
- 6. The Association will take every possible precaution for the safe keeping of the articles or animals on exhibition after their arrival and arrangement, but will not be responsible for any loss or damage that may occur.
- 7. All articles or animals competing for premiums must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner, unless otherwise specified. The Superintendents may require satisfactory proof of ownership. Exhibitors of purebred animals must file certificate, if required by the Secretary or Superintendents to show eligibility for record of registry.
- 8. Articles which are the product of the soil must be entered in the name of the producer. Articles which are the result of mechanical or artistic skill may be entered in the name of the contriver. Household articles and fancy goods offered for premium must have been manufactured and owned by the exhibitor. Judges are authorized to eliminate from competition any articles which do not comply with the rules.
- 9. Where there is but one entry in a class, first premium will be paid only if reported worthy by the Judge. In the event of only one exhibitor in an Open Class, and showing more than one animal, only one premium will be paid.
- 10. Any exhibitor, who shall in any way interfere with the awarding Judge, Committee, or policy during the examination of goods or animals, shall forfeit any premiums that may be awarded.
- 11. Entries in the championship classes will be automatic. (No entry with the Secretary is required.) Only first place winners are eligible for championship competition. If reserve is awarded, first and second place winners are eligible.
- 12. No premiums or other obligations will be settled until the close of the books on September 30th. No checks will be issued for any amount \$2.00 and less.
- Consumption of alcoholic beverages will be prohibited on all fairground property.
- 14. The Association reserves the right to limit electrical consumption by participants.
- 15. All Warren County Fair 4H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

- 16. Per IA Code 673, Exhibitors are responsible for the safety, security, care of animals, and damage to person and/or personal property caused by their animals.
- 17. Dogs are not allowed on or off leash on the fairgrounds in any livestock areas or show areas. Exception: Service dogs and 4-H/FFA dogs on leash for Wednesday show
- 18. Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers.
- 19. Re tag Procedure: A market beef superintendant must be present at the time of a re tag to witness, reinstall tag, and obtain signatures on a triplicate form with one copy going to the Extension office, Fair office and Exhibitor.
- 20. CHECKS MUST BE CASHED IMMEDIATELY!
- ALL checks issued by the Warren County Fair (premiums and/or auction) are VOID if they are not cashed within 90 days of the date issued. After 90 days from the date on the check, uncashed checks will become a donation to the Fair Board. If you do not wish to receive a premium check from your fair exhibits please advise the Fair Secretary prior to Fair.
- No Cell Phones or text messaging allowed by any exhibitors during shows or contests.
- 22. No solicitation on Warren County Fairgrounds during the annual Fair no handbills, signage, handouts or flyers can be distributed or placed on car windows. Only information/advertising from paid commercial vendors can be given away from their specific commercial booth space or authorized vendors. No other advertising can be placed on fairgrounds property during the annual Fair event (barns, poles, windows, etc.) Without prior consent from the Warren County Fair Board of Directors.
- 23. Alcohol Policy Alcohol is not allowed or sold on the Fairgrounds property during the dates of the annual Fair event. Law enforcement will be called to handle infractions to the rule.
- 24. Infraction of any rule/regulation may result in immediate disqualification from current year fair and future fairs.
- 25. FSQA certification must be current for the 2018 fair by
 _______. YQCA will be the only certification
 method accepted for 2019 and beyond. ALL species except
 horse and dog MUST be certified.

County Fair Campground Rules

- 1. All sign up and fee payment must be made during entry week. No refunds and no transfers.
- 2. No campers will be allowed to park in their **assigned** spot before 12:00 noon. Sunday, July 22nd Any campers that arrive prior to 12:00 noon will remain outside the camping area until that time. Campers will be parked between 12 and 3 unless arrangements made after 3:00 p.m. Campers at north end grounds near horse arena will follow the same rules.
- 3. Camping fee is \$150 per camper. All tents (including any tents accompanying a camper) will be charged \$75.
- Anyone asked to remove their tent or camper will do so with no refund.
- Campground Curfew is midnight. Lights must be out and campground must be quiet.
- 6. Adult Supervision is required for each camper/tent.
- 7. Consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on all fairground property.

- 8. Any vehicle without a tag or wrong color tag may be towed at the owners' expense.
- 9. Campers must be out by 4:00 p.m. Monday or pay \$18.00 for another night.

Livestock Auction

As of November 2001, it has become necessary to make a change to our policies and procedures for the livestock auction. These changes have come about due to a complaint from one person that was made to the Federal Stockyards and Packers Commission regarding the timeliness of checks being available to exhibitors.

Because of this complaint, we must speed up the collection and payment process. Checks must be issued market livestock exhibitors whether money has been collected from the buyers or not. In order to comply with federal requirements we must make checks available one week following the sale. The checks will be made available to exhibitors on Monday, August 6th. (We will be billing quicker, thus we will make a note on the invoices to buyers that we are complying with federal regulations and that we would appreciate prompt payment.) The lag time between collection and payment will necessitate the fair establishing a line of credit to cover exhibitor's checks.

THE FAIR WILL BE COLLECTING A 1.5% COMMISSION ON ALL MARKET ANIMALS GOING THROUGH THE AUCTION.

The 1.5% commission covers:

- * Administrative expenses (computer program, overtime costs,etc.)
- * Interest expenses (for line of credit)
- Indemnity fund expenses (covers uncollected marplaint, these expenses were deducted from check.)
- Newspaper ad (prior to complaint these expenses were deducted from check.)

The beef, swine and sheep check-off will be collected as usual. The fair regrets this decision, but the federal requirement has taken this situation out of our control. This commission collection will include cattle, swine, sheep, goats and poultry.

Senate File 362 Iowa Code 673 Chapter

5A. "Domesticated animal pathogen" or "pathogen" means a microorganism, biological agent, or toxin causing disease, illness, or death to a human, if the microorganism, biological agent, or toxin is primarily transmitted by human contact with a domesticated animal, manure from a domesticated animal, or other excretions or body fluids from a domesticated animal.

5B. "Domesticated animal premises" or "premises" means a location under the management or control of domesticated animal activity sponsor where domesticated animals are regularly kept for three or more consecutive hours.
6A. "Fair Authority" means the Iowa State Fair authority established in section 173.1 or a fair as defined in section 174.1.
6B. "Fairgrounds" mean real estate under the management or control of a fair authority, including land, buildings, and improvements, and which includes but is not limited to areas reserved for domesticated animal events or domesticated animal activities.

673.4 Fairs - Domesticated Animal Premises - Liability.

1. A fair authority is not liable for damages arising from a claim by a participant or spectator alleging injury or death caused by a domesticated animal pathogen transmitted at a domesticated animal premises located on its fairgrounds. This subsection

applies regardless of whether a domesticated animal is present on the domesticated animal premises, when the domesticated animal pathogen is transmitted, or whether a domesticated animal present on the domesticated animal premises is engaged in a domesticated animal activity.

2. Subsection 1 does not apply to the extent that the participant or spectator proves that the fair authority failed to post a warning sign at a conspicuous place at the domesticated animal premises as required in section 673.5.

673.5 Warning Sign - Notice.

1. A fair authority shall post a warning sign at a conspicuous place on any domesticated animal premises located on the fairgrounds. The warning sign shall be clearly visible to a person visiting the premises for the first time. The sign shall have a white background and the sign's notice shall be printed in black letters minimum of one inch high in the following form:

WARNING DOMESTICATED ANIMAL PREMISES

Under the Iowa Code Chapter 673, the Fair is not liable for a domesticated animal pathogen transmitted from this domesticated animal premises. Take necessary sanitary precautions including by not touching your face or consuming food or water until thoroughly cleansing and drying your hands after your visit. As soon as possible after your visit, thoroughly cleanse your hands using an appropriate soap and water thoroughly dry them after cleansing.

IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics*

Exhibitors of animals at livestock show shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics", fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates

from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.

- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminated with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received form the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/ or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no personal shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible personal shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.

- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in many publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statues, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.
- *This Code of Ethics was adopted at the Association of Iowa Fairs, Inc. Convention in December 2002, and revised in December of 2003. We, as members of the association, are printing it in our Fairbook as a Guideline for conduct. All rules and decisions, whether General and/or Specific, of the Warren County Fair take precedence.

SOUTH CENTRAL IOWA SHOWDOWN WAYNE COUNTY, CORYDON SUNDAY, JULY 29, 2018 AT 5:30 PM

Warren County has been invited to send the following animals to the South Central Iowa Showdown. Supreme Champion Market Animal, Supreme Champion Breeding Heifer, Grand Champion Market Lamb, Supreme Champion Market Lamb, Grand Champion Market Goat, Grand Champion Breeding Doe, Grand Champion Breeding Gilt and Grand Champion Market Hog. This is completely optional and a choice the exhibitor and family will make. If the Grand or Supreme animals chooses not to show, the Reserve will be asked. The show is an Open Show not a 4-H or FFA Show. The champions of each species will be given a packet of information from the fair office if they choose to participate. The Livestock will be released by each division Superintendent chairman or their appointed representative at noon on Sunday. If the 4 market animals wish to sell in the auction on Monday, the animals must be back on the grounds by 7 AM Monday. If the animals will not sell on Monday please notify the fair office. More information will be given to the families that qualify.

If the exhibitor leaves the grounds at noon and does not show at the SCIS, the exhibitor will be ineligible to show at the next year's fair. The animal can NOT go to the show if it has sold through the auction.

The only animals eligible to leave the grounds are the Champion animals.

No companion animals may leave the grounds.

IOWA YOUTH CODE OF ETHICS

Youth are expected to be sincere, honest and act in sportsmanlike ways at all times. Youth represent the entire program and their behavior reflects on their parents, leaders, club and the entire youth program. All adults involved with the youth program, leaders as well as parents, are expected to set positive examples and serve as positive role models by what they say and do. Any youth who breaks the code of ethics or allows another person (adult or peer) to talk them into violating the code of ethics agrees to forfeit all prizes, awards and premiums. The youth may also be prohibited from exhibiting at this and future exhibitions including the Iowa State Fair and other county, state or regional exhibitions.

Youth agree to follow these guidelines:

- I will do my own work, appropriate for my age and physical and mental development. This includes research and writing of exhibit explanations, preparing exhibits (such as sewing, cooking, refinishing, etc.), care and grooming of animals, etc. Adult assistance should help guide and support me, not do it for me.
- All exhibits will be a true representation of my work.
 Any attempt to take credit for other's work, alter the conformation of animals, or alter their performance is prohibited. Copyright violation or allowing others to complete your exhibit is considered misrepresentation and is prohibited.
- I will treat all people and animals with respect. I will provide appropriate care for animals.
- 4. I will present exhibits that are safe for consumption. All food exhibits will be safe to exhibit and for judges to evaluate. Other exhibits will be safe for judges to evaluate and for exhibition.
- All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of violative drug residue.
- 6. If any animal requires medical treatment while at the fair or exhibition, only a licensed veterinarian may administer the treatment. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.
- 7. My animal's appearance or performance shall not be altered by any means, including medications, external applications and surgical procedures. Any animal that is found to have changed its appearance or its performance shall be disqualified from the show, and have penalties assessed against the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian by the management of the fair or exhibition.
- 8. I will follow all ownership and possession rules and, if requested, will provide the necessary documentation.
- 9. I will follow all livestock health requirements for this fair or exhibition, according to the state health requirements as printed in the premium book of the fair or exhibition. I will provide animal health certificates from a licensed veterinarian upon request from the management of the fair or exhibition.
- 10. By my entering an animal in this fair or exhibition, I am giving consent to the management of the fair or exhibition to obtain any specimens of urine, salvia, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or

externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the exhibitor, parent and/or guardian to prove otherwise.

- 11. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair or exhibition I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the management of this fair or exhibition for any violation of this code of ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition without recourse against the fair or exhibition.
- 12. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer both, good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
- 13. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in 4-H and FFA events, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use.

I agree to conduct myself in an honest, ethical, and upstanding manner and I understand that disciplinary actions will result if these rules are violated. I understand that I am expected to represent the program in a positive manner. I have read, understand and agree to follow this code of ethics, and any other rules of competition of the fair or exhibition as printed in its premium book.



Requirements for Exhibition of Livestock, Poultry, Birds, Dogs, and Cats at Local 4-H or FFA Exhibitions

- Any evidence of warts, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, draining abscesses or any other contagious or infectious condition will eliminate the animal from the show.
- 2. No individual Certificate of Veterinary Inspection will be required on animals or poultry exhibited at the County 4-H/FFA fair, but the animals must be inspected when unloaded or shortly thereafter by an accredited veterinarian. All animals moving from out of state into an Iowa county 4-H/FFA fair must meet Iowa Animal and Livestock Importation requirements. Each show MUST have an official veterinarian.
- Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.
- Official identification listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection required for all cattle and bison of any age coming in from out of state used for rodeos, recreational events, shows and exhibitions.
 - A. All swine must originate from a herd or area not under quarantine and must be individually identified. Plastic tags issued by 4-H officials may be substituted for an official metal test tag, when there in an additional identification (ear notch).
 - B. Swine originating outside of Iowa. All exhibitors must present a test record and Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that indicates that each swine has had a negative test for pseudorabies within 30 days prior to the show (individual show regulations may have more restrictive time restriction), regardless of the status of the herd, and that show individual official identification. Electronic identification will not be considered official identification for exhibition purposes.
 - Swine exhibitions requirements. "Swine C. exhibition" means an exhibit, demonstration, show, or competition involving an event on the state fairgrounds, a county fair, or other exhibition event. The sponsor of the exhibition must retain an Iowa licensed veterinarian to supervise the health of the swine at the exhibition location. The sponsor must electronically file the approved registration form an obtain approval from the state veterinarian at least 30 days before the event. The registration form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; and the date of the planned exhibition. Sales of swine will not be allowed unless the event has been registered and received approval from the state veterinarian 30 days prior to the event.

