Fair Board Meeting.

The Washington County Fair Board met in the Chamber rooms Monday night, August 3, with President Hesse presiding. The others present were C. D. Minton, R. M. Banks and Manager Moore.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

The following proposals were submitted and unanimously approved by a motion made by Mr. Minton and seconded by Mr. Banks.

A letter to the mayor and city council asking permission to use Shute Park and the auditorium during the days and nights of the Fair.

Rule to be enforced as outlined in the premium list confining all exhibits and displays for which premiums are to be paid to Washington County.

Exhibits of livestock from outside of Washington County to be permitted providing there is no expense to the Fair.

Purchase of premium ribbons as per sample submitted for the 4H club departments, boys and girls, these samples having been submitted to L. E. Francis and O. B. Kraus and found satisfactory by them.

Premium cards to be used in all other departments of the Fair in place of ribbons.

Rule in premium books stating that no exhibits or entries will be accepted after 11:00 P.M., Wednesday, September 2, to be enforced.

Approval of all superintendents.

Approval of prizes for pet parade and for junior pioneer pageant and parade.

Approval of Friday night program as proposed by the County Judge Don Templeton, which was to get Senator McNary for speaker and the Republican committee to furnish the orchestra for a free dance and a band, for concert and to pay all the expenses for the use of the auditorium that night, the Farmers Union to share in the program.

The Granges and Farmers Unions to picnic on September 4th.

The business men and employees to visit the Fair Friday from 1:30 to 3:30.

Report of the business men's advertising promotion plan and distribution of merchandise gifts.

Promotion of colt show if possible without expense to the Fair.

Mr. Banks reported that the light globes were in his possession.

Secretary made a report of the expenses incurred so far.

Permission was granted the manager to purchase additional hose and secure additional fire protection.

The manager reported that the buildings were in very poor condition and that the WPA project might be put through, as it had been approved by the Oregon WPA, and sent to Washington, D. C., and was awaiting presidential action.

A bill was presented by Mrs. Moore for \$6.90 for her work, and was approved and ordered paid.

On motion the meeting adjourned.
