

## FAIR BOARD MEETING.

SATURDAY, MAY 4, 1935.

The Washington County Fair Board met in the Chamber of Commerce rooms, at 1:45, on the above date, with all members present, and President Minton presiding.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved as read.

The secretary reported that \$7.19 had been received from the fund in the liquidation department of the old Shute Bank, and had been deposited in the bank.

The President had a bill for the printing of letter heads and envelopes. Moved by Hesse, seconded by Banks, that this bill be paid. Motion carried.

In the matter of the competitive entertainment by the north and south parts of the county Mr. Hesse reported that he had talked the matter over with different ones and had brought it up at Pomona Grange, where it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that the competition should be between the Granges and the Farmers Union locals. Mr. Banks reported on his meeting with Mrs. Meek, and that she seemed to be of the same opinion. It was decided to see Mr. Fay Mills of Pomona Grange, and Mr. Ploss, head of the Farmers Union. The matter of the division of the prize money was also discussed, and it was finally moved by Banks, seconded by Hesse, that we reconsider the action of the last meeting on the division of the premium money. Motion carried.

Moved by Banks, seconded by Hesse, that the motion be amended to read that the contest be between the Granges and the Farmers Unions, and that \$40.00 be offered for first prize and \$35.00 be offered for second prize. Motion carried, and on motion the motion was carried as amended.

Eight Granges have decided to exhibit at the Fair, and the secretary was instructed to write a letter of appreciation to the Scholls Grange, this making a total of nine Granges.

Moved by Hesse, seconded by Banks, that Mr. Minton be instructed to have an awning erected upstairs on the south end of the Grange building. Motion carried.

Discussion in regard to having open classes in stock. No decision.

Moved by Hesse, seconded by Banks, that an admission price of ten cents be made for all adults and all children over ten years of age to the auditorium for the entertainment on the nights of Thursday

and Friday during the Fair. Motion carried.

President Minton reported that the man who had the train rides last year had said that he would take the dance on a percentage basis.

Following a discussion in regard to the arrangement of the days programs for the Fair, it was decided that the first day, Thursday, should be children's day, with the Farmers Union program that night, the second day, Friday, should be Farmers Union Day, with the Grange program that night, and the third day, Saturday, be Grange Day.

On motion the meeting adjourned to meet Saturday, June 1, at 1:45 P.M.