D. Swine exhibition report required.


The sponsor of the swine exhibition shall electronically submit to the department the approved report form within five business days after the conclusion of the exhibition. The form includes the name of the exhibition and the address and telephone number of its location; the name, address and telephone number of the veterinarian; the date that the exhibition occurred; the name, address and telephone number of the owner of the swine; and the address and telephone number of the premises form which the swine was moved after the exhibition if such premises is a different premises.



- 6. All dogs and cats exhibited must have a current rabies vaccination certificate, and dogs must have current distemper immunization and parvo vaccination.
- 7. All poultry exhibited must come from U. S. Pullorum-Typhoid clean or equivalent flocks, or have had a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within 90 days of public exhibition and the test must have been performed by an authorized tester. (SEE GENERAL SECTION 1.B) Please note: Poultry purchased from a hatchery and raised for exhibition are not exempt from Pullorum-Typhoid testing requirements. However "Market Classes" of poultry consigned to a slaughter establishment are exempt from the Salmonella testing requirements. "Market Classes" of poultry must be separated from all other poultry by a distance of ten or more feet and/or an eight foot height solid partition.

Warren County Fair Queen Pageant Rules and Regulations

- 1. Each contestant must be at least 16 years of age and not more than 21 years of age on August 9th, the first day of the 2018 Iowa State Fair.
- Contestants must never have been married or have children.
- 3. A county fair queen must reside in the county she represents or an adjoining county if the majority of her activities are in the county she represents. If a fair represents more than one county, the winning contestant must reside in one of the participating counties.
- 4. Each contestant must be an active member of at least one service organization.
- 5. No professional models.
- County fairs are requested to select their candidates by competition in which personality, leadership, and beauty are judged.
- 7. The reigning Warren County Fair Queen is expected to conduct herself in a manner that reflects positively on herself, her family and on the Warren County Fair. Should the reigning Warren County Fair Queen become involved in any activity, including a drug, alcohol related offense that reflect negatively on herself, her family or the Warren County Fair, she may be required to forfeit her crown, title and rights to the scholarship award to the first runner-up.
- 8. Should the Warren County Fair marry or become ineligible before the next queen is crowned, she will forfeit her title, crown and rights to the scholarship award to the first runner up. Should the first runner up marry or become ineligible, she will forfeit title, crown and rights to the scholarship to the second runner up.

Rules for Livestock

- See the General Rules and Regulations and the State Livestock Health Rules and Regulations on previous pages.
- 2. Animals to compose competitive groups need not be named in application for entry, but exhibitor must indicate the group classes in which he/she wishes to make entries.
- 3. Exhibitors must keep their stalls open and stock uncovered from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. during each day of exhibition. Exception: Exhibitors will be allowed to use blankets on sheep and horses up until show day. After completion of the show, blankets will no longer be used to cover any of the animals. All exhibitors are asked to present their stalls in an attractive manner. There will be no blocking chutes allowed in the aisles or doorways. On show day, blocking chutes will be allowed in the aisles; however, safety and courtesy to others shall be maintained.
- Stalls will be assigned by Superintendents. <u>All animals entered must remain until 9 p.m.</u>, <u>Sunday</u>.
 Each exhibitor is expected to furnish his/her own feed. Rabbit exhibitors may use straw. All other exhibitors are to use wood products.
- 5. Exhibitors are expected to obey the Marshall promptly in producing their stock in show rings when requested to do so. No refractory person will be allowed to compete for premiums.
- 6. If a question should arise regarding a market steer breed designation, the following procedure will be followed: A signed written protest will be given to the Fair Secretary by noon on Friday. Every effort will be made to contact the owner by 2:00 P.M. and the owner will then have until 8:00 A.M. Saturday to verify. The executive committee and the beef superintendents will be the final authority.
- 7. Any changes in entry to 4-H/FFA or open in any species after entry closing will be charged double the original entry fee. Minimum charge \$5.00.
- 8. Any family or exhibitor that removes an open class or 4-H/FFA exhibit (livestock or non-livestock) prior to Sunday night at 9 p.m. will NOT be allowed to exhibit the next year and will forfeit all premiums due.
- 9. Cattle will not be allowed in horse barns or stalls. Horses will not be allowed in cattle barns.
- 10. Animals must be in their assigned stalls until superintendents have checked the animals in. Do not go to tieouts until checked in, Wednesday evening at 9 p.m.
- 11. Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement: (copies available from fair secretary) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers.
- 12. No intact males will show in 4-H/FFA shows.
- 13. Retag Procedure: A market beef superintendant must be present at the time of a retag to witness, reinstall tag, and obtain signatures on a triplicate form with one copy going to the Extension office, Fair office and Exhibitor.
- 14. During Pre Fair Picnic, Club Leaders pick up beef stall cards and place according to the map provided.
- 15. Tie Outs Cannot be reserved with anything other than 1 necktie (per animal coming to the Fair) tied to the fence under each numbered space.
 - NO strings, tape, wire, signs, etc. will be allowed to reserve spaces. If put up, it will be taken down.
 - NO Tie out space can be reserved until after 8 AM Monday, July 23. 2018.

- 16. Awnings, Canopies, Tents (with no sides), cannot be placed until after 8 AM Monday, July 23rd, 2018.
 - If any spaces on the grassy areas are marked with posts, wires, strings, etc. It will be taken down until the proper set up time. This includes all species and all grass areas.
 - If it is put up prior to the proper set up time, it will be taken down.

Junior Livestock Exhibiting Rules

The General Rules and Livestock Rules, as printed in this premium list, will apply in all cases unless exceptions are printed under department headings.

Competition in this department is limited to 4-H and FFA members properly enrolled in Warren County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters. In order to show at the Warren County Fair, the Fairboard requires that all FFA members and projects shall comply with the same regulations as 4-H members and projects. No animal project will be shown in Warren County 4-H/FFA division that has been or will be shown in another county fair in 4-H/FFA division the same year.

All Warren County Fair 4H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

4-H All animals (except Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeders) must have been identified on their specific 4-H Identification Report, which was on file at the County Extension Office by May 15. Market Beef & Advanced Cattle Feeder must have been identified on the Market Beef Identification Form (4H-106-bi) and on file in the County Extension Office by February 1.

FFA All animals (except Market Beef & Advanced Cattle Feeders) must have been identified on their specific ID form obtained at the Extension Office and on file with the FFA Advisor by May 15. Market Beef and Advanced Cattle Feeders must have been identified on the Market Beef ID Form and on file with the FFA Advisor by Feb. 1.

Removing or remedying physical defects by any artificial means in animals exhibited will be considered as fraud and deception. Any attempt to improve the showing quality of an animal by artificial means (other than castration or grooming) will not be allowed. All animals showing evidence of such treatment will be barred from exhibition. For clarification, check with project Superintendent or the Fair Secretary.

All livestock must be shown by the member identifying the project except in case of sickness, injury, service in the Armed Forces, or when more than one animal is being exhibited at the same time. The substitute must be another eligible Warren County 4-H Club or FFA Chapter member. Any and all other exceptions must be approved by <u>all</u> respective division Superintendents.

Any 4-H/FFA project removed from the County Fair without official permission of the Fair Executive Committee will automatically disqualify that 4-H/FFA member

- 4. Exhibitor may identify two animals, but is limited to a maximum of one lamb to be exhibited at the county fair.
- 5. Lambs are to be shown at halter.
- 6. Superintendent may combine or divide entries.
- Lambs will be brought in on judging day, Thursday and taken home the day of the show. They cannot be sold at the fair sale.
- 8. Bucket/Bottle exhibitors must follow the fair rules and health requirements as stated in the fair book.
- Third graders may keep bucket/bottle lamb for breeding sheep or market sheep for classes in 2019.
- Oral interviews will be held on Friday, July 27th, with knowledge, health, and showmanship being evaluated in a show ring
- 11. No clipping and fitting of lambs.

- 1) Open class exhibitors are limited to three (3) birds per class per exhibitor.
- 2) An entry fee of \$2.00 per bird must accompany entries or they will not be accepted. A service charge of \$.50 per bird will be assessed to cover veterinarian inspection fees. A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week.

- 6) Exhibitors are responsible for entering birds in the proper class. Incorrectly entered birds will be placed at the bottom of the class. .
- 7) Birds should be in place on Friday by 9:00 p.m. Birds may be placed any time between Wednesday and Friday at 9 p.m., (Exception of Friday until after 4-H judging). Open class judging will begin on Saturday at 11:00 a.m. Birds will be released on Sunday at 9:00 p.m.
- 8) Bantam and Standard breeds will be judged by their adherence to the American Poultry Association Standard of Perfection. No crossbred birds may be entered in these classes.
- In Exhibition Poultry, prizes will be awarded as merited in the opinion of the judge. Any prize may be withheld at the discretion of the judge.

10) TERMS:

- a. Cock-male bird hatched before January 1 of the current year;
- b. Hen-female bird hatched before January 1 of the current year;
- c. Cockerel-male bird hatched on or after January 1 of the current year;
- d. Pullet female bird hatched on or after January 1 of current year.
- 11) Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their birds. Exhibitors must provide feed, feeders, waterers, and clean up pens. Premiums will not be paid if pens are not cleaned or birds are not checked out by release time.
- Once the show has begun, exhibitors will handle birds only at the Judge's request.

- 1. \$1.00 per entry, 1 entry per class, specify division and class. Entries **MUST** be made with the fair secretary prior to the fair. See "Schedule for Taking Entries" and "General Rules and Regulations" for further information.
- 2. Entries limited to Warren County residents and all entries must be the work of the exhibitor.
- 3. All products exhibited in jars, etc., must have been canned since Aug 2, 2017. Canned products must be canned in standard Mason-type, colorless jars made for home canning with new, metal screw bands left on. Products not meeting these qualifications will not be judged. Jellies and jams will be opened if the judge so desires. Secure your entry tag on a rubber band and place it around the neck of the jar. No other labels are to be on the jar.
- 4. All canned products must be canned in compliance with the current USDA guidelines for safe canning. Any entries not complying with these guidelines will be disqualified. The method of processing, headspace, processing time, date of preparation, altitude and county name (not county number) in which the product was canned must be included on the recipe card, not the entry tag. If an entry has been processed in a pressure canner, the recipe card must include whether a dial gauge or weighted gauge canner was used and the pounds used.
- 5. All baked products are to be placed on white paper plates or white paper (cake) boards (furnished by the exhibitor) with entry tags attached along with the recipe used. Either staple or tie your entry tag to the entry and then cover with clear plastic or a zip-lock bag. Do not put the tag on the plastic covering Please use the 6 inch or 9 inch paper plates. Anything coming in on larger size plates may be disqualified. In addition, exhibitor's name should be put in an inconspicuous place on container. You can purchase these paper boards at Michael's, Hobby Lobby, or Walmart.
- 6. Recipes may be printed or typed with black ink on one side only of an 8 1/2 x 11 sheet of paper. A 3x5 or 4x6 inch plain or ruled recipe card many be used, printing or typed on one side only, if not using the sheet of paper. More than one sheet or card may be used, but please number them. To be considered for judging, the recipe must accompany each exhibit. Each ingredient must be listed in exact measurement (type of measurement used, i.e. yeast, self-rising flour must be specified). Follow general proper recipe procedures, listing all steps of preparation, pan size, temperature and baking time.
- 7. Exhibitor's number must be in the upper right hand corner of the recipe; the division and class number in the upper left hand corner.

 Staple the back of the recipe to the back of the entry tag so the judges can see the recipe and it does not interfere with the front of the entry tag.
- 8. YOUR ENTRY MUST BE READY TO BE JUDGED PRIOR TO YOUR ARRIVAL AT THE FAIR. THIS INCLUDES: 1) COMPLETED ENTRY TAGS ATTACHED TO ENTRIES AND 2) RECIPE CARDS STAPLED TO ENTRY TAGS (BACK OF RECIPE CARD TO BACK OF ENTRY TAG). THERE IS NEITHER ROOM NOR TIME TO PREPARE YOUR ENTRY AT THE FAIR. EXHIBITORS WITH ENTRIES THAT ARE READY FOR JUDGING WILL TAKE PRECEDENCE AT CHECK-IN.

