NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS IAFE (INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS)

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times conduct themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.h addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event, which culminates with the animal entering the food chain, shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statues, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested (by the approved laboratory to which it is sent) is the one taken from the animal in question. Its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

SIGNATURES REQUIRED ON THE BACK OF THIS FORM!

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair, or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. h the furtherance of

- their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation, and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the AFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

OSCEOLA COUNTY FAIR & LIVESTOCK SHOW GUIDELINES FOR EXHIBITION

- 1. The Osceola County Fair & Livestock Show does not take responsibility for lost, damaged or misdirected forms, entries or articles of exhibit.
- 2. All rules are subject to the interpretation of the Board of Directors of the Fair. All decisions made by the Board are final. This Board reserves the right to deny or allow any entry to the Fair and Fairgrounds.
- 3. All non-commercial exhibits must check in according to committee guidelines as published. No exhibit may leave the grounds prior to the scheduled release dates & times as indicated in the various calendars and/or individual department or section rules.
- 4. In all events and exhibits being judged, the judge's decision shall be final.
- 5. All entries, if not claimed by close of check out time shall become the property of the Fair. All premiums will be paid and checks mailed within 6 weeks after the fair ends. Premium checks MUST be cashed within 60 days of the issue date.
- 6. A \$30.00 fee or 5% of the face amount will be charged for any bad check received by the Fair for entries, animal sales, sponsorships, contracts, etc.
- 7. Any formal complaints shall be presented in writing within six (6) hours of the discrepancy to the Fair Office to be handled as they see fit.
- 8. Any exhibitor or vendor conducting or participating in any illegal or immoral activities on the Fairgrounds shall forfeit all rights to display at the Fair and will lose any monies owed or paid by/to the Fair for premiums, sales, privilege agreements, etc.
- 9. If these rules contradict any committee rule(s) the committee rule(s) shall prevail.
- 10. By signing any privilege agreement, license, entry form, etc., participant agrees to release and discharge the Kissimmee Valley Livestock Show & Fair, Inc. and the Board of Directors & staff thereof from all liabilities, claims, and demands of whatever kind or nature that may arise from or be connected with the participant's participation in any activity sponsored by Kissimmee Valley Livestock Show & Fair, Inc.

GENERAL RULES & REGULATIONS:

Please Address All questions to the above Listed Show Committee

- 1. All goats must have certificates of veterinary inspection and a scrapie premise number (call 321-333-3120 or visit: www.aphis.usda.gov/vs/scrappie for more information).
- 2. A Health Certificate current within ninety (90) days of goats originating in the State of Florida or thirty (30) days for goats originating from out of state.
- 3. Goats originating in the State of Florida no longer need to be tested for tuberculosis or brucellosis.
- 4. Goats originating from out of state must have been tested for tuberculosis and brucellosis within ninety (90) days and health certificate current within thirty (30) days of the day of the show.
- 5. The Junior, Senior and Youth Doe Shows are separately sanctioned by the American Dairy Goat Association (ADGA) for the following breeds: Recorded Grade, Alpine, Lamancha, Nigerian Dwarf and Nubian, All Other Purebreds (Sable, Toggenburg, Saanan), Oberhasli, and will be shown in that order, and is not subject to change.
- 6. The Official ADGA Registration Certificate Alpine is required for all animals over six (6) months of age.
- 7. A duplicate Application for Registry stamped by the ADGA office is permissible for animals under six months of age.
- 8. If animal is leased, the ADGA Lease Agreement is required.
- The Official Registration certificate, stamped duplicate copy or ADGA Lease
 Agreement must be presented at check-in or to the Show Secretary prior to the
 beginning of the show.
- 10. Substitution of animals will be made at check-in.
- 11. ADGA Rules shall govern.

ELIGIBILITY:

1. Any youth between the ages of 5 and 19 or who has not graduated from high school by the date of the show (February 15, 2021) is eligible to enter.

ENTRIES:

- 1. Entries must be postmarked by February 10, 2021. LATE ENTRIES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED.
- 2. An entry fee of \$10.00 per open class animals
- 3. An entry fee \$2.00 per animal for Youth Show
- 4. ALL ENTRIES MUST accompany the entry form.
- 5. Available pen space will be determined by postmark on entry forms on a first come, first serve basis.
- 6. Up to 3 Changes made no later than 3 days prior to 2/18/2021

 No changes will be made at CHECK IN
- 7. Entries must be submitted In PAPERFORM ONLY.

GENERAL:

- 1. There will be an area for pasteurizers to be used.
- 2. Due to health and safety regulations, no cooking will be allowed in the barn; no food or drink may be consumed in the animal areas and exhibitors should wash hands after handling animals.
- 3. All goats must be dehorned and tattooed.
- 4. It is the responsibility of the exhibitors to see that their goats are fed, watered and milked daily for the duration of the show.
- 5. Exhibitors should bring their own cleaning equipment.
- 6. Exhibitors bringing in small goats must provide adequate means for containment.
- 7. No dogs will be allowed in the barn.
- 8. Only goats being shown will be permitted on the Fairgrounds.
- 9. By order of the Fire Marshall, no overnight sleeping will be allowed in the barn.
- 10. KVLS does not provide feed or hay.
- 11. Milk must be dumped in the provided milk dump.
- 12. Exhibitors must sign the Kissimmee Valley Livestock Shows & Osceola County Fair, Inc. *Rules & Hold Harmless Agreement Form.*

- 13. Any person who violates any of the general rules or special rules as posted in this premium list will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.
- 14. Tack areas provided, if room is available. If provided, tack must be kept in tack area. Assigned pens can be used for tack areas.
- 15. Extra space provided for milking areas outside covered walkway.

YOUTH DAIRY GOAT SHOW

Open to all youth 5 years and under 19 years. Animals Must be registered in the name of the youth exhibitor or his/her family.

- 1. Maximum of 6 animals, no more than 2 per class may be shown by youth exhibitor.
- 2. Youth exhibitors must show their own animals unless there are 2 in the class.
- 3. Youth Exhibitor Dress Code- Same as Open Show

ARRIVAL:

- 1. An accredited state inspector will be available to check the unloading of animals during posted arrival times.
- 2. NO ANIMALS SHALL BE UNLOADED ONTO THE FAIRGROUNDS UNTIL THEY HAVE BEEN INSPECTED! NO EXCEPTIONS!
- 3. Goats may not be unloaded until the Show Chairperson has assigned pens.
- 4. All livestock exhibitors must follow signs for Goat Arrival.
- 5. All trailers must be parked in the designated area.
- 6. Parking of exhibitor vehicles must be in designated areas only. Parking permits will be available at check-in.
- 7. If any emergencies, contact the Fair Office at (321) 697-3050.
- 8. Pens will be assigned according to the number of goats you bring to the show.

JUDGING:

- 1. DRESS CODE:
 - a. Exhibitors must be clean and neat, dressed in black or white pants or long skirts (no skinny jeans or yoga pants) and a white shirt with a collar.
 - b. Close-toed shoes or boots are required.
 - c. Exhibitors not conforming to dress code will not be allowed to enter the show ring.
 - d. Blue jeans will not be permitted in the show ring.
- 2. All decisions made by and of the judges shall be final.

RELEASE:

- 1. Animals will be released at conclusion of the show on Sunday, February 21, 2021.
- 2. Pen area must be free of trash and debris.
- 3. Exhibitors must sign-out with the Show Chairperson for release. (NO GOATS WILL BE TAKEN OUT OF BARN WITHOUT CHAIRPERSONS APPROVAL).
- 4. Premiums will NOT be awarded if release form is not signed.