- 9. Pies are the only baked product to be judged in container in which they were baked. Pies in classes 840-845 will be judged on the filling and pie crust. NO CREAM FILLING, PUMPKIN OR PECAN PIE. WE WILL NOT ACCEPT ANY ENTRIES THAT HAVE BEEN PUT ON ICE OR IN A COOLER. Glass pie plates are preferred, but not required. Do not put names on the bottom of the pie plate. Pies may be picked up after all judging is finished & before 7 pm on judging day.
- 10. All baked goods shall be covered with plastic wrap or in plastic bags, except Decorated Cake classes and Ugliest Cake classes. Plastic cake covers may be used when entering cakes only. Any entries not wrapped as specified will be judged but not placed. Either staple or tie your entry tag to the entry and then cover with clear plastic or a zip-lock bag.
- 11. No bread mixes, cake mixes, frosting mixes/premade frostings, and prepared pie fillings allowed, except where it is specified to use these products.
- 12. Cake pan size according to recipe. Bread pan size 9" x 5" or size that recipe recommends.
- 13. Any exhibit not worthy of placing will not be given a prize. A first place ribbon does not have to be given if the judge does not feel any entry is worthy of first place. All judges decisions are final.
- 14. All entries, JUNIORS, INTERMEDIATES & ADULTS will ONLY be Accepted from 8:30-9:45 am on Wednesday. Judging will be at 10:00 am for ALL age groups, JUNIORS, INTERMEDIATES and ADULTS.
- 15. Exhibitors will pick up baked goods as soon as all food items in their entry class have been judged. Only a portion of the baked items will be retained for exhibition. Exhibitors are limited to exhibiting four animals, all of which must have been weighed and eartagged, according to Warren County 4-H rules and policies, before Feb, 1, of current year; not more than three can be steers and not more than three can be heifers. Any animals with horns or having central incisor teeth up in wear at County Fair time will not be allowed to show. Must be weighed on Warren County scales at time, place & date designated to be eligible for Rate of Gain ribbon.

All animals must be in their stalls by 9:00 p.m., Wednesday, and stay in the stall until released by the superintendent, after release animals may go to tie outs. Calves will be weighed Thursday, 6:30-8:00 a.m., and will be weighed only once. If any animal is artificially filled or tampered with, in an attempt to adjust the weight, the animal will be sent home. Animals will be divided by weight into approximately equal-sized classes within each breed division.

All Warren County Fair 4H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting. (Exception-horse exhibitors)

No use of paint or coloring agents are allowed. Top 3 animals will be toweled at the completion of the class. Champion and Reserve of each division will be toweled. Any animal showing evidence of painting or coloring agent will be disqualified. If any animal is disqualified, the remaining animals move up 1 place.

All calves will be judged on individuality, quality, and finish; showmanship considered.

There will be a **Prospect Market Calf Class** which will consist of all market steers weighing under 850 pounds and market heifers weighing under 800 pounds. These will show as the first class of the show. Placing will be in groups of blue, red, and white, with ribbon awards only. First place animals will not be eligible to show for Grand Champion.

There will be no blocking chutes allowed in the aisles or doorways. On show day, blocking chutes will be allowed in the aisles; however, safety and courtesy to others shall be maintained. All feed and water will be removed from Market Beef to be sold at the 4-H Auction by 10:00 p.m. on Sunday.

Each eligible animal must return to the show ring for championship drive or forfeit ALL premium money for that animal.

The daily rate-of-gain for each animal will be posted. Special ribbons will be issued to the members exhibiting the top 15% market animals with the highest rate-of-gain.

Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement:

(copies available from fair secretary) Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers. Form due the last day of fair entry week to be eligible for WCP ribbon.

4-H and FFA Market Heifers

4-H/FFA Advanced Cattle Feeding Dept. 101

- 1. The project will be supervised by the Advanced Cattle Feeding Project Advisory Committee.
- 2. One or more FFA/4-H'ers in the same family may own three animals for the project, or one or more 4-H'ers in the same family may have a partnership project with each FFA/4-H'er owning up to three animals in the project. Each owner may designate one calf from the pen to be shown as an individual in the Market Beef classes at the County Fair. The calf must be weighed and tagged, with both a tag designated for the pen project and the Market Beef project, and the animal is to be fed with the other animals in the pen project. All animals must be dehorned.
- 3. Calves must be ear tagged and weighed on the Warren County fairground's scales on the scheduled dates. A weigh ticket on each pen and on each calf identified as an individual will be on file in the Extension Office. Advanced Cattle Feeder animals must be identified on the Market Beef

- Identification Report (4H-106-bi). The identification form must be turned in to the Extension Office by February 1st. I.D.'S postmarked or placed in the Extension Office dropbox on or before February 1 will be accepted.
- 4. Calves are to be purchased on or before weigh-in. Feed records are to begin on the day of weigh-in.
- Each pen of Advanced Cattle Feeders must be fed separate from other pens, individual market Beeves, or other livestock on the farm to be able to be exhibited at the County Fair.
- 6. Accurate records of feed and other costs must be kept. The monthly feed record sheet will be provided and must be sent to the Extension Office or Brandon Reynolds by the 10th following --examples January records are to be in by February 10, etc. Doing this will influence the points received for accuracy in the Proficiency Contest.
- 7. A scheduled visit will be made with each member in January or February by the Advisory Committee. Purpose of the visit will be to evaluate the project at the beginning. Other unannounced visits may be made during the year.
- 8. Members may compete for three separate awards:
 - 1.) A ribbon and money award based on the "on-the-hoof" placing at the County Fair.
 - 2.) Advanced Cattle Feeding proficiency Award, based on the Advisory Committee's evaluation of the member's management practices, interviews, records, feed efficiency, rate-of-gain, cost-of-gain, and a written examination on knowledge of the cattle feeding industry, market trends and member's own operation.
 - 3.) Top Rate of Gain pen will be awarded the Marion Nicholls Memorial plaque. <u>Individual cattle shown in the Market Beef division will not be eligible for rate of gain in the Market Beef division.</u>
- 9. To be eligible for awards, all calves enrolled in the project must be weighed in and exhibited at the County Fair. Animals in the pens must average 850 pounds to be shown. An animal identified as an individual must weigh 850 pounds to be shown in the market Beef classes. They need not be sold if members feel the animals are not yet ready for market.
- 10. Prior to exhibiting at the County Fair, a time will be selected for members to meet with the Advisory Committee for a record analysis and the written examination. Members must have up-to-date records on feed and all other costs at this time.
- 11. In order to assure uniformity in figuring feed costs, the Advisory Committee may establish an index. If copies of receipts for expenses are turned in with feed records they will be used.
- 12. Pen of Three (advanced cattle feeders) calves entered as individuals will not be eligible for the Market Beef Rate of Gain. The Advanced Cattle Feeders will post rate of gain winners with the show sheet.

Check in will be at 7:00-7:30 a.m. Wednesday. Market and Breeding goats must be inspected by a vet or vet appointed representative checked **before** leaving trailer. Do not stall any market, breeding, dairy, or meat goats before they are inspected. Scales CLOSE at 9:00 a.m. Goat, Sheep exhibitors meet with the Superintendents to review showbill in barn. No Changes to show program after 9:00 pm. *Please read the "General Rules and Regulations" and "Rules for Livestock"*.

Any meat goat showing evidence of contagious diseases will be unable to be shown. Disqualified meat goats must be removed from the barn and Fairgrounds immediately. Any goat found to have external parasites, will be disqualified and exhibitor must remove it from the premises immediately.

Exhibitors are expected to care for their meat goats in an acceptable manner. Any abusive care including slapping or excessive modification of meat goats will be grounds for disqualification at the discretion of show officials.

All meat goats must have been weighed and eartagged according to Warren County 4-H rules and policies.

Each 4-H'er may ID at weigh-in 6 meat goats. Each member may exhibit a maximum of six goats (any combination of meat, breeding meat doe or dairy with 6 being total number). **NOTE: Please see page 3 rule #5 of Code of Ethics.**

All market meat goats will be weighed and checked for appropriate county identification during check-in. Any evidence of tampering with the official 4-H & FFA tags will be scrutinized. No reweighs will be allowed. Failed retinal scan will result in no premiums awarded for any goat classes and disqualification.

Weight Limit: All goats must weigh a minimum of 50 pounds. Any weight below 50 pounds will show in a Prospect Meat Goat Class and will not sell. These will show as the first class of the show. Placings will be in groups of blue, red, and

white, with ribbon awards only. First place animals will not be eligible to show for Grand Champion. 4-H Market Meat goat will be divided into divisions by weight.

Age: Wethers must have kid teeth in normal positions at time of check-in, any wether having lost any kid teeth will be disqualified.

Horns: Exhibitors will be required to have horns tipped blunt on all goats before arrival on the grounds. Removal of horns on grounds is NOT permitted.

Hair: All meat goats must be uniformly clipped with 3/8 inch length of hair or less above the knee and hock joints to include the head, excluding the tail, prior to arrival on the grounds. All meat goats should arrive on the Warren County Fairgrounds clipped and show ready.

ENTRY FORM: Copy of the Livestock Identification Report for meat goats, 4H-106-LS, Iowa 4-H Market Meat goat Verification Form for market meat goat, must accompany entry forms with all required information included on the form and submitted to county extension office by May 15.

The registration fee is \$3.00 per head and must be paid with entry. No refunds.

All meat goats must be penned in the assigned pens. All 4-H Meat goat exhibitors must be certified through the Food Safety and Quality Assurance Program.

There will no coloring agent or paint used on any meat goat. Exhibitors in violation will not be allowed to show.

No drugs or medicants of any kind may be administered at the Fair except by the order of the official Fair veterinarian. Uses of any non-approved substances are strictly forbidden. All animals will be subject to random chemical testing and analysis of saliva, urine, blood, other excretions or tissues to determine whether a

substance or drug has been induced or whether a substance or drug has been introduced to interfere with the testing procedure. Positive tests, except for residues which are within FDA tolerance levels, will result in forfeiture of ribbons, trophies, premiums and sale price. Exhibitors and their family will be barred form participation in future Warren County Fairs.

Showmanship: Showmanship will be open to all 4-H & FFA Meat Goat exhibitors. There will be three divisions: Junior—Grades 4-6; Intermediate: Grades 7-9; Senior—Grades 10-12. The showmanship contest will be held at the conclusion of the regular show. 4-H & FFA members will show their own animal in the showmanship contest. Results will be announced at the conclusion of the contest and recipients will receive awards at that time.

No coaching will be allowed from or near the ring. This includes verbal or nonverbal coaching. Violators will be escorted from the barn for the duration of the show.

Division 1: Meat Goat

Class 0: Classes divided by weight.

Premiums:

1st: \$5 * 2nd: \$3 * 3rd: \$2 * 4th: \$1 * 5th: \$1

All goats must have four feet on the floor in the show ring at all times. Lifting feet off of the ground or placing on any support or altered ring surface is not acceptable. Exhibitors will receive one warning if they are found lifting or slapping goats. Second offenses will result in automatic exhibitor disqualification from the 4-H Goat Shows.

Breeding meat does must be checked in between 7:00-7:30 a.m. on Wednesday. Animals cannot leave the trailer until checked by a vet or vet appointed representative. Do not stall any animals until inspected. SCALES CLOSE AT 9:00 a.m. Goat, Sheep exhibitors meet with the Superintendents to review showbill in barn. No Changes to show program after 9:00 pm.

Entries are open to any breed or crossbred does. Does may be commercial and or registered. Doelings that were carried over from meat goat show in the prior years county fair may be exhibited.

All breeding meat does must walk across the scales and be tagged/tattoo or retinal scan/tattoo at weigh-in with an official 4-H tag and scrapies tag or registration tattoo prior to May 15. Failed retinal scan will result in no premiums awarded for any goat classes and disqualification. Birth dates should be listed on the Iowa 4-H meat goat verification for (4-H-106). Birth dates for breeding meat does will be required at Fair entry time. Birth dates will be used to determine the class divisions. The show date will be the base date in computing all ages. Take the show date and count back to the birth of the goat to determine age and the class of the animal.

Each 4-H'er may ID at weigh-in 6 breeding meat does. Each member may exhibit a maximum of six goats (any combination of meat, breeding meat doe or dairy with 6 being total number). **NOTE: Please see page 3 rule #5 of Code of Ethics.**

All entries must be taught to lead. All breeding does must have there coats clean and their hooves must be properly cleaned and trimmed. Horns will be allowed, but tipped and blunted. Removal of horns on grounds is NOT permitted. Clipping/fitting will be left up to the discretion of the exhibitor. All breeding meat does should arrive on the Warren County Fairgrounds show ready. All goats must be penned in assigned pens

Major change for 2018 Fair: All Swine and Swine Exhibitors must attend Swine Tagging Day. Tagging Day will be at the Warren County Fairgrounds on May 5th from 7am to 10am. Why: identify each hog with their own personal tag number with proper USDA tag and ear notch.

State Fair tagging will remain the same process as in previous years.

New Procedure for Swine Tagging Day:

- Exhibitor/Parent/Guardian will present the pig to the superintendent for reading of ear notch and tagging.
 Pigs will not unload into the barns, but will remain on the vehicle/trailer for processing. Maximum 15 pigs per exhibitor tagged.
- 2. 4-H ID Form will be completed and tag fees paid. Each exhibitor and parent/guardian will sign-off on the

- form. This information will be entered in 4-H online by Extension. Exhibitor/family will be responsible for verifying this information prior to May 15th. The new procedure replaces the Swine Ear Notch Form. The determining document for eligibility is 4-H Online.
- 3. If an exhibitor cannot get pigs to tag day, they will have to: *Tag the pigs with state fair tags and still get them registered online by May 15th. *Go to another county weigh-in and get a USDA tag from Warren County Extension Office prior to weigh in.
- If a pig loses a tag: re-tagging procedure will apply.
 Please contact the extension office for further details.

General Swine Rules:

Due to the limited number of pens available and the amount of pigs entered, the following rules must be followed:

- Each exhibitor will be allowed to show a maximum of 6 pigs, which can be any combination of crossbred or purebred market or breeding animal.
- 2. Each exhibitor should be prepared to pen 3 pigs per pen.
- The swine superintendents will have the right to reallocate pens among exhibitors if there are pens that are not being utilized by exhibitors to the extent of three pigs per pen.

4-H and FFA Market Swine

A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week. The buyers of the market hogs strongly encourage a voluntary 14-day withdrawal of any CHLORTETRACYCLINE product or any other drug that has a withdrawal time limit. Due to the packer concerns, it is strongly recommended that pigs are not clipped. Short hair complicates processing of the animals. Hair cannot be clipped shorter than 1/2 ". Superintendents will have final approval and can dismiss hogs from fair and/or sale.

A Premise ID number for the farm where the swine are raised will be required by Hormel.

Pigs must have been farrowed on or after January 1st of current year.

Non-Terminal show animals that are not going through the sales must be designated within an hour of show being completed. Those animals that are not going to be in the sale will be released at 9 pm Sunday night. Animals must be removed by 6 am Monday morning.

All Warren County Fair 4-H and FFA Exhibitors will wear the official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt tucked in, and in its original form while exhibiting (Exception-horse exhibitors)

Each exhibitor may exhibit a total of 6 pigs of any combination in the Crossbred Market Divisions or Purebred Market Division, or Breeding Gilts. These pigs may be barrows or gilts or any combination of each. If entries exceed the capacity of the swine facility, the number of pigs each of exhibitor may be adjusted accordingly.

Each exhibitor may exhibit two individuals and one penof-three in the Crossbred and two individuals and one pen-ofthree in the Purebred Classes. Also, each exhibitor may exhibit two gilts, which may be Crossbred or Purebred, in the Breeding Gilt Division. A maximum of (6) pigs may be show by each exhibitor. These can be any combination with a maximum of 5 pigs in the crossbred or Purebred Division. Members are encouraged to use pigs from the pen- of three in the individual Market classes. To be eligible for exhibition in Market Swine Show, market pigs must weigh at least 230-310 pounds at the time of weigh-ins. All pigs, Market and Breeding, will be weighed only once, unless there is an obvious mechanical problem with the scale. The weigh-in weight will also be the official sale weight.

All scale tickets must be turned in within 10 minutes after the last pig crosses the scale.

Exhibitors must designate to the Superintendents immediately after weighing, and before leaving the weigh-in area (show ring), which animals are to be shown as individuals and as pens-of-three in each market division and which gilts, if any, are to be shown as a breeding gilt.

New for 2018 Feeder Swine Rules:

- Feeder class will be held for any swine outside of the 230-310 lb. weight range. This class is intended for exhibitors that may not have any other eligible hogs to show.
- It will be one class with all weights present.
 Superintendents will determine if additional classes are needed. This is a ribbon only class-no premiums will be awarded.
- Exhibitors will still only be allowed to show 2 total individual hogs per division. If they have two individuals that weigh within 230-310 lb. range, the ineligible hog will still need to leave by 9 pm Friday.
- 4. Swine shown in this class will not be sold. Animals must leave Sunday at 9 pm.

County Fair Weigh-In/Check-In:

- Superintendent will verify ear notch and tag with 4-H
 Online. Uploading photos of ear notch/tag is optional in
 4-H Online for all hogs.
- Tag and ear notch must match swine that was entered in 4-H online before May 15th of current year. Pigs will not cross scale or be tattooed until paperwork is complete and submitted: Drug affidavit and purebred registration forms.
- Any discrepancies between the pigs ear notch/tag
 and 4-H Online information at weigh-in will result in
 disqualification. Your pig will be marked with livestock
 paint and walked through the scale, IT WILL NOT BE
 WEIGHED. The animal will go home immediately.
- 4. All scale tickets MUST be turned in to the Swine Superintendents within ten minutes after the last pig crosses the sale to be eligible to show.

The Market Pigs, will be divided by weight into approximately equal classes.

Fair entries will be made by number of pigs and not by the gender of the market pigs. A Breeding Gilt entry may be made without designating specific gilt.

All Market division swine weighing 230-310 pounds can be sold at the auction and sent directly to a slaughter establishment from the exhibition. No pigs can be sold in the Auction that have not been exhibited.

Breeding gilts will NOT be sold in the Market Pig Auction. They may be taken home, moved to a purchaser's herd, or taken to slaughter by the exhibitor.

The superintendents need to know where those Breeding Gilts are being taken.

There will be no coloring agents, powder or oil used on hogs while at the fair. The use of either is strictly prohibited. Pigs found in violation will not be shown or sold.

Swine exhibitors at county fairs that do not require a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, must sign and present an owner affidavit that the animals being exhibited didn't originate from a quarantined herd and to the best of their knowledge; swine dysentery has not been in evidence in their herd for the past 12 months.

Quarantined animals or animals from quarantined herds cannot be exhibited.

HF557 says that starting January 1, 2012 isolation and testing for Pseudo rabies will no longer be required by law for swine returning home or other location after exhibition.

HF556 also say that the sponsor of the exhibition will need to submit a report to the IDALS (Iowa Dept. of Ag and Land Stewardship) on a form developed by IDALS stating where swine came from and where they will return after exhibition so that is some additional responsibility for fair board, Swine superintendents, fair vet, etc.

Warren County Produced Eligibility Statement (copies available from fair secretary): Animals must be born, produced and raised in Warren County. Producer must be a Resident of Warren County. Animal must be purchased directly from Warren County producers.

All swine must have current erysipelas vaccination.

Weigh-in for all pigs will be Friday of the County Fair starting at 7:30 am. The exhibitors that have conflicts due to the Breeding Beef and Poultry show are the ones eligible for this weigh-in time. Starting at 8:00 am the rest of the pigs will start weighing-in starting in the east barn.

The number of pens that each exhibitor is assigned will be at the discretion of the Swine Superintendents.

Bring 4 individual - pick pen of three before weigh-in at fair. The Pen-of-Three Market Lamb class shall consist of three market lambs belonging to one member. The eartag numbers of each market lamb in the pen-of-three must be declared prior to being weighed at fair weigh-in time. The Pen-of-Three class will be divided into classes of approximately equal weight.

Ram lambs and cryptochids will <u>not</u> be allowed to show as market lambs.

No icing, alcohol, or artificial coloring of lambs at any time while on the fairgrounds. No wetting of lambs two hours before or during show. No "Cool Blue" or equivalent is allowed

No drenching of lambs at any time. Must have a licensed veterinarian and superintendent present if a lamb is in need of drenching.

All sexually intact sheep must have an individual Scrapie Flock of Origin identification tag.

Weighing of market lambs will be Wednesday, 7:30 to 8:30 a.m. All market sheep must be "slick-sheared" before weigh-in at the Warren County Fair. Any lamb weighing under 92 pounds will not be sold at the Market Lamb Auction.

- 1. Horses, ponies and exhibitors must be on the grounds to check in by 8:00 a.m Thursday. Horses and ponies MUST remain on the grounds until Sunday, at 9:00 p.m. Animals are not to arrive before 8:00 am Wednesday. Any Exhibitor showing in speed event classes only must still check in by 8 a.m., Thursday.
- 2. Exhibitors must attend at least two formal riding lessons or attend two 4-H riding practices before entering any riding class. Forms will be provided at fair sign up in which a parent or guardian will be required to sign acknowledging their child has attended at least two formal riding lessons.

- Each 4-H or FFA member is limited to exhibiting five horse/pony projects of which a max of two may be leased. Leased horses must have completed lease form 4H106c, uploaded into 4-H online. Halter/confirmation class horses must be owned; cannot be leased.
- 4. In accordance to form 4H202 Iowa 4-H livestock Show Requirements: To exhibit in classes in which the primary emphasis of evaluation is the skill level of the 4-H'er, ownership is not required; however, the 4-H'er must take an active role in the care of the animal (includes feeding, cleaning, training, health care, farrier care, exercising, etc.). Horses to be exhibited in conformation (halter) classes must be owned by the 4-H'er or in partnership with a family member. Leased horses may be shown in showmanship and riding or driving classes. If the horse is leased, attach a signed lease agreement (4H106CL) to the identification form.
- 5. In accordance with the Identification guidelines as outlined on form 4H202, if a family includes more 4-H'ers than horses, more than one 4-H'er may identify a horse. However, in this situation a 4-H'er cannot identify more than one horse. Animals identified as part of a 4-H project cannot be identified or exhibited as an FFA project. For further clarification, if a family has multiple horses, depending on the number 4-Her's, each 4-Her will need to enter separate horses.
- No stallions, older than 12 month of age will be allowed to be shown at the County Fair.
- 7. Exhibitors in English-Type Performance classes are to wear full English attire which consists of a long sleeve light colored shirt, traditional English type breeches, English type jacket and English type riding boot. Horses should also be shown in proper English equipment. Whips may be used in English Halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judge's option. Helmets and armbands are mandatory. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award group. Whips may be used in English halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judges option.
- Exhibitors in Western Halter, English Halter, Performance, and Western Driving are to wear a solid, plain, front button or snap long-sleeved, collared shirt of any color (including white) may be worn. The following is prohibited: personalized logos or embroidery, zippers, sheer or lace fabric, embellishments or bling of any kind including, but not limited to, sequins, rhinestones, chains, etc. Shirt must be tucked in. Solid dark blue colored riding jeans (without holes), and Western-style boots. Ties are optional. Exhibitors showing in English Halter may also wear English attire as outlined in rule 7. Spurs are optional in performance classes and chaps are prohibited. Exception: 4-H or FFA t-shirts may be worn in timed events. 4-H arm bands are mandatory in all classes and should be worn on the left arm. Helmets are mandatory in all performance classes. See #10. Western style hats are allowed in Western Halter and Showmanship. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award
- FFA exhibitors are to wear black or dark blue jeans, white shirt, FFA jacket (optional) and FFA badge or armband as designated by FFA rules. <u>Helmets are mandatory</u>. An exhibitor failing to wear an armband will be dropped to the white award group.

- 10. All exhibitors participating in performance classes must wear an American Society of Testing Materials (ASTM) and Safety Engineering Institute (SEI) approved headgear with chinstrap and properly fitted harness while mounted and riding. Harness must be secured and properly fitted. It is the responsibility of the rider, parent or guardian to see that the headgear worn complies with appropriate safety standards for protective headgear. Any rider violating this rule at any time must immediately be prohibited from further riding until such headgear is in place.
- All exhibitors may wear ASTM/SEI approved headgear in any Halter or Showmanship class without penalty from the judge.
- 12. Any one riding a horse or pony during the fair either in the arena or on the grounds must wear a helmet and boots.
- 13. The Warren County Fair and the Warren County
 Extension Service make no representation or warranty,
 express or implied, about any protective headgear as all
 equestrian sports involve inherent dangerous risk and as no
 helmet can protect against all foreseeable injuries.
- 14. Whips may be used in English Halter classes as aids with excessive use to be penalized at the judge's option. Bats are allowed in speed events as long as used behind the cinch.
- 15. The regular stall fee, as printed in the Premium List, will include participation in one class. A \$1.00 fee will be charged for each additional class entered.
- 16. All exhibitors will be eligible to compete in the showmanship contest. Entries in this contest must be made during Fair entry times.
- 17. No class will be held for more then three minutes after the class has been called and the first horse has entered the arena. However, if equipment changes are necessary between classes, exhibitors must notify the Superintendents (who may, at their discretion, delay calling the next class).
- 18. Only exhibitors and members of the immediate family or local club leader can assist in grooming and fitting animals at the show. Only exhibitors and members of the immediate family may ride the horse/ponies/mule at the show. Outside help may be the basis for disqualification.
- 19. Animals will be placed in purple, blue, red and white award groups.
- A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week.
- 21. Unweaned foals must be shown along side their dam. The dam must be handled by another exhibitor, parent or 4-H leader and will not be judged in this class.
- 22. The arena will be open daily from 9:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. for riding with the exception of when shows are in process. Horses are to be in their stalls at 8:00 p.m. The arena will be available for riding ONLY when a Horse Superintendent is present at the arena for supervision. Times along with the Superintendent overseeing the arena will be posted in the Secretary's office.
- 23. Any rules not addressed in this book can be found in the 4-H Publication, "Rules and Regulation for 4-H Equine Shows in Iowa" (4H 511C Revised June 2013).
- 24. In the event of injury or illness of a horse during or prior to fair, another horse may be substituted as long as it was listed on the Horse and Pony Identification Form prior to May 15th of that year. Also, a letter or release from the vet will be required.
- 25. Each exhibitor may enter more than one animal in each class during Warren County Fair sign up. However, may only show one animal in each class.

Stake race description from AQHA

An event for youth exhibitors only, the stake race is a timed competition consisting of markers set on either side of a center line. Contestants are given a running start to complete a figure eight pattern. They must cross the center line between upright markers, head to either the right or left of the first pole, make a 180 degree turn, head to the second pole, turn around it in the opposite direction

and then to the center line to stop the clock. Spacing is suggested with markers 100 feet apart and 30 feet of stopping space

Handy Horse description from Wikipedia

- A. The rider proceeds from the starting line around both barrels into limed square. Rider must stop in square and stay there five (5) seconds and then cross finish line (animal does not have to stand still; however, timing does not start until animal has reached a complete stop). The judge / superintendent shall signify to the ring steward when the animal has all four hooves in the square. The ring steward shall start timing when he receives the signal from the judge/superintendent and give an audible signal to go to the rider when five (5) seconds have elapsed. If the animal steps on the square once the 5 seconds has started, the animal is disqualified.
- B. When rider hears the "Go" signal, they exit the box and race across the finish line. The judge/superintendent should determine that the animal stays in square.

Keyhole Race description from Wikipedia

The event begins when the horse and rider cross the timing line. The team enters the keyhole at a gallop, then turns in either direction inside the keyhole's circle without stepping over the chalk. The horse and the rider turns as fast as they can in the bulb. The team then exits the keyhole again at a gallop and the time ends once they cross the timing line.

Jumping Figure 8 Barrel Racing

- A. The rider will start prior to the timer line. The rider will proceed across the pole set on the approach to the barrel. The rider has the option of running the figure eight pattern to the left or the right as long as they start with the middle barrel.
- B. The rider must finish the figure 8 pattern with the middle barrel and cross the pole again prior to crossing the timer line.
- C. Disqualification results if the rider touches the barrel with a hand, running off course & turning a barrel the wrong way or knocking the pole from the supports.

RULES:

- General Livestock Rules and Regulations and General Rules and Regulations apply in this department. Dog Identification
 - a. Entries are open to dogs identified in 4-H Online as
 4-H projects by May 15 of the current year that meet the division and class qualifications.
 - b. Each dog must be identified as 4-H OR FFA, not both
 - c. Immediate family members (siblings/step-siblings) may co-identify the same dog(s) in 4-H
 - d. Co-identified dogs must be identified separately by each
 4-H family member in 4-H online
 - e. Dogs identified as FFA cannot be co-identified
 - f. Each dog may enter ONLY one obedience class
 - g. Each dog is allowed ONLY one entry per class for example: family member A can show dog in obedience and showmanship, then family member B can show the same dog in rally and agility.
 - h. Rabies Certificate number and date vaccinated must be recorded in 4-H online
- 3. All exhibitors/dogs are highly encouraged to attend 4-H training or private obedience classes and *MUST* compete in obedience to be eligible to compete in agility, rally or showmanship classes.
- 4. The county fair dog show is *NOT* an AKC sanctioned show; while AKC rules have been used as guidelines, class descriptions may differ. To assist with dog show expectations, it is recommended that youth attend an AKC show or obtain a copy of AKC rules prior to exhibiting.
- 5. CLASS DETERMINATION
 - a. Exhibitor *AND* dog experience in conjunction with show scores from previous county fair will be used to determine class level.
 - b. County and state fair class descriptions will match
 - c. Years completed is every year dog has been shown plus current year.
 - d. A qualifying score is achieved when a dog earns a minimum of 170 out of 200 points and at least 50% of points for each class exercise.
 - e. Dogs with qualifying scores must advance to the next class with exception of preferred open and open classes.
- 6. All fee(s) must be paid at time of entry; \$1.00 per class (except showmanship) plus vet fee of \$.50/dog
- 7. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS
 - a. Bring copy of current Certificate of Veterinarian Inspection to fair that includes vaccination dates for Rabies (certificate number required), parvo and distemper

b. Any bitch in season or nursing will not be allowed to show

8. HOUSING

- a. Will not be provided on Fairgrounds; exhibitors should plan to arrive with dogs Wednesday morning
- b. ONLY dogs exhibiting in the 4-H and FFA dog show are allowed on fairgrounds
- c. All dogs must remain in designated areas at all times
- d. All dogs will be released upon completion of their classes.
- e. Wednesday is the ONLY day dogs will be allowed on fairgrounds.
- CHECK-IN PROCEDURES exhibitors should report to show ring with dogs beginning at 10:00 a.m. and no later than 11:00 a.m.; process will include verification of class entries, jumping height measurements and veterinarian inspection accompanied by review of Rabies, parvo and distemper vaccinations.
- 10. All dogs must be shown by 4-H or FFA member.

11. EXHIBITOR CONDUCT

- a. No practicing will be allowed in show ring
- b. Be ready when class is called
- c. Exhibitors participating in showmanship and obedience classes must give precedence to showmanship.
- d. Judges do not have to hold classes for a single exhibitor
- e. Do not strike dogs or use any other unnecessary/harsh physical means to discipline dogs while on fairgrounds.
- f. Bating is not allowed in obedience and rally classes; any evidence of bating will result in a severe scoring penalty
- 12. EXHIBITOR DRESS all 4-H and FFA dog project exhibitors will wear an official Warren County Fair exhibitor t-shirt, tucked in, and in its original form while showing.

13. EQUIPMENT

- a. Tents, canopies, awning, etc. may *NOT* be set up prior to 7 a.m. on show day; all must be removed upon completion of the dog show.
- b. All dogs must be leashed or crated while waiting for their class to be called.
- c. Owners are responsible for providing water and food to their dog(s).
- d. Exhibitors may choose to use choke chains, buckle collars or martingales in obedience classes; show leads are to be used when handling dogs in showmanship classes.
- e. NO dog will be allowed to show with prong or pinch collars, gentle leaders or harnesses.
- f. Exhibitors are responsible for providing their own dumb bell as applicable.
- g. Jumps will be provided by the project; all dogs will be measured at shoulder height (withers) for applicable
- h. Requests to use additional equipment will be handled on a case by case basis.
- 14. GROOMING EXPECTATIONS All dogs need to be well groomed and evaluated for:
 - a. Free of loose hair, fleas, lice and other insects.
 - b. Toenails of suitable length.
 - c. Ears and eyes clean and clear.
- 15. Any exhibitor/dog team, regardless of age, may choose to participate in Agility at the discretion of the owner; trainers, volunteers, superintendents and fair board members are not responsible/liable for injuries/accidents.
- 16. Dogs cannot be shown in both Dog Show and Pet Show. Premiums 1st: \$4 * 2nd: \$3 * 3rd: \$3 * 4th: \$1

- 3. All rabbits must be permanently identified with a tattoo in the left ear prior to check-in. Please contact Rabbit Superintendent for availability of rabbit tattooing

- workshops prior to Fair Check in. Tattoos are not required on entry forms but must match 4-H Online ID System at check in time.
- 4. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS All rabbits will be examined by the official show check-in assistants before being placed in coops Wednesday between 9:00 am to 11:00 am & 6:00 pm to 9:00 p.m. Animals must be disease free. Any animal found with any communicable disease(s) will not be allowed to remain in or around the Rabbit Building. The sick animal is the sole responsibility of the owner. Example of communicable diseases include, but are not limited to: nasal or eye discharge, vent disease, ear mites, fleas, fur mites, abscesses or other infections.
- 5. Breed and class determinations must be made at the time the Fair entries are made. A double entry fee will be charged to any changes made after entry week. Any changes made after arrival at the fair may be subject to approval, and may not receive premiums. Exhibitors are responsible for determination of their entries in the proper breeds, varieties and classes for entry. Superintendent: David James, Marty Overmann The 4-H and FFA poultry show will be held on Friday at 11 am.

- Production and Market pens are limited to one entry per class
- An entry fee of \$1.50 per bird must accompany entry or they will not be accepted. A service charge of \$.25 per bird will be assessed to cover veterinarian inspection fees. A double entry fee will be charged for any changes made after entry week.
- 3. Birds are not to be placed in pens until they have been approved by the Fair Veterinarian.
- 4. A Superintendent will assign pens. All Market Birds will be weighed by the Superintendent at the time of placing in their pens.
- 5. Birds that do not originate from a Pullorum-Typhoid free hatchery or were not tested prior to the Fair, must be tested and a copy of papers filed with the superintendents. These birds will be isolated from other birds until testing is complete.
- Exhibitors are responsible for entering birds in the proper class. Incorrectly entered birds will be placed at the bottom of the class.
- 7. Birds will be judged by the comparison method, demonstrating uniform growth, appropriate market/production breed selection, and appearance.
- Birds should be in place by noon on Wednesday. The show will be at 11 a.m. on Friday. Birds will be released following the show and must be checked out by 9 p.m.

- Exhibitors are responsible for the care of their birds.
 Exhibitors MUST provide feed, feeders, water and clean up pens. See #8 open show rules. Premiums will not be paid if pens are not cleaned or birds are not checked out by release time.
- 10. Pens must contain birds of the same sex and age. (Exception: Ducks and Geese.)

This department is open to youth who are participating in 4-H/FFA Youth Development Programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension and Outreach.

All exhibitors are responsible to READ and COMPLY with the Warren County Fair 4-H General Exhibit Rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and all 4-H department exhibit class rules and regulations.

General Exhibit Rules

- 1. 4-H members who have completed 4th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) are eligible to exhibit at the Warren County Fair.
- 2. 4-H Clover Kids (Kindergarten-3rd grade) are eligible to exhibit in the 4-H Building. Clover Kids will "share" their exhibits and receive participation ribbons for their exhibits in the 4-H Building. Their exhibits may be a school project, simple craft, hobby, collection, etc. Clover Kids may also participate in the "Pet Show" on Sunday, July 29th at 9:30 am.

- 3. Exhibitors in 4-H classes are not eligible to exhibit in a similar department of the FFA division or vice-versa. See also "4-H Department General Rules and Regulations."
- 4. Eligible exhibits are an outgrowth of work done as a planned part of the 4-H'ers participation in 4-H projects or programs during the current 4-H year (since the 2017 Warren County Fair). If a school project, please make the necessary changes to form it into a 4-H Exhibit. Exhibits can be completed by an individual or group and may represent all or part of the learning in the project or program. Exhibits previously entered in an FFA Ag Science Fair or any other FFA event or competition may not be entered in any 4-H exhibit class.
- 5. Exhibits that do not comply with the class description, size guidelines, copyright restrictions, safety and approved methods will be disqualified and <u>not</u> put on public display.
- 6. If the exhibitor chooses a display to illustrate what was learned:
 - Posters may not exceed 24" x 36" in size.
 - Chart boards, graph boards, project presentation boards, model displays, etc., may not exceed 48" x 48" in size. Maximum size is determined by measuring the flat (unfolded) dimensions. Display boxes may not exceed 28" x 22" in height or width and 12" in depth.
- Endangered and threatened plants and animals (includes insects), or songbird feathers and nests may **NOT** be used in any exhibit.
- 8. Copyrighted materials and designs may not be used in an exhibit that is presented as original work by the exhibitor. Exhibitors must include permission from the copyright holder/owner when using copyrighted materials. Exhibitors must give proper credit to the original source of all materials / designs used in exhibits. (See special rules for Visual Arts and general copyright information for 4-H'ers.) If you find your idea from Pinterest, you will need to find the original site to source. It can be found by double clicking on the image.
- 9. The 4-H member's goal and application of exhibit standards will form the basis of the evaluation process. Evaluation criteria will include demonstrated learning, workmanship, techniques, and general appearance and design. Exhibitors will receive a blue, red or white Warren County Fair ribbon. Refer to exhibit class evaluation rules/guidelines for detailed evaluation criteria in each class. Rules and guidelines are located on each 4-H project page at http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4h/projects
- 10. Each exhibitor at the Warren County Fair should be prepared (in writing or orally) to answer the following questions during their conference judging. 4-H'ers are strongly encouraged to write out their answers to be ready to discuss them with the judge. The Iowa State Fair requires a written explanation, an audio recording, or video recording answering the questions with each exhibit.

The 4-H exhibitor should respond to the following questions about the exhibit:

What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?)

What steps did you take to learn or do this? What were the most important things you learned?

Check for additional requirements in exhibit classes for food and nutrition, photography, and visual art classes.

11. All judges' decisions are final.

- 12. Each item in an exhibit must be securely labeled, including:
- Class Number
- 4-H Exhibitor's Name and 4-H Club
- Grade Completed and Age
- Description and Years in Project
- 13. If a 4-H'er is unable to attend conference judging, they may send their exhibits (limit of 2) with their leader or parent to be dropped off for judging. These exhibits will need to be checked in then taken to the sign up table where a Superintendent will take them for judging. Parents or leaders will not be allowed in the judging area to present these exhibits. These projects will not be considered for: Iowa State Fair, Outstanding Exhibits, Top 4th Grade, or Creative Arts Tour
- 14. At no time will a parent or leader partake in the judging process. This is the 4-H'ers time to share their information with the judge. If a 4-H'er needs assistance from a parent or leader in moving their exhibit to the judging table that is fine, but please then leave the judging area. PLEASE **NOTE:** If you are using the same articles of clothing for the Clothing Selection, or \$15 Challenge, or the Fashion Revue event and the exhibit building classes, Sewing and Needle Arts and/or Clothing and Fashion, you will need to take them home with you after they are judged on Saturday, July 22nd. Please return these items to your club booth on Wednesday, July 26th when the building opens at 9 am. Exception: If your clothing exhibit is considered for the Iowa State Fair then, the Warren County Extension Office Staff will bring the item to the Clothing Event on judging day, Tuesday, July 25th.

Other Exhibit Information

Due to security, 4-H'ers are discouraged from sending items that have special meaning and historical value as their exhibit or part of an exhibit. The Warren County Fair and Iowa State University Extension and Outreach - Warren County will use diligence to insure the safety of articles entered for exhibition after their arrival and placement. However, they will not be responsible for damage or loss by accident, fire, theft, etc.

Judging Day Procedures and Release of Exhibits

No "pre-entry" is required for the Exhibit Building at the Warren County Fair with the following exceptions:

- \$15 Challenge
- Clothing Selection
- Extemporaneous Speaking
- Fashion Revue
- Presentations
- Share-the-Fun
- Working Exhibits

Entries in these areas need to be made during the Warren County Fair Entry from June 18th through June 23rd, 2018. All exhibits entered in the 4-H Building will be conference judged. (Exception: Clover Kids will have their own special sharing time.) The purpose of conference judging is to let each member have a personal interview with the judge to discuss what the member planned to do in the project, how the item displayed fits into the goals the member hoped to reach, and how the member feels about the final results of his/her efforts for the year.

Conference judging provides an opportunity for the 4-H member to express his/her thoughts to an adult. It is an

opportunity for the adult to listen to the youth and converse together; the result being a mutually satisfying experience. Each club is assigned a time for judging on Saturday, July 21st. At the scheduled time, all members in that club are to bring their exhibits to the 4-H & Youth Exhibit Building to participate in conference judging. If a member is not able to participate in conference judging, they need to contact their club leader to make arrangements to have their exhibit (up to two) taken to the 4-H & Youth Exhibit Building before 1:00 p.m. on the day of judging, July 21st. Each 4-H'er will need to fill out an entry form listing all of their exhibits. Bring this entry form with you the day of judging (July 21st) for the judge to mark your ribbon placing per exhibit on the entry form. This form needs to be signed by the 4-H'er and turned in at the completion of the day at the check-out table. The entry tag is to be completed and attached securely to the exhibit.

You may get entry forms and tags from your leader, from the Extension Office, or from the Extension website at www.extension.iastate/edu/warren/. It is best to complete these items prior to judging day. Extra forms and tags will be available on the day of judging at the check-in table.

Judging DAY PROCESS...WHEN YOU ARRIVE AT THE EXHIBIT BUILDING

- Check in at the check-in table
- · Proceed to the waiting area to sign up for Judging
- After talking with a judge, exhibits are to be taken to the club's booth (or the area designated for those projects) to be displayed
- Exhibits considered for the Iowa State Fair will be retained to be displayed in a special area.
- · Proceed to the check-out table in the exhibit building
- Please sign and turn in the entry form to receive your ribbons
- Please attach your ribbon securely to your exhibit/project
- Exhibits will be awarded premiums on the basis of blue, red, and white ribbon quality
- Exhibits not placed in one of the above groups by a judge will not be awarded premium money
- Any exhibit that does not meet the class description may be moved to a more appropriate class with the permission of the 4-H member
- All premiums will be paid to the club of the respective 4-H member
- Fourth grade 4-H members will be eligible to earn a Top 4th Grade ribbon for their projects and their club will receive their premium money
- The Warren County Fair Exhibit Building opens up for initial viewing on Saturday, July 21st following the Pre-Fair Picnic for one hour and then officially re-opens on Wednesday, July 25th at 9 a.m.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Baked and garden items will be held for the **4-H Bake/ Garden Sale.** 4-Hers should include a picture of their baked item attached to their project. The booth will be set up at the 4-H Exhibit Building and the sale will take place Saturday, July 21st during judging time and continue after the pre-fair picnic. Proceeds will go to the Warren County 4-H Trip Scholarship Fund.

Exhibits are to remain on display in the 4-H & FFA Building until 9 p.m., Sunday, July 29th at which time they will be released by the General Superintendent or Extension staff.

The 4-H/FFA building will be closed at 6:30 p.m. on Sunday, July 29th it will reopen at 9:00 pm until 10:00 p.m. for removal of exhibits. The building will be open again on Monday, July 30th from 9:00 -10:00 a.m. for those unable to remove their exhibits on Sunday evening. Superintendents or Extension staff will not be responsible for exhibits left after that time.

IMPORTANT NOTE: Any exhibit removed prior to 9 p.m., Sunday, July 29th, will automatically disqualify the 4-H member from entering the Warren County 4-H competition the following year, and all premiums due that member in any 4-H division for the current year will be forfeited. An exception to this rule are live plants (please see Horticulture under Agriculture guidelines).*

State Fair Notes

4-H'ers completing 5th - 12th grades are eligible to exhibit at the 2018 Iowa State Fair. Exhibits at the Iowa State Fair are NOT conference judged.

4-H'ers with exhibits chosen for the Iowa State Fair will be given additional instructions on when and where to take their exhibits. A picture will be taken in the 4-H Exhibit Building on Friday, July 27th at 5:00 pm of all 4-Hers with exhibits selected for the Iowa State Fair and those selected for the Creative Arts Tour.

ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY: If you are unable to participate in the Saturday afternoon photo shoot, another opportunity is scheduled for **Sunday**, **July 29th at 11:00 am**.

Exhibits that do not comply with <u>size guidelines</u>, <u>copyright</u>, <u>and safety procedures</u> will not be accepted for entry, evaluation or display at the Iowa State Fair. The Iowa State Fair requires a written explanation, an audio recording or video recording answering three questions about each exhibit.

The 4-H exhibitor should respond briefly to the following questions about the exhibit:

What did you plan to learn or do? (What was your exhibit goal(s)?) What steps did you take to learn or do this?
What were the most important things you learned?

Club Booths and Hosting THEME FOR THE 2018 WARREN COUNTY FAIR: "Ramping It Up"

This theme will be used in decorating 4-H Club booths. Clubs will be able to decorate their booths on Thursday, July 19th from 6:00-8:00 p.m.

The "Club Pride" award will be given by Senior 4-H to the 4-H club booth that best displays the theme for the year, is nicely decorated, and highlights the club and its members. Booth assignments will be posted in an upcoming Extension Newsletter.

4-H & Youth Building Hosting Schedule

Guidelines for 4-H Clubs Hosting the Exhibit Building:

- Must have <u>one adult present</u> with any 4-H members that are hosting.
- Hosts are expected to GREET VISITORS with a smile; ask visitors if they have questions.
- Provide information about 4-H. Flyers and information at the hosting table if they are interested.
- Encourage children to complete the *interest* form to join 4-H and place in collection box on table.
- Work with the kids to do the daily activity
- First Shift of the day Make sure hosting table and areas are clean and neat.
- Others hosts are to sweep the floor as needed and pick up trash.
- The next shift should arrive before you leave the Exhibit Building.
- · Final shift of day -

Sweep the floor and pick up any trash.

Do not turn off Master Breaker... do turn off the individual breaker.

To lock the building, place the bolts and nuts in the east and west doors

ADDITIONAL NOTES: Hosts are not to eat, play cards or other games, or engage in private conversations (or use technological instruments) with other friends; 4-H hosts are ambassadors for the 4-H program; the host table should be neat and clean for visitors to the 4-H Exhibit Building, and you should be welcoming guests.

Class Descriptions

Most exhibit classes have specific guidelines and requirements which will be included in the judging process. Members are highly encouraged to access http://www.extension.iastate. edu/4h/projects to find information about the judging criteria for projects and exhibits they created from their 4-H learning experience.

There are six areas or divisions in which to exhibit projects at the Warren County Fair. Each area or division has class numbers listed below. All projects entered at the Warren County Fair will enter under a specific area or division and then identify the class that is most appropriate for their project on Judging Day.

Class descriptions for the Communication Events such as a 4-H Presentations, Extemporaneous Speaking, Working Exhibits, or Share-The-Fun Activities along with the Clothing Events such as Clothing Selection, \$15 Challenge, Fashion Revue or the Pet Show will be found in the fair book following the class descriptions for the Exhibit Building.

These projects or exhibits are judged separately; 4-H members will want to sign-up during the 2018 Warren County Fair Entry days, June 18th through June 23rd at the Warren County Extension Office. Please see specific descriptions for more information.

Animals

10110 Animal Science

4-H animal science exhibits can represent an exhibit (other than the animal itself) that shows learning about a large or small animal including beef, dairy cattle, dairy goats, dogs, horse & pony, meat goats, pets, poultry, rabbits, sheep and swine. Ownership of any animal is not required.

10120 Veterinary Science

4-H veterinary science exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about keeping animals healthy.

Agriculture and Natural Resources

10210 Crop Production

4-H crop production exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of field crops.

10220 Environment and Sustainability

4-H environment and sustainability exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows the connections between humans and their environment including energy, stewardship, conservation, entomology, fish and wildlife, or forestry. Includes collections.

10230 Horticulture

(Includes Home Grounds Improvement)

4-H horticulture exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about the growth, use, and value of plants, small fruits, vegetable and flower gardens, and landscape design. (Garden crops and herbs are exhibited in classes in the 4-H Horticulture Department under 4-H Livestock at the Iowa State Fair.)

10235 Home Grounds Improvement

An exhibit that shows learning about landscape plans, selection of landscape plants, ornamental garden features, home yard improvement, storage sheds, careers, etc.

*If using live plants within your exhibit please contact the Extension Office to make arrangements for you to take them home after being judged on Saturday, July 21st since the building is locked until Wednesday at 9 am.

550A – Vegetable Plates – County Fair Only Class This is to be an exhibit of vegetables raised as the results of work done by the 4-Her.

Please refer to: http://www.extension.iastate.edu/4hfiles/agriculture/LHHortClass.pdf for the number of specimen to put on a plate for your exhibit.

The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit". Please note only one variety per plate. Exhibitor must enter each plate of vegetables separately. White paper plates are recommended. Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Judging will be based on the quality of produce. Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name.

Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them during fair sign up from June 18th-23rd. After judging, produce will be sold at the 4-H Bake/Garden Sale with the exception of one specimen per plate, which will remain on exhibition.

550B – Vegetable Collection Plates – County Fair Only Class

This is to be a collection of vegetables with 8-10 different vegetables raised as the results of work done by the 4-Her

The vegetables should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-462, "Harvesting and Preparing Vegetables for Exhibit". White paper plates are recommended. Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Judging will be based on the quality of produce. Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name.

Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them during fair sign ups from June 18th-23rd.

After judging, the vegetables will stay on display.

Class 550C - JUMBO OR MOST UNUSUAL – County Fair Only Class

Vegetables (one specimen).

White paper plates are recommended. Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Each exhibit tag MUST show the variety name. After judging, the vegetables will stay on display.

Class 550D - Herbs - County Fair Only Class

An herb species (three sprigs for exhibit) to be displayed in a bottle provided by the 4-Her. Sprigs should be of adequate length to reach the water level. Herb species must be properly labeled on the entry tag.

Exhibits will not be selected from this class for State Fair exhibition.

Class 550E- Flower Display - County Fair Only Class

Two blooms displayed in a bottle provided by the 4-Her. Flower variety must be properly labeled on the entry tag. Each flower display will be a separate exhibit.

The flowers should be prepared for exhibit as instructed in 4H-464, "Preparing Cut Flowers and House Plants for Exhibit." Members wishing to exhibit similar produce at Iowa State Fair must enter them during fair sign ups from June 18th-23rd.

10240 Outdoor Adventures

4-H outdoor adventure exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about backpacking, biking, camping, canoeing, fishing, hiking or other outdoor activities.

10250 Safety and Education in Shooting Sports

This class is an exhibit that shows learning about safe and responsible use of firearms and archery equipment or wildlife management. (The exhibit may not include actual firearms; archery equipment is allowed if tips are removed from arrows.)

10260 Other Agriculture and Natural Resources

4-H agriculture and natural resources exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about agriculture or natural resources and does not fit in any of the classes listed above.

Creative Arts

10310 Music

4-H music exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about musical performance, composition and arrangements, instruments, musical styles or history.

10320 Photography

4-H photography exhibits can represent an exhibit, either a photo(s) or an educational display, which shows learning about photography from choosing a camera to modifying your photo. Please use "still photos only," not video.

Photography Special Rules:

- Photographs may be either black and white or color. They
 may be processed from negatives, slides, or digital cameras
 and computer manipulation programs. Photographs must
 have been taken since the county fair of the previous year
- Photographs should be a minimum of 4" x 6". Finished size (including mounting/matting) of single photographs should not exceed 16" in height or width.
- All photographs must be printed on photographic paper. Photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, ect. Will only be accepted as part of an educational display that shows learning about photography printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.
- 4. Mounted photos can be (a) flush-mounted [no board showing] on mounting board, or (b) with mount borders [window mat or flat mount directly on board]. Exhibitors may cut their own mounting boards, use ready-cut window mats or have matting done professionally. 4-Hers are responsible for design decisions such as border, color and size. Framed photographs (including floating frames) will not be judged.
- Non-mounted photos may be exhibited in a clear plastic covering.
- 6. A series is a group of photographs or slides [3 to 5] that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Photographs must be mounted together in story order or sequence. Slides should be numbered. Finished size of individual photographs in a series should not exceed 6" X 8".
- Digitally altered photos should include a copy of the photo before changes.
- 8. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activites will not be displayed.
- 10. Exhibitors are to use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for exhibit. The link to the label is:http://www.extension.iastate.edu/emmet/sites/ www.extension.iastate.edu/files/emmet/State%20 photography%20exhibit%20form%202013%20FULL%20 sheet.pdf
- 11. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography show and vice-versa.

NOTE: Each 4-H'er may bring a maximum of four photography exhibits.

10325 Digital Photography Exhibit

A photo or series of photos submitted electronically, not printed. Photos in this class will be submitted, viewed, evaluated, and displayed electronically.

Digital Photography Exhibit Special Rules:

- 1. Photographs may be either black and white or color.
- 2. Photographs will not be printed.
- 3. Entries may be a single photo or a series of photos. A series is a group of photographs (3 to 5) that are related or tell a step-by-step story. Series photo entries must have all photos in the series viewable at the same time.
- 4. Photos entered should be submitted in the highest resolution possible. A finished file size of $1~\mathrm{MB}-3~\mathrm{MB}$ is recommended.
- 5. Photos should be submitted in an acceptable and commonly used format for ease of viewing.
- 6. Subject matter of photographs must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting.
- 7. Photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

- 8. Iowa State Fair 4-H photography exhibitors must use the Photo Exhibit Label to provide required information for photo exhibits. The Photo Exhibit Label may be submitted electronically with the photo entry.
- 9. Photos entered in this class will be evaluated on the same evaluation criteria used for printed photographs.
- 10. Exhibitors entered in 4-H Photography are not eligible to exhibit in the FFA Photography show and vice-versa.

NOTE: Each 4-H'er may bring a maximum of four photography exhibits.

10340 Alternative/Creative Photography

A single photograph or photographic image that has been created with an alternative photographic process, or a photograph that was creatively edited or modified beyond reality in a creative, imaginative and experimental way to make it more interesting and visually engaging. Could be a composite of multiple overlapped photographs.

Alternative/Creative Photography Special Rules:

- 1. Photograph/Image must be mounted on foam core no smaller than 4"x4" and no larger than 10" x 10" in height and width. No matting and no framing is allowed, put your creativity into the photography!
- 2. Photograph/Image can be created from film negative, digital negative, or digitally manipulated in computer.
- 3. Photograph must be on photo paper, canvas, or other flat material.
- 4. Exhibit must have Photo Exhibit Label on back with required information for photo exhibits. Include information about the processes used.
- 5. Subject matter must be in good taste and be appropriate for public display in a 4-H setting, photographs depicting unsafe practices or illegal activities will not be displayed.

10345 Photography Idea/Educational Display

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about photography that does not fit into any previous photography class. This class includes photos printed on canvas, fabric, ceramic, etc. as part of an educational display showing learning about printing techniques, display, merchandising, etc.

10305 Visual Arts

4-H visual arts exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning through original art, exploration of an art technique, or study of any other visual arts topic.

Visual Arts Special Rules:

Exhibits made from kits or preformed molds will not be accepted. Exception: Preformed molds (greenware, whiteware) may be used to provide the appropriate surface for a process technique or application of original design.

If the exhibit is a finished art object, the source or inspiration of the design, design sketches, or other process for creating the object and design must be included.

Original works of art must be a creative expression of a design unique to the artist, or represent a significant modification to an existing design to make a new and original statement by the artist.

Exhibition of derivative works created by a 4-H'er is prohibited without the written permission of the original copyright holder/owner. Use of copyrighted or trademarked designs, images, logos, or materials in 4-H visual arts exhibits is prohibited unless written permission has been obtained from the copyright or trademark holder/owner.

630C - Warren County Kit Class

This means: A pre-packaged (kit) or pre-determined patterns (not eligible for State Fair)

This is a project where the 4-H'er has limited choices or decisions in the design of the article. Examples are latch hook kits, counted cross stitch patterns, paint by number, etc., (When you purchase a kit or pattern, you are paying for the privilege of using copyrighted material.)

Family and Consumer Sciences

10410 Child Development

4-H child development exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about children. Examples: child care, growth and development, safety and health, children with special needs, and careers in child development.

10420 Clothing and Fashion

Constructed/Sewn Garments & Accessories- A constructed garment or accessory (sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10422 Clothing and Fashion

Purchased Garments & Accessories – Purchased garments or accessories that shows learning about style, fashion, design, thrifty spending, wardrobe planning, types of fabrics, and clothing care. Exhibits must be intended to be worn by humans.

10424 Clothing and Fashion

Other Ideas/Educational Exhibits – Any other educational exhibit that shows learning about clothing and fashion including but not limited to design illustrations, exploration of clothing styles, careers, clothing care, etc.

Clothing and Fashion Special Rule:

Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Awardrobe Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H Iowa State Fair exhibit.

10430 Consumer Management

4-H consumer management exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning through savvy budgeting, comparison shopping, money management, and consumer rights and responsibilities.

10440 Food & Nutrition – Prepared and Preserved Product

An exhibit of a prepared or preserved food product that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, safety practices, or food preservation through the making of a prepared or preserved food product. 4-H'ers should also include a picture of their baked product attached to their project. This will remain in the club booth following judging. See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs — Quick Reference Guide" at https://store. extension.iastate.edu/product/6434 for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products.

10445 Food & Nutrition - Educational Display

An educational exhibit (poster, report, display) that shows skills or learning about cooking, baking, eating and choosing healthy foods, safety practices, or food preservation.

See Food & Nutrition Special Rules below and HS 76 "Foods for Iowa 4-H Fairs – Quick Reference Guide" for additional information regarding prepared and preserved food products.

Food & Nutrition Special Rules:

- 1. Any exhibit considered to be a food safety risk or portray a food safety risk will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 2. All food products/exhibits should be appropriate for human consumption.
- 3. Food product exhibits must be prepared, baked or cooked using only food grade utensils and containers.
- 4. Products that require refrigeration will not be accepted, judged or displayed.
- 5. Meat jerky products are prohibited.
- 6. The recipe must be included for any prepared food exhibit; credit the source of the recipe.
- 7. Preserved foods must include the Food Preservation Exhibit Label. Only food processed after August 1, 2017 is acceptable. Current USDA and/or Iowa State University guidelines for home food preservation must be used.
- 8. Preserved food exhibits must include two product samples. One will be opened for evaluation and discarded; the second will be placed on display and returned to the exhibitor. All perishable food products will be discarded when removed from display.
- 9. Prepared foods should be placed on a firm disposable plate or flat cardboard. Place food product exhibit in a reclosable plastic bag with entry tag fastened outside the bag. 10. The use of alcoholic beverages in the preparation or production of 4-H food exhibits is NOT permitted.

10450 Health

4-H health exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning through food choices, safe activities and skills such as first aid and CPR, careers, and healthy lifestyle choices.

10460 Home Improvement

4-H home improvement exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning in planning, improving and caring for your home living space. Exhibits may include new or refinished furniture or items, reclaimed furniture or items, or restored furniture items.

10470 Sewing and Needle Arts - Constructed item

(sewn, knitted, crocheted, or other process) that shows learning and skill in sewing, knitting, crocheting, or other needle arts. May include the construction of household items such as pillowcases, curtains, table runners, quilts, wall hangings, or other items. Exhibits in this class are not intended to be worn by humans.

The judge may ask you to explain these within your exhibit.

10480 Other Family and Consumer Science

An exhibit that demonstrates learning about a family and consumer science topic that does not fit any previous Family & Consumer Science class listed.

Personal Development

10510 Citizenship and Civic Engagement

4-H citizenship exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about or contributing to your community, your country or your world.

10520 Communication

An exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills in their many forms.

10530 4-H Poster Communication Exhibit

Special poster exhibit to visually tell a story or idea about 4-H to the general public. Exhibitors must use one of the following themes:

- 4-H is... (open to 4-H'er's interpretation)
- Join 4-H
- 4-H Grows... (4-H.org national marketing theme)
- Your Passport to Adventure (2018 Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme)
- Nothing Compares to 4-H Moments (variation of Iowa State Fair theme)

Poster Communication Special Rules:

- 1. Only one poster per 4-H'er may be entered.
- 2. All posters must be designed on, or affixed to, standard poster board or foam core board—size minimum of 14" x 20" or maximum of 15" x 22".
- 3. Posters may be vertical or horizontal. Posters may be any medium: watercolor, ink, crayon, acrylic, charcoal, oils, collage.
- 4. Posters cannot be 3-dimensional. Materials used to make the poster may not extend more than 1/8 inch above the poster or foam core board.
- 5. Each poster must have the completed Poster Exhibit Entry Form attached to the back.
- 6. Posters cannot use copyrighted material or exact copies of other promotional designs, such as the Iowa 4-H Youth Conference theme logo.
- 7. 4-H'ers may include the 4-H clover in the poster.

10540 Digital Storytelling

4-H digital storytelling can represent any exhibit that demonstrates the application of technology to produce and or create a movie, film, or video. Exhibits may include a finished movie or video, creation of a detailed storyboard, editing techniques using digital video software, production techniques, or other display to share what was learned. Copyright permission must be obtained for any non-original material included as part of a film/movie/video.

4-H communication exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning about written, oral, and visual communication skills in their many forms.

10550 Leadership

4-H leadership exhibits can represent any exhibit that shows learning about leadership skills and influencing others in a positive way.

10560 Self-Determined

4-H self-determined exhibits can represent an exhibit that shows learning as part of your 4-H adventure and does not fit any other class.

Science, Engineering, and Technology

If using live plants within your exhibit please contact the Extension Office to make arrangements for you to take them home after being judged on Saturday, July 21st since the building is locked until Wednesday at 9 am.*

10610 Mechanics

4-H mechanics exhibit shows skills or learning about general mechanics or engineering solutions or that involve a combination of skills.

10612 Automotive

Repaired or restored vehicle

10614 Electric

Constructed or repaired article or educational display that shows skills or learning about electric wiring, appliances, lighting, electrical energy sources, safety, etc.

10615 Small Engine

Repaired or restored operating engine or educational display or other type exhibit that shows skills or learning about small engines. This class includes repaired or restored lawn tractors, small motorcycles, go-karts, etc.

10616 Tractor

Repaired or restored tractor

10620 Woodworking

4-H woodworking exhibits can represent any exhibit that shows learning about wood, woodworking techniques, and safe uses of woodworking tools and machines. Exhibits may include newly constructed or refinished, reclaimed, or restored wood items.

10630 Science, Engineering & Technology

Any exhibit that shows learning about or helps explain how science and technology help us interact with the world. Topics include aerospace, biological and chemical sciences, computers & networking, earth & climate, geospatial mapping (GPS/GIS), robotics, or any other application of Science, Engineering, or Technology

Science, Engineering & Technology Special Rule:

Exhibitors entered in the 4-H Science, Engineering & Technology classes may not enter in similar FFA Ag Mechanics classes and vice-versa.

Clover Kids Pet Show Sunday, July 29th, 2018, 9:30 am

- Open to all Clover Kids in Warren County. No pre-fair entry is required.
- Clover Kids will have the opportunity to show the audience their pet and tell a caring adult/Senior 4-H member about their pet.
- Clover Kids Pet Show animals are only allowed on the fairground during the entry and show time. Entry of pets will take place 30 minutes before the start of the show at the Friends of 4-H Stage.
- All pets must come properly restrained or contained.
 Appropriate examples include on a leash or in a box, cage, or bowl.
- Livestock animals such as swine, horses, cattle (beef and dairy), sheep and goats are not to be shown in the Clover Kids Pet Show. All other animals must be less than 100 pounds in order to be shown.
- Pet show animals are not allowed in any livestock barns or show rings on the fairgrounds.
- Any animal being shown in Open Class or a 4-H Class is not permitted to show in the Pet Show.
- Clover Kids and pets must be supervised by an adult at all times. The adult is responsible for both the Clover Kid and pet. Only one Clover Kid and pet will be allowed in the showcase area at a time, along with a responsible adult, to ensure the safety of the pet, the Clover Kid, and the audience.
- Cats and dogs must have a current rabies certificate. (Use the same health requirements as for the 4-H Dog, Cat, and Pet Shows.)
- Any female animal in season cannot be shown.
- Participants will receive a participation ribbon; no premium money will be given.

Please Note: For Clothing Events the Senior 4-H age category is defined as 9-12th grades per State Fair rules.

Fashion Revue

To qualify, all participants (male or female) should:

- 1. Have been enrolled in a 4-H Clothing project in the current 4-H program year.
- Model a garment or outfit the entrant has constructed, handknitted, machine-knitted, or crocheted during the current 4-H year.
 - A garment or outfit consisting of one to three pieces such as party clothes, tailored suits, vest, slacks, shirt, skirt, active sportswear and/or coats are acceptable as Fashion Revue entries.
 - Blouses, shirts, and sweaters are usually considered as garments. If they are used to complete an outfit, they may be constructed or selected.

- All other accessories and undergarments may be constructed or selected.
- Each entrant must fill out the Fashion Revue Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on judging day, Thursday, July 12, 2018, St. Thomas Aquinas Pastoral Center, Indianola. Judging will be from 8:00 am - 8:00 pm.
- Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times. 4-H members must sign up for Fashion Revue during County Fair Entry Week from June 18-23, 2018.
- Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 26th at 5:00 pm at The Friends of 4-H Stage.

The State Fair Fashion Revue participants will be selected according to the following rules:

- 1. Participants must be in the 4-H senior designated level (grades 9-12).
- Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H State Fair exhibit.
- 3. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State Fair on the day they participate in the Clothing Event.
- 4. 4. All participants must participate in the entire Clothing Event activities on the date scheduled for their county unless the 4-H'er is involved in another State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule.

The \$15 Challenge

To qualify, all participants (male or female) should:

- 1. Purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'ers intended use for the selected outfit.
- 2. Have had individual or county experience(s) in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating fit, quality and construction features, price, and cost comparison.
- 3. Outfits <u>must be purchased</u> at a garage sale, consignment store, or resale shop (i.e. Goodwill, Salvation Army, or other stores of this type.) Hand-me-downs or clothing as gifts that were selected by the 4-H'er belong in Clothing Selection.
- 4. Cost of outfit must be \$15 or less, not including shoes, accessories or undergarments.
- 5. Receipt(s) **MUST** be turned in with Clothing Event Form.
- 6. Each entrant must fill out the Clothing Event Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on Judging day.
- 7. The \$15 Challenge will be judged on Thursday, July 12th from 8 am -8 pm. Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times.
- 8. 4-H'ers must sign up for the \$15 Challenge during County Fair sign up June 18th -23rd.
- Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 26th at 5:00 pm at The Friends of 4-H Stage.

The State Fair \$15 Challenge participants will be selected according to the following rules:

- 1. Participants must be in the 4-H senior designated level (grades 9-12).
- Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H State Fair exhibit.
- 3. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State Fair on the day they participate in the Clothing Event.
- 4. All participants must participate in the entire Clothing Event activities on the date scheduled for their county unless the 4- H member is involved in another State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule.
- 4-H members may participate only one time (each) in the Iowa State Fair 4-H Clothing Event Clothing Selection and The \$15 Challenge programs.

Clothing Selection

To qualify, all participants (male or female) should:

- 1. Select and/or purchase an outfit that represents the 4-H'er's goal or intended use for the selected outfit.
- 2. Have had individual planned or county experience(s) in choosing shopping alternatives, evaluating the fit, the quality and construction features, the price, and the cost comparison.
- 3. Each entrant must fill out the Clothing Event Form available at the Extension Office and bring it on Judging day.
- 4. The County Clothing Selection will be judged on Thursday, July 12th from 8 am -8 pm. Entrants will be expected to be dressed and ready to model their garments at their assigned times.
- 5. 4-H members must sign up for Clothing Selection during County Fair sign up from June 18-23.
- 6. Ribbons will be given and State Fair winners will be announced at the Clothing Event Fashion Show on Thursday, July 26th at 5:00 pm at the Friends of 4-H Stage.

Clothing Selection Note: Outfits may be selected and/or purchased from any source, including consignment shops, used clothing stores, etc. Clothing items which are home-sewn are NOT eligible unless the completed garment was purchased from a used clothing source. Clothing items which are custom-sewn specifically for the participant are not eligible.

The State Fair Clothing Selection participants will be selected according to the following rules:

- 1. Participants must be in the 4-H senior designated level (grades 9-12).
- Outfits or accessories which will be worn during the Clothing Event may not be entered as a 4-H State Fair exhibit.
- 3. Participants must bring the garment or outfit they purchased or created, and accessories, to the State Fair on the day they participate in the Clothing Event.
- 4. All participants must participate in the entire Clothing Event activities on the date scheduled for their county unless the 4-H'er is involved in another State Fair 4-H activity at the same time with a non-flexible schedule.
- 4-H'ers may participate only one time (each) in the Iowa State Fair 4-H Clothing Event Clothing Selection and The \$15 Challenge programs.

4-H Communications Programs

This department is open to youth who are participating in the 4-H Youth Development programs conducted by Iowa State University Extension.

All participants are responsible to read and comply with the Warren County Fair Communication Event program rules, 4-H General Rules and Regulations, and specific program event rules and regulations.

Purpose:

The Communication Event program provides opportunities for 4-H youth to develop their personal communication skills by sharing talents, knowledge, or information with others. The events provide a series of developmental experiences for different age levels.

GENERAL COMMUNICATION EVENT PROGRAM RULES AND REGULATIONS:

- a) Educational Presentations and Working Exhibit may be given by one or more 4-H'ers. Teams consisting of youth of mixed grades will be entered in the class of the member in the highest grade level (i.e. a team with a 5th grader and an 8th grader must be entered in the intermediate/senior class).
- b) Topics selected by the 4-H'er(s) should be an outgrowth of his/her 4-H experience(s). Topics should be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- c) Participants in the 4-H Communication Programs are expected to wear appropriate clothing representative of the 4-H Youth Program and/or the topic of the presentation.
- d) 4-H'ers must use sanitary and safe procedures and methods at all times. Educational Presentations and Working Exhibits involving food must follow established food safety guidelines.
- e) All participants are expected to comply with all copyright/ trademark regulations. Copyrighted material may not be distributed without permission.
- f) Each 4-H'er may only participate in one Educational Presentation for judging at the Warren County Fair.

State Fair Participant Guidelines:

4-H'ers who have completed 5th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2018 are eligible to participate at the Iowa State Fair. Exception: Share the Fun and Extemporaneous Speaking - See event rules for age guidelines.

Educational Presentation Department

Purpose

Provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to demonstrate communication skills by presenting knowledge, information, or a process to an audience in order to gain a desired response.

Class 11100

Educational Presentations (Junior)—must have completed 4th - 6th grade in 2018.

Class 11101

Educational Presentations (Intermediate/Senior)—must have completed 7th -12th grade in 2018.

Educational Presentation Rules:

- Time limit: Junior presentations must not exceed 15 minutes. Intermediate/Senior Presentations must not exceed 20 minutes.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Educational Presentation Report form during event check-in.
- Participants must sign-up during County Fair sign up June 18th – 23rd.

- Educational Presentation judging will be on Thursday, July 12th, from 8 am - 8 pm. at St. Thomas Aquinas Pastoral Center
- 5. Awards will be given for Educational Presentation during the Share the Fun Show on Sunday, July 29th starting at 2 pm on the Free Stage.

Working Exhibit Department

Purpose:

To provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to communicate, interact with, and teach an audience in an informal and experiential way.

Class 11200

Working Exhibit (Junior), must have completed 4th or 6th grade in 2018.

Class 11201

Working Exhibit (Intermediate/Senior), must have completed 7th -12th grade in 2018.

Working Exhibit Rules:

- 1. Time limit: All Working Exhibits will be scheduled for a 20 minute time period.
- 2. Participants must turn in a completed Working Exhibit Report form during event check-in.
- Participants must sign-up during County Fair sign up June 18th – 23rd.

Share-The-Fun Department

Purpose:

To provide an opportunity for 4-H'ers to share their skills and talents before an audience purely for the sake of enjoyment.

Share-The-Fun Program

Share-The-Fun Rules:

- 1. Eligibility: 4-H'ers who have completed 4th grade through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2018. For State Fair, 5th through 12th graders are eligible. Exception: If the Share-The-Fun act involves a whole club, the following criteria must be applied to determine if the club can be entered in the Share-The-Fun Program at the Iowa State Fair:
 - At least 80 percent of the performing group must have completed 5th through 12th grade in 2018.
- 2. Share-The-Fun performances <u>must not exceed eight minutes</u> in length.
- 3. Skits, songs, stunts, short one-act plays, dance, and other entertainment will be acceptable. All performances must be appropriate for presentation to a general audience.
- All performers must turn in a completed 4-H Share-The-Fun Report form at event check-in to confirm stage setup, cue music, etc.
- 5. Participants must sign-up during County Fair sign up June 18th 23rd
- 6. Share-The-Fun Judging will be on Sunday, July 29th at 2:00 p.m. on the Friends of 4-H Stage.

Extemporaneous Speaking Department

Purpose:

Encourage the development of communication skills by providing an opportunity to think, organize thoughts, prepare a speech, and respond to questions when given a limited amount of preparation time.

Extemporaneous Speaking Program

Extemporaneous Speaking Rules:

- 1. Participants must be senior 4-H'ers completed 9th through 12th grade (or that equivalent) in 2018.
- Participants must sign-up during County Fair sign up June 18th – 23rd.
- Extemporaneous Speaking judging will be on Thursday, July 12th from 8 am - 8 pm. at St. Thomas Aquinas Pastoral Center.
- 4. Program format:
 - a. Thirty minutes before the program, each participant will draw three of the available topics, selecting one on which to speak.
 - b. The selected topic will not be available to the other participants in the speaker's assigned room. The general nature of the topics will relate to 4-H. The other two topics drawn, but not chosen, will be returned to the available topics for the other participants.
 - c. A preparation room is to be used with one participant per speaking site admitted initially and one additional participant per speaking site admitted each 15 minutes as the program progresses. A participant may not leave the preparation room until it is time to speak, nor may a participant receive help from a parent, leader, other adult or any other youth. A program official will assist participants with the time requirements.
 - d. Reference material will be screened by a program official on the basis of the participant's preparation.
 - Reference material must be printed material such as books or magazines (cannot be notes, outlines or speeches prepared by the participant or by another person for use in this program).
 - Some relevant reference material will be available in the preparation room. This material will consist of historical material related to the 4-H program.
 - e. Each speech shall be the result of the 4-H member's own efforts using the approved reference material that a participant may bring to the preparation room. No other assistance may be provided. Plain 3"x5" note cards will be provided for each participant in the preparation room. If notes are used, the 3"x5" note cards provided must be used in delivering the speech.
 - f. Only notes made during the preparation period may be used.
 - g. Each speech shall be not less than four but no more than six minutes with five minutes additional time allowed for related questions, which shall be asked by the judge. The participant will be shown time cards in an ascending order (1, 2, 3, 4, 5) by the time keeper. "Stop" will be said at six minutes.
 - h. The program timekeeper will introduce each participant by name and the county he/she represents. The participant will be expected to introduce his/her speech by title only.
 - Participants are not permitted to use any props, gadgets, posters or audiovisuals of any sort. A podium not will be available.

- 5. Speeches will be evaluated using the following criteria:
 - a. Content related to topic.
 - b. Knowledge of the subject.
 - c. Organization of material.
 - d. Power of expression.
 - e. Voice.
 - f. Stage presence.
 - g. General effect.
 - h. Response to questions.
- 6. A judge's critique/conference with each participant will be included as a part of the program.

The Warren County Angus Association (Eric and Kelly Johnson, Prole) will present trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Angus Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Black Angus Heifers. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Angus Market Steer. They will present money awards of \$25, \$20, \$15, \$10, and \$5 respectively to the top five Angus rate-ofgain.

The Warren County Cattlemen's Association (Terry Eckstein, Indianola) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Crossbred Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Market Heifer, the Champion and Reserve Champion Commercial and All Other Breeds Beef Breeding Heifers, and the winners of the Showmanship contest in the Market Beef, Commercial and All Other Breeds Beef Breeding Shows. They will present a plaque to the Champion Warren County Produced Crossbred Market Steer. The Warren County Charolais Association (Gene Bedwell New Virginia) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Charolais Market Steers, the Champion and reserve Charolais Heifer and Champion Beef Cow. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Charolais Market Steer. They will pay \$10 to each 4-H'er for a three pound-per-day rate-of-gain on Charolais-sired Market Steer and a \$10 bonus to the Market Steer with the top rate-of-gain overall if it is a Charolais-sired animal.

The Warren County Hereford Breeders' Association (Craig Amos, New Virginia) will award trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Hereford Beef Breeding Heifers. They will give a plaque to the Champion Warren County Produced Hereford Market Steer and a plaque to the Hereford Market Steer with the highest rate-of-gain.

The Warren County Limousin Breeders (Neena Leih, New Virginia) will present trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Limousin Market Steers, the Champion and Reserve Champion Limousin Heifers, the Champion Beef Cow, the top Limousin in the rate-of-gain contest. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Limousin Market Steer.

The Warren County Maine-Anjou Breeders (Dave Bowlin, Indianola) will present trophies to the Champion and Reserve Champion Maine-Anjou Heifers, the Champion Beef Cow. They will present a belt buckle to the Champion Warren County Produced Maine-Anjou Market Steer.

The Warren County Red Angus Breeders (Mike Orwig) will present trophies to Champion and Reserve Champion Red Angus Heifers, Champion Beef Cow.

The Rodney Woodruff Memorial Traveling Trophy will be presented to the winner of the Senior 4-H Dairy Showmanship contest. The Warren County Dairy Producers (Jeanne Woodruff, Indianola) will present the Don Hoover Memorial Traveling Trophy to the Supreme Dairy Champion Female.
